Message from the District Director

Gratiot County MSU Extension provides people with access to resources and expertise in areas of agriculture, agribusiness, health, nutrition, community, food, environment, and children and youth development. Staff located in Ingham, Clinton, Eaton, Gratiot, Ionia and Montcalm Counties all serve this area as a part of a statewide team of Extension professionals. Anyone is welcome to visit our office and meet with local professionals or get connected to the appropriate regional expert, purchase soil test kits for their fields or gardens, find pesticide manuals critical for certification, have their pressure canner lid tested or ask questions. People contact us via telephone, email, in person, or online. In fact, 29,264,562 contacts through social media, web activity, e-newsletters, and handouts were made with MSU Extension statewide in 2024.



1,224 people from the County attended MSU Extensions programs.



People from the County attended **254** MSU Extension programs (across the state).



613 people from the County participated in Agricultural and Agribusiness programs.



145 youth and adults from the County participated in Children and Youth programs.



116 people from the County participated in Community, Food, and Environment programs.



367 people from the County participated in Health and Nutrition programs.

In May 2024, over 350 children attended the Rural Educational Day (R.E.D.) hosted by Gratiot County Farm Bureau and MSU Extension. The R.E.D. event was an opportunity to learn about agriculture and rural life. As part of the educational experience, MSU Extension's Gratiot County's 4-H Program Coordinator, Brianne Clark and Extension Educator, Casey Zangaro organized an interactive swine booth. The swine booth engaged children in various aspects of swine farming and husbandry. It featured interactive exhibits and hands on learning for all attending. A favorite was the interactive digestive tract activity, which taught participants the intricacies of digestion and its importance to digestive health. Additionally, the booth showcased replicas of swine barns, giving participants a glimpse into where pigs are housed and cared for. This visual representation enriched the understanding of pigs and their role in agriculture.

Kelly Becker, President of the Gratiot County Leaders' Council, played a supporting role to Casey Zangaro on the event day. Her logistic skills contributed to a smoothrunning educational experience..

The event also addressed critical topics such as the spread of airborne viruses, emphasizing biosecurity measures and their significance in livestock management. The R.E.D. event was a testament of the strong collaborative spirit of the community. Joint efforts like Farm Bureau and MSU Extension create an invaluable opportunity for local youth to connect with agriculture firsthand, fostering a deep appreciation and awareness of the importance of the farming industry in their daily lives.

In 2024, a ribbon-cutting ceremony was held for a new trailer in Gratiot County that would bolster our emergency response infrastructure in the state. The Emergency Response to Accidents Involving Livestock (ERAIL) trailer is designed to assist in livestock-related emergencies on roadways and public areas. The ceremony at the fairgrounds was organized by MSU Extension District 8 Director Bill Hendrian and Swine Educator Casey Zangaro. Joining them was Director of Gratiot County Animal Control Tom Clark. Clark was crucial in securing this trailer to the region and remarked on the benefit it would bring.

The ceremony drew farmers, county employees, MDARD representatives, fair board members and the district Farm Bureau coordinator. ERAIL team members Katie Ockert and Cora Okkema were also there and provided insight into the program and its impact.


This event exemplified advancement for local agriculture, an investment in protecting the statewide agriculture industry and MSU Extension's role in community collaboration.

Holly Tiret, MSU Extension Health and Nutrition Educator, introduced A Walk with Ease program at a 'Lunch with Friends' site in Breckenridge. Participants were encouraged to walk independently for at least 10 minutes, 3 times a week for six weeks. Participants shared where to go for indoor walking, as some of the rural road could be challenging.

Throughout the six weeks, Holly checked in with the group leader. At the end of the six weeks, One participant said she has been walking one block, three times a week for the past six weeks. She walks the block from her apartment to the meal site. Prior to this program she was not walking at all. She shared that she has been working on her eating habits for and has lost 60 pounds so far. The walking was something she added, just because of the Walk with Ease program. Another participant said, she is still limited to walking outdoors due to living on a rural dirt road. But was inspired by the other participant. She said, 'You know, I could walk around this block when I come here Monday, Wednesday and Fridays!'
