#### **Garden Team Updates: Strengthening Our Roots**

We've expanded and restructured our team to better serve the diverse needs of our gardens and visitors:

- Dan Bulkowski retired from our Gardens & Teaching Greenhouse Manager after more than 25 years with us. Thank you for everything you did to make us what we are today!
- Steven Peterson joined us as our new Gardens & Teaching Greenhouse Manager, bringing fresh energy to our facilities and operations.
- Tes Smith stepped into the role of South Gardens Manager, overseeing the 4H Children's Garden, Delapa Perennial Garden, and Rose Garden with care and creativity.
- Jessica Wright continues to shine as our Education Coordinator and now also serves as our primary administrator, streamlining operations and outreach.
- We're currently hiring a new Events and Marketing Manager to succeed Amy McCausey, who will
  retire in December 2025 after years of dedicated service.

#### Strategic Planning: Unifying Our Vision

For the first time since 2008, we're developing a new strategic plan to guide the future of the Horticulture Gardens. This includes revisiting our mission, vision, goals, and branding—with input from a wide range of stakeholders including faculty, staff, students, donors, teachers, field trip participants, visitors, and industry partners.

One of the most visible shifts will be our effort to unify our identity as the Horticulture Gardens. Each space will retain its name and unique character, like the Lewis Landscape Arboretum, 4H Children's Garden, Delapa Perennial Garden, and Carter Annual & Trial Garden, but will be unified under a shared mission and vision.

Our guiding principle is simple: respect and build on the past while embracing the future of horticulture and education. We proudly remain gateless, free to all, and deeply committed to honoring the legacy of those who've shaped the gardens over the years.

# Partnerships & Innovation: Planting Seeds for the Future

This year, we've rekindled and grown industry partnerships with organizations like Walters Gardens, SunGro Horticulture, Hunter Irrigation, and more. These collaborations are helping us expand our educational offerings and infrastructure. We've had numerous research projects across MSU Plant Science departments use the gardens to facilitate their research on photosynthesis, plant-insect interactions, plant disease, milkweed breeding, tomato genetics, and more!


We've also begun integrating new teaching tools into our programming:

3D printed butterfly lifecycle models, developed with Polymaker Education, are bringing science to life for young learners.

We're planning to build multiple FarmBots by year's end to support hands-on learning in automation and sustainable agriculture.

New curriculum exploring the science of chocolate is in development, featuring a CocoaPress Chocolate 3D Printer—a delicious way to connect biology, chemistry, and engineering.

This year has been incredibly enlightening for me, and I've truly enjoyed meeting everyone who has stopped by. As we move forward, we invite our community to continue to grow with us, share your insights, and help shape the next chapter of the Horticulture Gardens. # 10TH ANNUAL HOUSEPLANT SALE

Our Tenth Annual Houseplant and Succulent Sale is coming up and we've been busy growing some amazing plants for you all. There are so many great options to choose from but here are a few of our staff favorites:

Philodendron brandtianum also known as the Silver Leaf Philodendron. If you are looking for fantastic foliage this plant is for you. This plant likes to vine, you can grow it as a hanging plant or give it the support of a trellis and it will happily climb as high as you let it.

*Lithops species*, commonly known as Living Stones are a perennial favorite of ours. These little cuties are a genus of succulents native to South Africa. They are used to long periods of drought in their natural habitat and as a houseplant you are more likely to kill them by caring too much.

Nepenthes species, the Tropical Pitcher Plants are another one we love. These carnivorous plants are a fun addition to any houseplant collection. Pitcher Plants require distilled or RO water, and do not need to be fertilized because they get all their required nutrients from capturing insects in their pitchers and dissolving them.

Lithops spp. Sansevieria trifasciata are an old standby for

houseplant experts and amateurs alike. Known by many as Snake Plants or Mother-In-Law's Tongue, these plants are known to be hard to kill. They require little maintenance and come in many shapes, sizes, and colors. With so much variety there is a Snake Plant for everyone!

Euphorbia neorubella is another plant that is new to our collection and houseplant sale. The swollen stem of this plant is known as a caudex. Caudiciform plants are commonly found is desert regions and use their large trunks to store water. Known as Red Monadenium, this succulent likes high light and free draining soil.

Wellfield Botanic Gardens, located in Elkhart, Indiana, is 36 acres with over 20 themed gardens. Some themed gardens include an English Cottage Garden, Event Garden, Island Garden, and Children's Garden.

**Mission:** To cultivate art, education, and ecology to nurture a more vibrant and sustainable world.

**History:** In 2005, Wellfield Botanic Gardens was established by the Elkhart Rotary as part of its centennial project. Wellfield supplies the city of Elkhart with 70% of its drinking water to this day.

Wellfield is always changing, as gardens do, and has something to offer visitors in every season. If you love early spring blooms, take a walk through our Woodland Conservation Garden in April and May to catch many spring ephemerals carpeting the ground. Summer brings a bounty of blooms with the perennials in our Water Celebration Garden and English Cottage Garden. The many different species and varieties in our rose collection put on a show throughout the summer months. Autumn provides many blooms like goldenrod, asters, and autumn crocus, as well as the rich hues of foliage change. Winter can be a beautiful time to visit our Japanesethemed Island Garden. The carefully pruned forms of our Niwaki pines truly stand out amidst the muted tones and stillness of the season.

Wellfield's major events, such as Groovin' in the Gardens, Taste of the Gardens, and the Winter Wonderland Holiday Lights, are made for all ages all year long. Wellfield also hosts monthly horticulture classes, quarterly trivia, and many art classes throughout all seasons.

As a member of the American Horticulture Society, Wellfield honors reciprocal memberships all over the country. Wellfield members travel all over the country to access this special benefit as well!

# 4-H CHILDREN'S GARDEN PROGRAM RECAP

THEY ENJOYED FIELD TRIPS EXPLORING BOTH THE OUTDOOR GARDEN AND THE BUTTERFLIES.
