Program	10 Cents a Meal for Michigan's Kids and Farms
Grants offered	10 Cents a Meal is a state-funded program that matches what schools and other non-school sponsors spend on Michigan- grown fruits, vegetables, and dry beans with grants of up to 10 cents per meal. Grant amounts are determined by multiplying a year's worth of meals by 10 cents.
Eligibility	Schools and other non-school sponsors that participate in USDA Child Nutrition Programs throughout the state of Michigan
Audiences served/ reached	This program is designed to improve daily nutrition and eating habits for Michigan children and invest in Michigan's agriculture and local food business economy. Grantees purchase Michigan-grown foods of their choosing through the purchasing channels that work right for them, which may include farm direct purchases and/or purchases through food hubs and broadline (full-service) distributors.
Services offered	Connections for farmers and food vendors to 10 Cents a Meal grantees for potential sales relationships, training and education about how to sell to schools and other non-school sponsors
Timeframe	Annually available per the annual state budget Grantees for the 2023-2024 school/program year are being notified in November 2023.

Michigan On-F	arm Produce Safety Team
Services Offered	This team provides produce growers and related stakeholders (such as buyers, market managers, etc.) with educational and on-farm support regarding Good Agricultural Practices (GAP) and federal produce safety laws, specifically the FSMA (Food Safety Modernization Act) Produce Safety Rule. Currently the team is working on an interactive resource to support produce buyers. The Produce Safety Buyers Handbook was created to demystify produce safety requirements and related certification/regulatory programs in Michigan as well as the North Central and Northeast regions of the United States. The MIOFPS team consists of professionals from Michigan State University Extension, Michigan Conservation Districts (Produce Safety Technicians), and the Michigan Department of Agriculture and Rural Development (MDARD). Produce Safety Technicians and team members from MSUE focus on technical assistance, education, and on-farm support. Team members from MDARD focus on education and regulation of the FSMA Produce Safety Rule. The team works together to ensure Michigan growers are well-informed about the FSMA produce safety laws and have access to free and confidential on-farm produce safety support.

Services and Grants Offered	Financing: This statewide lending network of investors is dedicated to providing <u>flexible funding</u> and <u>tailored business</u> <u>assistance</u> for the food and farm businesses that are vital to a resilient, inclusive, sustainable and healthy food system that supports vibrant and equitable communities
	2023 Seed Awards: MGFF is offering 5-10 seed awards, which will provide good food entrepreneurs with grants ranging from \$5,000 to \$20,000. The <u>application</u> process is simple; applicants must explain how the funds will help grow their business, prepare for additional financing, and/or otherwise meet business goals. Proposals must be submitted by December 12, 2023, at 5:00 pm (EST).
Timeframe	Financing is ongoing Seed awards applications are due by December 12, 2023

Eligibility	 MGFF finances food and farm businesses looking to grow and expand who meet the following criteria: Increasing access to affordable, healthy food in communities with low income in Michigan. Preference given to food and farm businesses which are improving people's access to culturally relevant food, creates jobs, and strengthens local economies Incorporated in the U.S. While most of the entrepreneurs we support have been operating for at least one year, we do sometimes work with earlier-stage businesses run by business owners with industry experience or who have contributed their own funds to their startup budget Profitable or can demonstrate a path to profitability within 12 months Financing needs are from \$2,500 to \$6,000,000. Collateral in the form of business and/or personal assets, corporate and/or personal guarantees Strong, committed management team Able to provide financial projections for two years including income statements, balance sheets, and cash flow statements

Grants Offered	 This program will provide two types of grants for community-driven collaborations that reimagine school meals: Spark Awards (\$10,000-\$75,000) for projects that need a short-term infusion of funds for school food system and marketplace improvements, such as capacity-building, planning, and product testing projects. Innovation Collaborative Awards (\$250,000) for projects that promote systems-level change of the school food system and marketplace, such as scaling up of programs, regional partnerships, or new program or product development and integration.
