The program started in 2002 providing meals to 125 students at three schools in Kent County. Today, the organization serves thousands of children and families every day in Allegan, Kent, Muskegon, and Ottawa counties.

You can contribute to the service project with your:

- » Time—Participate in the Nourishing Futures: A Volunteer Day With Kids Food Basket workshop on the move. The workshop will include an afternoon of hands-on service prepping food and meals for the organization's sack suppers.
- » Talent—Decorate the paper bags that will carry Kids' Food Basket sack suppers. Bags and decorating materials will be available on the tables during the Welcome and Director's Update and in the Recharge Room throughout the conference. So be sure to grab a bag or two and draw your favorite shapes, animals, and pets, write an inspirational message, or simply doodle. Our goal is to donate 1,855 bags we have decorated during FEC.
- » Goods—Donate handwarmers or purchased or handmade hats, scarves, gloves, and mittens for adults and children. 



## **KEY PARTNER AWARDS**

The MSU Extension Key Partner award recognizes those who have made significant contributions to creating, improving, supporting, or promoting MSU Extension programs. This award is open to individuals, organizations, businesses, media, special MSU programs, and government officials.

## APPLE COMMUNITY EDUCATION INITIATIVE TRACEY WARD

Apple's Community Education Initiative has partnered with MSU Extension on the 4-H Clovers CODE (Creating Opportunity Designed for Everyone) program, which provides resources, tools, and opportunities to enhance the digital literacy and coding skills of people of all ages and backgrounds.

The 4-H program helps young people learn to create app content—from graphics to video to design—and teach robots to follow commands. The Apple initiative has provided teaching and learning materials, iPads and MacBooks, scholarships, and training. The initiative emphasizes inclusion, aiming to narrow the digital divide and prepare young people for success in the rapidly evolving digital landscape.

Young people in the program use the Apple technology and curriculum to develop technical, creative, collaboration, problem-solving, and critical thinking skills. They gain confidence and problem-solving skills and learn to express themselves and prepare for the future.

In addition to hardware and educational resources, Apple generously provided financial support and access to an amazing team of Apple experts who work side by side with MSU Extension's 4-H professionals and volunteers to enhance student learning with technology. The program began in the Southeast Michigan counties of Macomb, Oakland, and Wayne in 2021. In year two, it expanded north into the Upper Peninsula and Northern Michigan with the goal of reaching underserved rural communities and young people from tribal families.

Apple's generous partnership with MSU Extension has demonstrated their unwavering dedication to supporting youth in their educational experiences and empowering the next generation of creators and leaders in their vocational pursuits.

## REP. JULIE BRIXIE, MICHIGAN HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

Rep. Julie Brixie serves the 73rd Michigan House District, which includes the campus of Michigan State University. As chair of the Appropriations Subcommittee on Agriculture and Rural Development and Natural Resources, Julie has championed funding for MSU Extension's and MSU AgBioResearch's Agricultural Climate Resiliency Program.

The program is a partnership of MSU, the Michigan Plant Coalition, and the Michigan Department of Agriculture and Rural Development, and is administered by AgBioResearch and Extension. It aims to benefit Michigan plant agriculture in addressing the long-term challenges of climate change and water quality related to pests and pathogens and developing early warning systems for weather events.

In 2024, the initiative received \$1 million in recurring state funding and a one-time investment of \$5 for a competitive grant program. The recurring funding supported the hiring of six faculty researchers, each with 40% Extension appointments, and two Extension educators.

An MSU alum, Julie earned a master's degree in crop and soil sciences with a specialization in environmental toxicology. She served on Meridian Township's Zoning Board of Appeals and Planning Commission in 1998 and 1999, then was elected to the Township Board, serving two terms as a trustee and three terms as township treasurer. Julie is committed to improving Michigan communities by fighting for policies that protect the environment, ensure equitable access to education opportunities, and fix Michigan's crumbling roads and infrastructure.

Julie's unwavering support for MSU, the College of Agriculture and Natural Resources, MSU Extension, and MSU AgBioResearch make her a key partner in our success.

## MICHIGAN PORK PRODUCERS ASSOCIATION

The Michigan Pork Producers Association (MPPA) has partnered with Michigan State University Extension for decades. The organizations work together to identify significant and emerging issues and develop and deliver educational events for Michigan pork farmers.

For more than 30 years, MPPA has provided space in the Michigan Pork Magazine for MSU Extension educational articles and for the Pork Quarterly, a quarterly insert developed and produced by MSU Extension faculty and educators.

MMPA and MSU Extension collaborate on disease identification and management, preparedness for outbreaks of foreign animal diseases, precision livestock farming, and support of beginning and small farms. They work together to create awareness, build resources, and develop educational opportunities that support the state's pork industry.

If not properly contained, a disease outbreak could decimate the pork industry, forcing many family farms into bankruptcy. This is tough and sensitive work and MPPA has been a critical thought partner and catalyst to keep the preparedness effort moving forward.

MPPA has been a champion for the Emergency Response to Accidents Involving Livestock program since it was created. MPPA was the first and primary ERAIL supporter, securing funding from the National Pork Board at a critical stage of ERAIL's development and helping frame the program's goals and direction. MPPA has been a great advocate for ERAIL and an important ally in discussing the program across the animal agriculture industry.

The Michigan Pork Producers Association is a key partner to MSU Extension in every possible way and greatly deserving of this award.

## ST. CLAIR COUNTY AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY

Since 1937, the 18-member St. Clair County Agricultural Society has led the St. Clair County 4-H and Youth Fair—and been a valued partner of Michigan State University Extension. The positive and supportive working relationship between these two organizations has been described as a model for other counties.

The fair board has worked with all MSU Extension programming areas to help people learn about agriculture and build healthier families, communities, and children empowered for success. In 2022, they worked with MSU Extension's First Impressions Tourism Team to adapt the existing FIT framework to work with a fair, then piloted the Michigan Fairs and Festivals FIT assessment and analysis. They now draw on the extensive data and analysis in the FIT report to guide fair improvements.

Fair attendance reached 145,000 in 2023, making it the largest public event in the county.

Examples of joint educational opportunities and activities held during and outside of the fair include the Spartan Spectacular tent showcasing all facets of MSU Extension programming, the 4-H Kids Zone, a 4-H branded trailer and 30-second promotional video to help with 4-H recruitment efforts, a lactation space for breastfeeding fairgoers, the weeklong Eat Your Ag—from Dirt to Dinner event, and 4-H spin clubs reaching more than 500 students in six elementary schools.

The St. Clair County Agricultural Society is a critical partner in the work of MSU Extension and is well deserving of this honor.

## BOB SUTHERLAND, CHERRY REPUBLIC

Bob Sutherland is the founder and president of Cherry Republic, a Michigan business based in Glen Arbor that sells more than 250 cherry-based products in stores and online. Bob has a deep commitment to delighting consumers with products featuring Michigan tart cherries; to supporting environmental conservation, community, and farmer well-being; and to supporting Michigan State University Extension.

Bob's civic engagement includes leadership roles in organizations like the Michigan Land Use Institute and the Michigan League of Conservation Voters. He has played a pivotal role in supporting the ongoing work at the Northwest Michigan Horticulture Research Center. Bob's most significant contribution to MSU Extension is his unwavering support for mental health initiatives in Michigan's agricultural community. By funding counseling services, hosting morale-boosting events during tough seasons, and establishing the Love Thy Farmer campaign, Bob has made a tangible difference in addressing farm stress and promoting mental health awareness in the agricultural community.

What truly sets Bob apart is his genuine concern for the well-being of farmers and farm families. His support for the MSU Extension Farm Stress Project underscores his compassion and understanding of the challenges they face. Cherry Republic's generous donation—through its Love Thy Farmer program—of 2% of all proceeds in February 2024 to the Farm Stress Project exemplifies Bob's commitment to behavioral health awareness within the agricultural community.

Bob Sutherland's dedication, generosity, and unwavering support for mental health awareness and the agricultural community have left an enduring mark, making him a deserving recipient of this accolade.

### THUMB FOOD POLICY COUNCIL

Since it began as a Michigan State University Extension demonstration project in 2018, the Thumb Food Policy Council has worked in the five-county Thumb region of Michigan to provide food-related education, access, and policies. The council's priorities are getting food to people by helping overcome transportation barriers; helping food pantries build on their assets, ensuring greater access to affordable, safe, and diverse food; developing awareness and knowledge of agriculture; and building food literacy in the community.

The council, MSU Extension professionals, and 4-H'ers convened stakeholders at two food summits in 2019. In 2020, the council and MSU Extension organized the gleaning of blue Hubbard squash that otherwise would have been left in the field. The council distributed the squash and MSU Extension fact sheets and recipes to several local food pantries.

In 2023, the council, with help from MSU Extension, applied for and was awarded a \$1.6 million grant to set up a food hub and distribution system called "The Last Food Mile" in the heart of the Thumb. The hub is based out of an Amish farm cooperative that grows, stores, and packages produce in 3-lb bags. In summer 2023, an average of 1,500 produce bags a week were distributed to low-income seniors and families around the Thumb.

The council has been a valuable partner of MSU Extension in enhancing food security in Michigan's Thumb.

## **EPSILON SIGMA PHI STATE**FRIEND OF EXTENSION AWARD

The Epsilon Sigma Phi State Friend of Extension Award recognizes individuals who have been true friends of MSU Extension. These friends may have helped promote programs, represented MSU Extension as lay leaders, served as key program developers or collaborators, or supported MSU Extension in other ways. This award is open to individuals from nonprofit organizations, businesses, government agencies, media outlets, MSU units, and elsewhere.

### **MELISSA FITZGERALD**

Melissa FitzGerald is the director of the Otsego County Animal Control and Shelter. She has supported MSU Extension's Emergency Response to Accidents Involving Livestock, or ERAIL, team since 2019, when she attended her first ERAIL training.

After completing the course, Melissa worked with the ERAIL team to outfit an ERAIL response trailer for Otsego County. Today her office has mutual aid agreements with surrounding counties to expand access to this needed and valuable resource.

Melissa shares the value of the ERAIL program with stakeholders and funding organizations, explaining how the program has helped her as a first responder. She also brings the Otsego County ERAIL trailer to training events so other first responders can discover the benefits of having a stocked response trailer onsite in an emergency involving livestock.

First responders and animal control officers are new audiences for MSU Extension. As secretary of the Michigan Association of Animal Control Officers (MAACO), Melissa has been a critical connection for the ERAIL team with this community. She has collaborated with the team in offering hands-on and classroom ERAIL training at MAACO's annual conferences, and has organized and hosted ERAIL training open to all first responders in northern Michigan.

As a strong advocate for the ERAIL team's work to improve the safety of animals transported on Michigan roads and of first responders and the traveling public, Melissa FitzGerald is a true friend of MSU Extension.
