Larry Chapin

Larry Chapin, M.S., served as a research assistant and farm liaison in the Department of Animal Science at Michigan State University from 1976 to 2017.

Raised in Louisiana, Larry developed an early interest in biology and zoology, which grew into a passion for agriculture while raising beef cattle and horses on a hobby farm and working with a local veterinarian. He pursued his education at Oklahoma State University and Mississippi State University, earning a Bachelor of Science in general agriculture and a Master of Science in animal physiology from Mississippi State, where he studied the effects of heat stress on reproduction in dairy cattle.

Larry began his MSU career in 1976 in the Animal Reproduction Laboratory in the Department of Dairy Science, supporting research on hormonal control of reproduction, growth and lactation in cattle. He worked closely with Dr. Edward Convey, Dr. H. Allen Tucker, Dr. Miriam Weber Nielsen and Dr. George Smith, collaborating with dozens of graduate students, staff and faculty. He helped plan and conduct research projects, analyze data and prepare manuscripts, and also managed the MSU Dairy Farm's environmental research facilities.

In 2007, Larry became the farm liaison for the Department of Animal Science, ensuring that MSU's facilities remained compliant with evolving animal care regulations and research requirements.

Throughout his career, Larry co-authored 134 scientific publications, including 80 abstracts, 54 peer-reviewed journal articles and one book chapter. His dedication earned him the MSU Distinguished Staff Award.

Beyond campus, Larry was deeply involved in volunteer and youth programs. He served on the committee for the Ingham County 4-H Therapeutic Riding Program, judged and moderated 4-H Dairy Quiz Bowls and Dairy Days competitions, evaluated 4-H Animal Science Communication Contests, and presented at 4-H Dairy Camps and Veterinary Science Camps.

Larry and his wife, Julie, of 43 years, live in Portland, Michigan. They have one son, a daughter-in-law and two grandchildren. In retirement, Larry enjoys bird-watching, traveling and spending time with family and friends.

For his decades of service to Michigan State University and his lasting impact on research, education and youth engagement, the Michigan Dairy Memorial and Scholarship Foundation is proud to honor Larry Chapin as a Foundation Honoree.





Kevin Dill

Kevin Dill grew up on a 540-acre diversified crop and livestock farm in Linn County, Missouri, which included a 100-cow dairy herd. His passion for dairy cows led him to the University of Missouri-Columbia, where he earned both a bachelor's and a master's degree in dairy science. While completing his graduate studies, he also taught undergraduate students as part of his assistantship responsibilities.

After graduate school, Kevin joined Michigan State University as coordinator of the two-year Agricultural Technology Dairy Program. In this role, he recruited students, developed curriculum, supervised summer placements on commercial dairies across the Great Lakes states and Northeast, and taught courses in herd management, nutrition and farm management. He also coached MSU's dairy cattle judging teams, further strengthening his connection to the industry.

While leading the Ag Tech Dairy Program, Kevin completed his Ph.D. in animal science in 1991, researching management factors that most affect milk production in commercial dairy operations. He gained additional hands-on experience collecting and analyzing DHIA data from 44 participating Michigan dairies.

Following his Ph.D., Kevin joined Purina Mills Inc. as a dairy technical consultant, supporting operations across Missouri, Kansas, Arkansas and Oklahoma. After relocating to Michigan, he expanded his role to include Indiana and Ohio — training Purina sales staff and co-op and dealer nutritionists, and collaborating with herd veterinarians and other advisors to enhance herd performance. He remained in this position for 18 years and served on the Tri-State Dairy Nutrition Conference planning board, in addition to contributing to Michigan State's large animal program curriculum review.

In 2014, Kevin joined Purina's dairy technical leadership team, where he led company-wide dairy nutrition training and supported operations in Mexico and China. He concluded his career as director of technical innovation, overseeing product development, before retiring in 2025.

Kevin's professional affiliations included 38 years with the American Dairy Science Association and 34 years with the American Registry of Professional Animal Scientists. He was known for his ability to use on-farm data to solve complex challenges, often "following the cows" to identify practical, real-world solutions. Producers and nutritionists alike valued his insight, focus and dedication to continuous improvement in the dairy industry.

Kevin resides in Wildwood, Missouri, with his wife of more than 30 years, Tina. They have four adult children: daughters Maggie, Emma and Cora, and son D.J.

For his lifelong dedication to advancing the dairy industry and supporting producer success, the Michigan Dairy Memorial and Scholarship Foundation is proud to recognize Kevin Dill as a Foundation Honoree.

Gerald Surbrook

Gerald Surbrook was raised on a farm and devoted his life to agriculture as a dairy farmer in Rives Junction, Michigan. After graduating from Jackson High School in 1956, he enrolled in the dairy short course at Michigan State University. A year later, he married his wife of 65 years, Barbara, and together they began farming in 1959. The couple raised two children, Rick and Cheri, and their family has since grown to include seven grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.

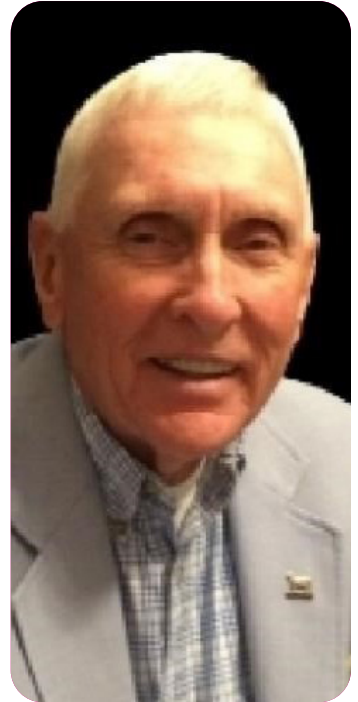
For many years, the family's Grand Valley Farm operated as a dairy and crop enterprise, milking 120 cows. Today, the Surbrook legacy continues with son Rick and grandson Jim managing the 800-acre operation, producing corn, soybeans, wheat and alfalfa.

Throughout his career, Gerald was an active leader and advocate for the dairy industry. He served on the boards of the Michigan Milk Producers Association and the Michigan Animal Breeders Cooperative, and as a trustee for the Michigan Livestock Exchange. His commitment to community service was equally strong — he volunteered as a firefighter, served as Rives Township supervisor and trustee, and was a member of the Jackson County Soil Conservation District Board and the Jackson County 4-H Fair Board.

Gerald's leadership and dedication earned him numerous honors. In 1984, he received the Farmer's Week Distinguished Service Award and was named Michigan State University Dairy Farmer of the Year. In 2016, he was recognized as a 50-year member of the Michigan Milk Producers Association, followed by a tribute from the State of Michigan Governor's Award in 2017. He was inducted into the Michigan Farmers Hall of Fame in 2018.

An avid collector of antique dairy farm memorabilia, Gerald enjoyed sharing his passion with others, often opening his home to school groups eager to learn about the history of agriculture.

For his lifelong commitment to his community and the dairy industry, the Michigan Dairy Memorial and Scholarship Foundation is proud to recognize Gerald Surbrook as a Foundation Honoree.

IN MEMORIAM OF DR. RUSS ERICKSON



The MDMSF Board of Directors sadly acknowledges the passing of Dr. Russ Erickson on August 8, 2025. Dr. Russel Erickson devoted his career to teaching, research and student mentorship at Michigan State University, leaving a lasting impact on dairy education and experiential learning.

Erickson earned his doctorate in dairy management from MSU in 1972 and joined the faculty in the Department of Animal Science at MSU. He attained the rank of full Professor in 1985 while simultaneously managing the MSU Dairy Research and Teaching Center from 1972-1985.

A passionate educator, Erickson advised the MSU Dairy Club and dairy judging teams for many years and led numerous study abroad programs, providing students with valuable global perspectives on agriculture, particularly in South Africa. He also played a key role in revitalizing the MSU Draft Horse Program and enjoyed working closely with both the dairy and draft horse communities.

Dr. Erickson served as secretary of the Michigan Dairy Memorial and Scholarship Foundation for 17 years prior to retiring from MSU in 2001. At the time of Dr. Erickson's retirement, the MDMSF Board of Directors established a scholarship in his name in recognition of his dedication and commitment to youth in the dairy industry. The scholarship has been awarded annually since to youth who have an interest in a career in the dairy industry.

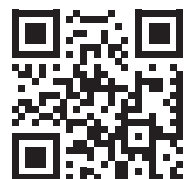

A NEW ERA FOR MICHIGAN STATE'S DAIRY PROGRAM



Barry Bradford, Professor and C. E. Meadows Endowed Chair in Dairy Management and Nutrition

After decades of anticipation and years of planning, the first cows moved into Michigan State University's new Dairy Cattle Teaching and Research Center in late July. In just the first four months of occupancy, the facility has already expanded the program's capacity and impact:

- The herd has grown from about 210 cows in milk to more than 570.
- At least seven courses in animal science and veterinary medicine are now using the center to blend classroom instruction with hands-on learning.
- More than 50 undergraduate students have been hired as part-time employees.
- More than 160 dairy industry members, along with MSU dairy faculty, staff and students, gathered at the center for the third annual Dairy Industry Tailgate.
- The facility has drawn coverage from local television stations, state and national trade publications, and numerous research sponsors.

While early progress has been significant, work continues to fully realize the vision for the new center. The first controlled studies are expected to begin in early 2026. An official ribbon-cutting, timed with the completion of the north site where the former barns were demolished, is planned for late spring. Public outreach efforts are expected to expand in summer and fall 2026.

The more than \$70 million project was made possible in part by a \$30 million investment from the state of Michigan. Additional support will be needed to sustain and enhance this world-class facility. TAKE ADVANTAGE OF THE NEW TAX DEDUCTION FOR CHARITABLE DONATIONS

The One Big Beautiful Bill, or OBBB, passed by Congress this past summer and signed by President Donald Trump on July 4, 2025, brings good news for donors. Starting in 2026, a special deduction of up to \$2,000 for married couples filing jointly, or \$1,000 for single taxpayers, will be allowed for charitable contributions.

Before the OBBB, charitable donations had to be included on Schedule A with other itemized deductions. To gain a tax advantage from charitable giving, a taxpayer's total itemized deductions needed to exceed the standard deduction. For a married couple filing jointly, this amounted to \$29,200 in 2024. As a result, very few taxpayers were able to benefit from an added deduction for charitable donations.

Starting in 2026 under the OBBB, each couple can take an additional deduction of up to \$2,000 for cash donations. This deduction is in addition to the standard deduction. That means each taxpayer who donates to charity should consider maximizing their cash contributions to make the most of these new tax savings.

DISPATCHES FROM THE ANIMAL SCIENCE DEPARTMENT

The Department of Animal Science has been highly active over the past year. Enrollment in the department's four-year bachelor's degree and two-year Ag Tech programs now exceeds 700 students and continues to grow. The Dairy Industry Concentration curriculum is entering its fifth year and maintains an active presence on Facebook and Instagram, where student activities and achievements are highlighted. Participation also continues to rise, with 50 B.S. and 11 Ag Tech Dairy Management students currently enrolled. Since its inception, 25 students have completed the ANS Dairy Industry Concentration.

News and features on dairy research, Extension efforts and student activities can be found in the *Spartan Dairy Newsletter*, published three times per year. Of particular note this year is work from Adam Lock's lab on high-oleic acid soybeans in dairy cow diets, which has received considerable attention for its impact on the dairy industry.

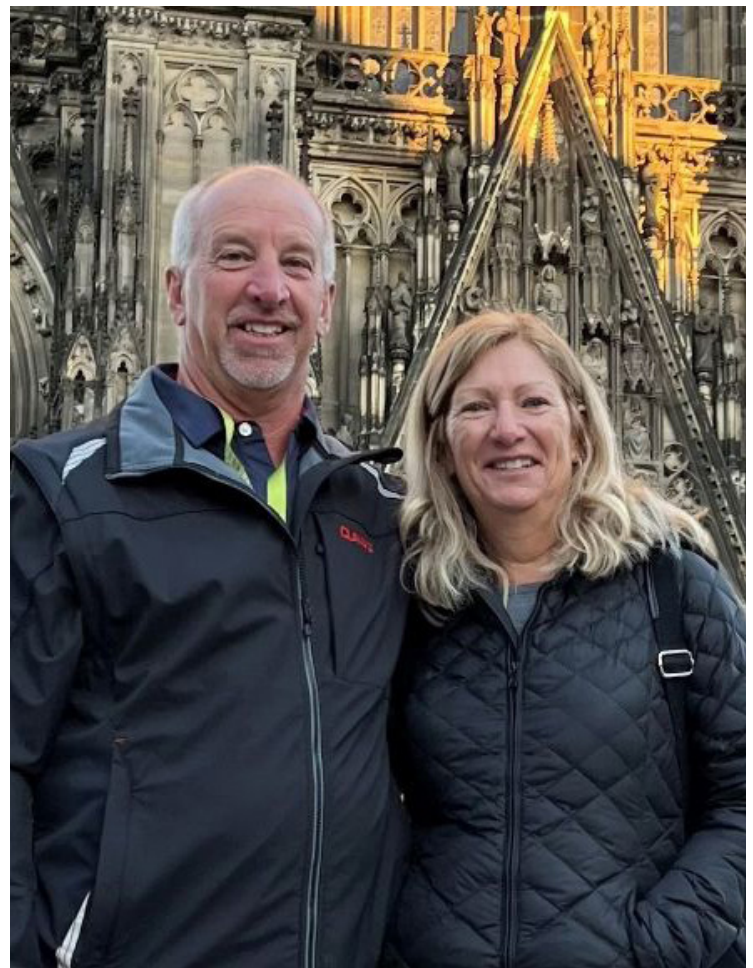
Faculty, graduate students and undergraduate students were active in professional conferences, with several earning top placings. At the Tri-State Dairy Nutrition Conference in April, Haylee Reisinger (advisor Barry Bradford) placed 3rd in the Ph.D. division competition, and Jose Norato (advisor Adam Lock) placed 3rd in the MS division competition. Undergraduates Brooke Seelenbinder (advisor Adam Lock) and Katie Doneth (advisor Adam Lock) placed 1st and 2nd, respectively, in the undergraduate division competition.

MSU Animal Science was also well represented at the American Dairy Science Association (ADSA) annual meeting. In student competitions, Maria Gojcaj (advisor Zheng Zhou) placed 1st and Edward Kolodzie (advisor Zheng Zhou) placed 3rd in the ADSA-USD Undergraduate Poster Contest in Original Research, and Brooke Seelenbinder (advisor Adam Lock) won 1st place in the ADSA-USD Undergraduate Student Oral Contest in Original Research. Adam Lock, Rob Tempelman and Mike VandeHaar all gave symposium presentations, and many graduate students and postdocs presented their research.

Members of the MSU dairy group also received several prestigious awards and honors during the past year. National awards from ADSA included Barry Bradford (American Feed Industry Association Award), Andres Contreras (Zoetis Physiology Award), Adam Lock (Nutrition Professionals Inc. Applied Dairy Nutrition Award) and Pamela Ruegg (ADSA Fellow). Ph.D. students receiving the ADSA Midwest Scholar Award included Ursula Abou-Rjeileh (advisor Andres Contreras), Madison Myers (advisor Andres Contreras) and Jair Parales-Giron (advisor Adam Lock). Two MSU alumni who studied with Adam Lock also received ADSA awards:

Jacquelyn Boerman (Cargill Animal Nutrition Young Scientist Award) and Jonas de Souza (Lallemand Forward Award for Scientific Excellence in Dairy Nutrition). In addition, Mike VandeHaar and Rob Tempelman received the CANR Impact Award for their work to incorporate feed efficiency into Holstein genetic selection programs.

We are deeply grateful for the support we receive from our alumni and friends. We were pleased to recognize Dutch Meadows Dairy with the 2025 Dairy Farm of the Year award from the department, presented at our dairy banquet in April. A significant highlight of the year was the opening of the new Dairy Cattle Teaching and Research Center, made possible through the tremendous support of many alumni, industry leaders and friends. This state-of-the-art facility will prepare students for careers across the dairy industry and support research directly relevant to industry needs. Students are already learning in the new barn, and we look forward to launching research projects there soon.

2025 DAIRY JUDGING REVIEW

The Michigan Collegiate, Ag Tech and 4-H Dairy Judging teams had a successful 2025 season.

In May, four MSU dairy concentration students traveled to Utah to compete in the Richmond Black and White Days Collegiate Dairy Judging Contest. Team members included Laken DuRussel, Maretta Finley, Chloe Steiner and Abby Thelen. The team placed second overall and second in reasons. Chloe Steiner placed 1st in oral reasons. Maretta Finley placed 2nd overall and 4th in oral reasons. Laken DuRussel placed 4th overall and 5th in oral reasons.

The collegiate team for the fall season included Olivia Black, Laken DuRussel, Maretta Finley and Chloe Steiner. The team placed in the top five in oral reasons at each of the three national contests, including 1st place at NAILE. The team also placed 2nd Overall at NAILE and won or placed in the top five in several breeds throughout the season. Individual highlights included Maretta Finley and Olivia Black receiving All-American honors at World Dairy Expo, Chloe Steiner winning oral reasons at NAILE, and several additional individual breed placings.

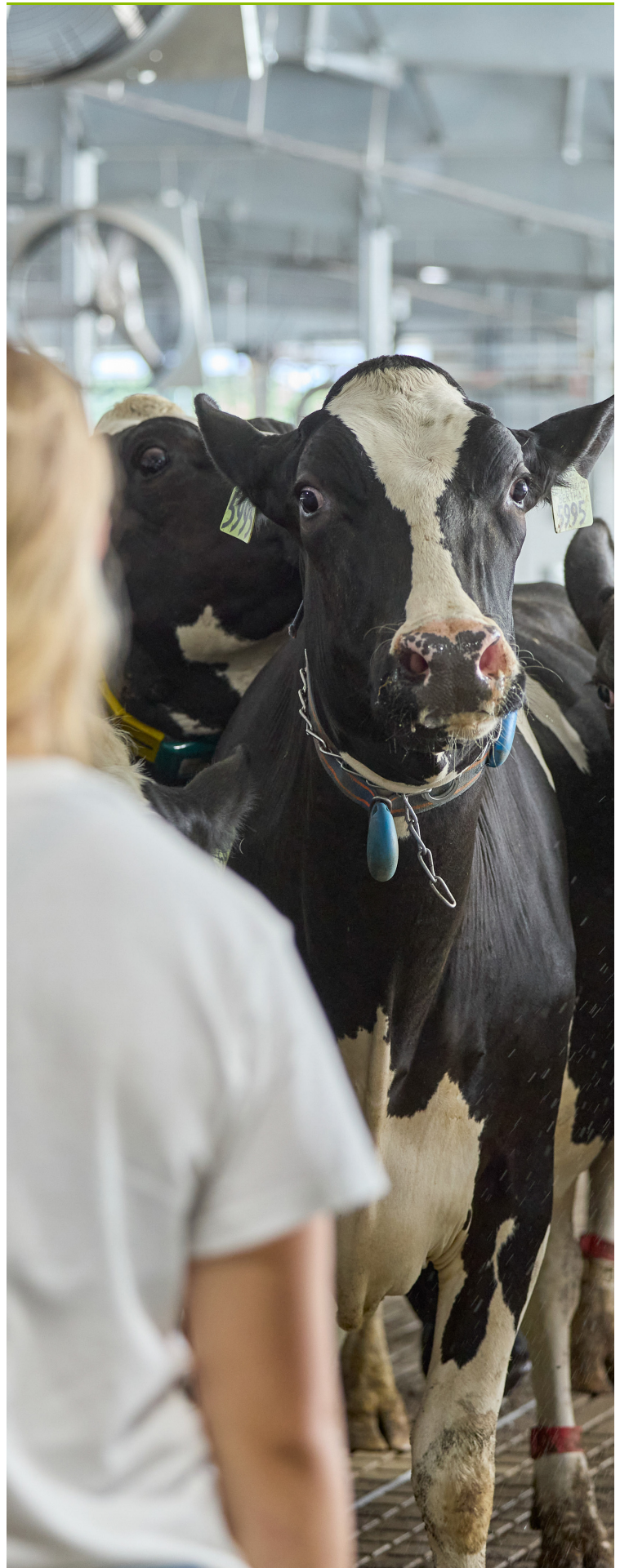
Abby Thelen represented the MSU Ag Tech team. Abby placed in the top five in at least two breed classes at every contest this fall and placed 8th overall at the All-American Dairy Invitational.

The Michigan 4-H Dairy Judging teams also had a strong season. Joey Arens, Katie Karboske, Hailey Mesbergen and Bryce Ritter represented Michigan 4-H at the All-American Dairy Invitational and World Dairy Expo, while Kelsey Gruner, Ross Kelsey, Austin Preston and Gracie Triick represented Michigan 4-H at NAILE.

At NAILE, the Michigan 4-H team placed 1st in Oral Reasons, 1st in Holstein, 1st in Guernsey, 2nd Overall, 3rd in Jersey, 4th in Ayrshire and 4th in Brown Swiss. Individually, Gracie Triick won the 4-H contest and Kelsey Gruner placed 2nd in oral reasons. All members of the 2025 teams placed in the top five in several breeds, demonstrating a bright future for Michigan 4-H dairy judging.

Thanks to the financial support of many organizations, including MDMSF, Michigan dairy judging students traveled to more than 30 dairy farms in six states and participated in an intensive practice weekend at the Maryland State Fair.

MSU dairy concentration senior Sadie Brearley and sophomore Amy Kern placed first and second on Farm 3, respectively. Senior Eli Swyers also placed first on Farm 2.

In December, more than 80 MSU dairy students competed in the MSU Internal Dairy Challenge Contest. Thank you to First Dairy and the many industry professionals who hosted and supported this year's event.

CELEBRATE DAIRY LEADERS WITH THE GIFT THAT KEEPS GIVING

One of the ways the Michigan Dairy Memorial and Scholarship Foundation (MDMSF) grows its endowment fund is by honoring individuals for their distinguished service to Michigan's dairy industry. More than 225 individuals have been named MDMSF Honorees since the foundation's establishment over 50 years ago.

A gift of \$1,000 or more to the MDMSF provides permanent recognition and honors a dairy leader for their service and contributions to the dairy industry. Foundation Honorees receive personal recognition from the foundation and their names are inscribed on a plaque in Anthony Hall at MSU. Honoree biographies and photographs are kept in permanent records in the MSU Department of Animal Science. The items needed for naming an MDMSF Honoree include: a \$1,000 contribution to the MDMSF, an 8x10 photo of the honoree and a one-page biography on the honoree. Many times the presentation to an MDMSF Honoree takes place at an industry or MDMSF event. At other times,

an individual is honored posthumously for their service to the industry through a presentation to the deceased honoree's family.

By honoring individuals through the MDMSF, donors are not only recognizing individuals for their accomplishments in the industry, but they are also investing and providing support to future dairy leaders. As the foundation endowment grows, additional scholarships can be awarded. With the increasing costs of higher education, scholarships often make the critical difference in the lives of students, enabling them to achieve their dreams for the future.
