Kalamazoo County Fair 4-H Sculpture Guidelines

General suggestions to help leaders:

- All sculpture projects must be hand formed and free standing. No kits used!
- Materials: Soap, soft wood, clay, paper-mache, wire screen, hardware cloth, metal, plastic, Styrofoam, paper, found objects, plaster, etc.
- Project must take up no more that an 18-inch square of table space. Height is not restricted but should be kept within reason. Member may enter 1 large item or two small (an article the size of a loaf of bread would qualify as large, anything less is considered small.)

BEGINNERS (1 – 2 years in project)

Suggested knowledge/skills to be learned:

- 1. Arrange grouping of articles to study and design.
- 2. Inflate, tie and twist toy balloons to make variety of form.
- 3. Work with "modeling clay" (Plasticene) forming objects, animals and a variety of shapes.
- 4. Carve forms from soap, Styrofoam or soft wood.
- 5. Bend and twist wires to form simple, strong shapes or forms.
- 6. Use paper mache to make modeled figures or objects.
- Suggested projects for Beginners:
- Project using above examples.

INTERMEDIATES (3 – 4 years in project)

Suggested knowledge/skills to be learned:

- 1. Continue using skills learned in previous years.
- 2. Acquaint with "works" of prominent sculptors past and present.
- 3. Experiment with "manufacturing" sculpturing materials.
- 4. Try "sand casting" (modeling depressions into moist earth and filling with plaster).
- 5. Sculpt with some self-made materials, such as paper mache.
- 6. Sculpt with common materials such as wire screen, hardware cloth, etc.

7. Make plaques by chipping design into a plaster disc you have cast in plate or shallow bowl.

8. Build a mobile or make a 3D collage. Experiment with sawing and carving Styrofoam.

9. Visit museum, stonecutter, cemetery monument maker, etc.

10. Check out the library.

ADVANCED (5 years and over in project)

Suggested knowledge/skills to be learned:

- 1. Continue using skills learned in previous years.
- 2. Work with new materials...be creative.
- 3. Try to visit a college art department and observe sculpting in process.
- 4. Make color an integral part of your sculpture.
- 5. Become a teen leader.
- 6. Demonstrate techniques and/or develop instructional materials.
- 7. Show and/or sell products at art shows, craft shows, etc.
- 8. Explore career opportunities in sculpture.

Suggested projects for Advanced: Color and originality/creativity must be seen in project.
