Safe food for 4-H events

Food safety is important when hosting food events or fundraisers. A new fact sheet, *Safe Food for 4-H Events*, was created to provide education and resources for 4-H staff, volunteers and youth who are coordinating and participating in 4-H food fundraisers or events. Going home: Biosecurity tips for animals that travel off the farm

Animals that are exhibited at the county fair, jackpot shows, and other exhibitions are likely near and dear to their exhibitor's hearts.

<u>Michigan State University Extension</u> offers these biosecurity steps exhibitors can take to protect their show animals and those that were left at home once the event has ended.

- Keep animals that left home separate from animals that did not for a minimum of 14 days. If at all possible, do not allow nose-to-nose contact and provide as much distance between animals.
- Disinfect all buckets, feeders, tools and footwear that left home.
- Throw away any feed or hay that left home.
- Always wear clean clothes and footwear. Boot coverings may be helpful when caring for isolated animals.
- Take care of animals that stayed home from the show first, and animals that were at the show second. Do not go back and forth between animals as this increases the risk of cross-contamination.
- · Do not eat or drink in the barn.
- Observe animals daily for signs and symptoms of illness, such as:
 - Obvious pain or discomfort
 - Decrease in appetite and water intake
 - Fever
 - Letharqy
 - Diarrhea or changes in consistency in manure
 - Discharge from nasal cavity or eyes
 - Overall weakness

Care of animals after traveling is just as critical as their pre-show care. Exhibited animals were exposed to new animal populations and fair-goers, and will typically experience a lot of stress during their time away from home. By practicing these biosecurity steps, you can help keep all of your animals safe and healthy.







EATON COUNTY 4-H MEMBERS NAMED MICHIGAN 4-H STATE AWARD WINNERS



Two 4-H members, Verina Duncan and Lyla LaPaugh from Eaton County 4-H, were selected as winners of 2025 Michigan 4-H State Awards. Lyla was selected as the winner of the 2025 Michigan 4-H State Award in Jr Rabbit & Cavy Science, and Verina was selected as the winner of the 2025 Michigan 4-H State Award in Sr Visual, Performing, and Expressive Arts. The Michigan 4-H State Awards Program took place June 18, 2025 during 4-H Exploration Days at Michigan State University.

The Michigan 4-H State Award is the highest honor bestowed on Michigan 4-H members. The Michigan 4-H State Awards Program is an opportunity for 4-H members to receive recognition while developing their leadership skills and personal portfolio. The program features a Junior and Senior division in 21 project areas as well as a group award category. To enter the competition, 4-H members submitted an application that includes a cover letter, resume, 4-H story, and questions that highlight the life skills, project content knowledge, leadership development, and civic engagement experiences 4-H members have gained through their 4-H projects. Applications were scored, and up to twelve finalists in the Junior, Senior, and Group divisions for each project area were invited to represent their county in the statewide competition.

Senior finalists advanced to further competition where they completed a video conference interview with the selection committee. This year, 38 youth representing 15 counties applied for a 4-H State Award.

Lyla LaPaugh has been a 4-H member for 6 years. In addition to Rabbits and Cavies, Lyla also has participated in the 2023 and 2024 Michigan State 4-H Animal Science Skillathons.

Verina Duncan, a 4-H Member in We-R-A-4-H Club has been in the program for 11 years. In addition to Visual, Performing, and Expressive Arts, Verina also has participated in Birds and Poultry, and the Michigan 4-H International Exchange Programs.

4-H Youth Spotlight: Emily Palmer

Eaton County 4-H welcomes youth with many areas of interest from arts and crafts to livestock and agriculture, and in many cases, youth form new interests along the way.

Emily Palmer, age 17, shared that when she joined 4-H, she came from a non-agricultural background and was simply looking to learn more about what the program had to offer. What she found was more than just knowledge—she found a community, fostering leadership, activism, and personal growth. "One of my favorite things about being in 4-H is how we're like a family," she shared. "We are always there to help each other when it's needed!"

Eager to grow as a leader, Emily joined the 4-H State Youth Leadership Council (SYLC) to step outside of her comfort zone and further develop the skills she began building through the last few years. Through SYLC, Michigan's highest youth leadership opportunity, members receive training in public speaking, advocacy, communication and leadership skills. SYLC members serve as representatives of the Michigan 4-H program, promoting 4-H through state and local activities, and can provide youth voice and perspective on the development of 4-H programs and curricula.

Thanks to her involvement in 4-H, she's gained more than just leadership experience. She's learned time management, effective communication with both peers and adults, and how to be open-minded and adaptable. "Before, I was very shy and wouldn't speak to anyone I didn't know," she said. "Now, I've gained confidence and a better understanding of how to communicate in a mature way."

Her hard work and dedication have paid off, with her have earned her several impressive accomplishments outside of 4-H as well, including a Varsity Standing in both Cheerleading and Bowling, as well as FFA Involvement, holding the Chapter Historian title. We are proud of her accomplishments and excited to see how she continues to lead and inspire others through her 4-H journey.

TARGET AUDIENCE:

Applications for the Michigan 4-H State Youth Leadership Council (SYLC) are open to any 4-H participant, between the ages of 15-19 by January 1, 2026. They must be currently enrolled in a 4-H program, in good standing in their local 4-H club or unit, and have completed at least the previous year as a 4-H participant. Youth are selected for the council by an application and an interview with a committee. SYLC members serve two-year terms with an optional third year.

PROGRAM SUMMARY:

Michigan 4-H SYLC members serve as representatives of the Michigan 4-H program, promoting 4-H through state and local activities, and provide youth voice and perspective to inform statewide programs and goals.



This includes livestock and animal showmanship classes, as well as still exhibits, educational projects and more. There is no cost to participate and youth may engage in as many classes as they wish by submitting <u>project photos and videos</u>.

Registration for the event closes at 5 p.m. EST on Friday, August 8, 2025.

SCHOLARSHIP AVAILABLE

Participants in the Michigan State Fair 4-H & Youth Virtual Showcase also can apply for up to \$1,000 in post-secondary education scholarships.

Michigan youth, ages 8-19 years old as of Jan. 1, 2025, who submit a project in the virtual showcase are eligible to apply. The deadline to apply for scholarships is Monday, August 11, 2025 at 4 p.m. EST.
