There will be 5 in person YQCA (Youth for the Quality Care of Animals) sessions and during the 1 online version in 2025-2026. This is a requirement for all youth, ages 8-18, who will bring livestock to the Kalamazoo County Youth Fair 2026. There are two options- take 1 of the 5 face-to-face sessions or take the online session. The face-to-face sessions will be a minimum of 1 hour and the cost is \$3.00 per youth. The face-to-face version is meant to include all youth 8 – 18 years old. 19 yr old and above will need to take the online version. The online version is \$12.00 and the curriculum is *age specific*. This certification is good for one year. There need to be a minimum of 5 youth signed up to hold a face-to-face class. The face-to-face sessions will be held on the following dates and times:

Jan 22 – 6:30 pm
Feb 26 - 6:30 pm
March 4 - 6:30 pm
April 18 - 10 am
June 4 - 6:30 pm

All certificates are due to the 4-H office no later than noon on July 1, 2026

Youth who would like to take the face-to-face session will need to do the following:

- Parents will need to create a **family** profile on <https://yqcaprogram.org/>
- Parents will need to assure each child showing at fair is added and chose the face-to-face training option.
- Pay the \$3.00 registration fee.
- Youth will need to complete the pre-test.
- Once the youth has taken the face-to-face session, staff will mark your session as complete.
- **Youth will need to log back in and take the post test** (found under the child's name and a drop down that says Enrolled ILT trainings).
- Once the post test is complete the youth's certificate will be sent.

Youth who would like to take the online session will need to do the following:

- Parents will need to create a **family** profile on <https://yqcaprogram.org/>
- Parents will need to assure each child showing in the fair is added and chose the online training session.
- Pay the \$12.00 registration fee.
- Youth will then need to complete the course.

Once the youth have completed either the online session or the face-to-face session and have received their certificate, the certificate will need to be emailed to msue.kalamazoo@msu.edu by July 1, 2025.

Mini Horses

Miniature horses can be coined mischievous or "naughty" due to their intelligence, big personalities packed into small bodies, and "toddler energy" with behaviors like nipping, being pushy, or acting dominant. They are generally very gentle, eager to please, and affectionate when properly trained and handled like a full-sized horse, not just a cute pet.

Why they can seem naughty?

Big personality: They have big attitudes in tiny bodies, often displaying strong emotions and playful antics, sometimes compared to toddlers.:)



Intelligence & instinct: Their smarts can lead them to test boundaries or take advantage of situations, like a strong self-preservation instinct.

Social dynamics: They can be pushy or assertive with other horses, sometimes showing dominance. I mean, it's hard to look tough otherwise when you are up to your pasture mates knee size.

Misguided kindness: Hand-feeding treats can teach them to nip or bite hands. This can also be said of full size horses. Be careful of hand feeding and other HUMAN taught rude behaviors. Just because they are pint sized, it's still not acceptable.

How to manage those tiny equine behaviors:

Train them like big horses!!! : Don't let their small size fool you. They need consistent handling, discipline, and training to respect personal space.

Avoid hand-feeding: This prevents them from associating hands with food and learning to nip.



Provide structure: Working them regularly with grooming, in-hand leading, or driving helps channel their energy and keeps them focused.

Just like their larger counterparts, purpose is important. Lack of use/attention/short cuts= naughty behavior.

Just like your full size horse when you were wondering why they behave a certain way, give it a second thought. Who allowed the behavior? It doesn't take many times to turn it into a pattern.

Set goals this New year for consistency and accountability on both sides of the pasture fence!

We are happy to announce that this spring States' 4-H are offering another round of the **Spring Pen Pal Program!** They are currently working to recruit international youth, but please mark your calendar for the below dates.

- **Program Dates**
 - **March 1:** US registration opens
 - **April 1 - June 1:** Pen pal program runs with weekly emails
- **Age:** Participants must be between the ages of 9 – 18 as of April 1, 2026.
- **Frequency:** participants will be expected to send one email/letter weekly for the duration (approximately 10 emails/letters). There will be weekly discussion topics to help get the conversation going, but these are only suggestions.
- **Regular Email Schedule Between Participants:** For example, international students send emails to their U.S. partners every Monday, and U.S. students reply every Friday.
- **Cost:** \$10 USD that can be paid online only.
- **Registration deadline:** Friday, March 20, 2026, or when all spots are filled.

Poultry Project News



It's time to start thinking about market birds for 2026!

The market project is making a big change this year. The Feed Bag in Richland is closing and will no longer be handling our bird ordering and distribution. This will change how you order and pick up birds. The biggest change is that you will now pay for your birds when you order them. Birds will still be picked up in Richland but at Cherie's house, instead of a store.

Things to know:

Birds typically arrive on **Tuesdays**. Occasionally they don't arrive until **Wednesday**. You must be available the date of pickup to get your birds. The exception to this is the roaster chickens. The earliest they will arrive is Wednesday, May 27 due to the holiday weekend. If you order **roasters**, you may need to be available on **Thursday, May 28** as well in case the shipment is delayed.

Order forms will be available at poultry meetings, on the poultry Facebook page, and will be emailed out to those in the project. It is also available here :

There will also be a table at the all-species meeting in January where you can order your birds. **February 16 will be the last day that you can order your birds for the 2026 fair.**

WORKSHOP 1 DESCRIPTION:

Amaze Your Friends With Magic- Come and learn several easy magic tricks that will amaze your friends and family.

Michigan 4-H Youth Code of Conduct

The opportunity to participate in or attend 4-H activities is a privilege. All 4-H participants – youth, families, volunteers, and Extension staff who participate in or attend any activity or event sponsored by the Michigan State University Extension 4-H Youth Development Program are expected to uphold the values of the Michigan 4-H program.

All 4-H youth participants must conduct themselves according to the following standards that apply to all Michigan 4-H programs, including virtual programs, and interactions such as social media and internet engagement-

1. Create a Welcoming Environment for All. Encourage everyone to fully participate in 4-H. Recognize that all people have skills and talents that can help others and improve the community. Though we will not always agree, we must disagree respectfully. When we disagree, try to understand why. Our first priority is to create a safe, inclusive space for learning, sharing and collaboration that is welcoming to people from diverse backgrounds, cultures, and perspectives. Diversity includes, but is not limited to race, color, national origin, gender, gender identity, religion, age, height, weight, disability, political beliefs, sexual orientation, marital status, family status or veteran status.

2. Bring Your Best Self. Conduct yourself in a manner that reflects honesty, integrity, self-control, and self-direction. Accept the results and outcomes of 4-H activities and programs with grace and empathy for other participants. Accept the final opinions of judges and evaluators. Be open to new ideas, suggestions, and opinions of others.

3. Obey the Law. Obey the laws of the locality, state and nation and Michigan State University and Extension policies and guidelines. Commit no illegal acts. Do not possess, offer to others, or use alcohol, illegal drugs, marijuana, or tobacco products, which include e-pens, e-pipes, e-hookah, e-cigars, JUULs, vapes, vape pens or other electronic nicotine delivery systems. Do not attend 4-H activities under the influence of alcohol or illegal substances. Do not possess or use weapons or firearms except as expressly permitted as part of supervised 4-H shooting sports programming. This includes dangerous or unauthorized materials such as explosives or similar items.

4. Honor Diversity – Yours and Others'. Respect and uphold the rights and dignity of all persons with whom you interact as part of Michigan 4-H.

5. Create a Safe Environment. Be kind and compassionate toward others. Be considerate and courteous of all persons and their property. Do not carelessly or intentionally harm or intimidate anyone in any way (verbally, mentally, physically, or emotionally). Do not insult, harass, or bully others or engage in other hostile behaviors, including sexual harassment, sexual assault or sexual abuse. Abstain from sexual behavior and intimate physical/sexual contact in either public or private situations at an MSU Extension youth 4-H activity or event.

6. Be a Team Player. Work cooperatively with all individuals involved in 4-H programs and activities. Be responsive to the reasonable requests of the person in charge such as volunteers and staff. Respect the integrity of the group and the group's decisions.

7. Humane Treatment of Animals. Treat animals humanely and provide appropriate animal care.

8. Participate Fully. Participate in and contribute to planned programs, be on time and follow through on assigned tasks/responsibilities in a manner that fosters the safety, well-being, and quality of the educational experience for self and others.







During the program, youth work in small teams to draft legislation on: agriculture; civil rights and youth advocacy; crime and law enforcement; education and teacher retention; environment and natural resources; health; and jobs, the economy and infrastructure.

Apply for the Michigan 4-H State Awards!

Michigan 4-H true leaders ages 10 and older have an opportunity to be recognized for the great work they do in 4-H and develop their career skills by completing a state award application. A Michigan 4-H State Award is the highest honor bestowed on a Michigan 4-H member and provides an opportunity to receive recognition for their engagement in rich learning experiences that result in outstanding knowledge and life-skill development.

State award applications are divided into four categories: Mark of Excellence contest (10-11 years), junior state award (12-15 years), senior state award (16-19 years) and group awards (13-19 years). An Achievement Award was added last year for 18-19-year-olds. Each application and selection process varies, dependent on the applicant's age.
