Farm Business Incubator — growing farmers in the central Upper Peninsula

MSU Upper Peninsula Research and Extension Center is now accepting applications for their Farm Business Incubator Program.

If you plan to start a small farm business, but want more experience before taking the leap, perhaps the <u>Farm Business Incubator program</u> (FBI) at the Michigan State University Upper Peninsula Research and Extension Center is for you! The FBI is a launching point for beginning farmers interested in starting their own business.

This program lowers barriers to entry for beginning farmers by providing access to organically managed land, hoop house space, farm equipment, tools, cold storage and wash/pack facilities in exchange for a small program fee and four hours of "sweat equity" each week to support the overall program. Affordable on-site housing is also available and program participants are encouraged to avail themselves of this opportunity to be close to their farm business. In addition, farm staff and Extension Educators can provide mentorship on business planning, marketing avenues, and farm management.

The Upper Peninsula of Michigan has long struggled with food security issues due to geographic isolation and a short growing season. In the era of grand challenges like COVID-19 and climate change, small farms and resilient local food systems are more essential than ever. The FBI program works to overcome these challenges by providing low-risk experience to the next generation of farmers who want to supply local, healthy food to the U.P. region.

In 2021, the program will host Joe and Kate of <u>Mighty Soil Farm</u> for a fourth season. Before applying to the program, Kate and Joe spent several years learning the ins and outs of farming in Michigan, New York and Vermont. They have grown during their time in the program from managing a quarter acre of mixed vegetables and working to develop their production systems, to a growing on a full acre and maintaining purchasing relationships with area restaurants, grocery stores, a CSA, and a focused presence at the area's largest farmers market.

The program got its start in 2014 with support from the United States Department of Agriculture and the National Institute of Food and Agriculture, who together have created the <u>Agriculture and Food Research Initiative</u>. The primary goal of the program is to support new farm businesses during their riskiest start-up years: testing business plans, honing products and branding, establishing accounts, building capital and fine-tuning their skills so that they can one day farm independently and provide food to U.P. Program participants have the opportunity to establish their farm business without making large capital investments, allowing beginning growers to identify and develop markets before taking on a large debt load. Since 2014, six farm businesses have participated in the program.

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### Farmers needed to help guide direction of future MSU Extension field crop programming

## The MSU Extension field crops team is asking farmers for guidance by filling out a brief online needs assessment.



Every three years, the Michigan State University Extension field crops team asks farmers and agribusiness professionals to help them chart the course for their programming efforts by participating in a needs assessment survey. The survey has historically been done regionally and held in person. However, in 2020, the field crops team is asking for farmers and agribusiness professionals to help them with an online survey. The survey can be completed in usually less than 10 minutes. Thoughtful and insightful information may come from just one person's idea and input.

In years past, ideas generated from the needs assessment have been developed into programs. One example occurred during the last needs assessment meeting. Tech-savvy farmers shared

an idea for something different to be done online. They needed something that was available on a cell phone and recorded for later listening. That idea turned into the MSU Extension <u>Field Crops Virtual Breakfast</u> Series which is held every Thursday morning during the growing season. In 2020, the virtual breakfasts had 2,134 participants. Other hot topic areas such as soil health and cover crops, farm profitability or an emphasis on production risks may become the focal point of new programming based on responses from participants.

The ideas, interests and concerns of those involved with the field crops industry will be collected, summarized, and sorted to give direction to the entire MSU Field Crops Team for the next few years.

To encourage participation this year, participants have the option to be included in a drawing for a \$100 gas gift card. Three cards will be awarded to randomly selected people that complete the online questionnaire and 'opt-in' for the drawing.

# Senator Stabenow Announces \$746,480 to Strengthen Local Food Economies in Southwest Michigan and the Upper Peninsula

New grant funded in Stabenow's 2018 Farm Bill will help create jobs, improve access to local food

**WASHINGTON, D.C.** – U.S. Senator Debbie Stabenow, Ranking Member of the U.S. Senate Committee on Agriculture, Nutrition, and Forestry, today announced a new \$746,480 investment to help build local food economies, create jobs, and improve access to locally grown food in urban and rural communities in Southwest Michigan and the Upper Peninsula. This investment comes through the U.S. Department of Agriculture's new Regional Food Systems Partnerships Program, which Senator Stabenow authored in the 2018 Farm Bill.

"When we produce food here, we create jobs here in Michigan," **said Senator Stabenow**. "This is a win-win for families and local food producers who have been hit hard by the COVID-19 crisis."

From restaurant closures, to supply chain disruptions, the COVID-19 pandemic has affected local food economies. Michigan State University will receive \$746,480 to strengthen local food systems by connecting food and farm entrepreneurs in Southwest Michigan and the Upper Peninsula. The project will create lasting partnerships between farmers and innovative food businesses to help create jobs and improve access to locally grown food in both rural and urban communities.

"This award from USDA will allow us to create a more cohesive collaboration infrastructure to better support urban and rural communities of need in Michigan. We will expand the reach of the Michigan Good Food Fund to assist local food and farm entrepreneurs who bring healthy and affordable foods into Battle Creek and the Upper Peninsula" said Jamie Rahrig project lead with the MSU Center for Regional Food System and the MSU Product Center.

In the 2018 Farm Bill, Senator Stabenow authored the new Regional Food Systems Partnerships Program, which builds regional partnerships between farmers and food entrepreneurs to grow local food economies. Senator Stabenow secured permanent funding for these partnerships by including them as a part of the Local Agriculture Market Program, ensuring these investments will be available for food and farm entrepreneurs for years to come.

# Strengthening Public and Private Partnerships for a More Resilient and Just Food System in Rural & Urban Communities Across Michigan

Michigan State University Center for Regional Food Systems (CRFS) advances regionally rooted food systems through applied research, education, and outreach uniting the knowledge and experience of diverse stakeholders. Partnerships are the core of CRFS' work. Since 2009, the Michigan Good Food Charter has been building strong collaboration infrastructure to support local and regional food systems.

A recent partnership with the MSU Product Center spurred innovation to support food and farm entrepreneurs and link enterprises to statewide resources. Covid-19 has highlighted the essential nature of resilient, and equitable local food supply chains. In this project, we will build upon our existing partnerships and past successes, applying key lessons from COVID-19 to improve coordination, resiliency, and racial equity in targeted local food systems across Michigan.

We have chosen low-resource, rural and urban, communities within SW Michigan and the Upper Peninsula as our food system partnership laboratories for this project. By leveraging existing partnerships and an ecosystem of food system business and policy networks, we will expand our collaborative efforts to connect food and farm enterprises, food hubs, incubator kitchens, and institutional and retail markets. The partnerships will carry forward the work of 21 public and private organizations with over 17 years' experience in developing local and regional food systems. Together we will further integrate local food system expertise to address the needs of low-resource partners, respond to COVID-19, and support economic growth to build a stronger, more resilient, and just local economies.
