

### **Lapeer County 4-H Members Sweep Statewide Contests**



The end of the summer season has been marked by outstanding achievements for Lapeer County 4-H youth. A dedicated group of talented young equestrians and sharpshooters brought home an impressive array of medals and ribbons from the Michigan 4-H State Horse Show and the Michigan 4-H State Shooting Sports Tournament.







Rowan Conley, Isabel Craig, and Alivia Krajenta captivated judges and spectators alike during the Michigan 4-H State Horse Show held at the Farm Bureau Pavilion in Lansing, August 14-17, 2025. Conley, a member of North Branch Finishline Livestock 4-H Club, placed Fifth in Ranch Riding, First in Reining, and First in Ranch Trail before moving on to the Champions Class and Placing Top Five. Craig, a member of Flying Hooves 4-H Club, placed Fourth in Showmanship, First and Top Five in Huntseat Equitation, Second and Reserve Grand Champion in Horsemanship, and Second and Grand Champion in Hunter Under Saddle. Krajenta, a member of Equestrian Connection 4-H Club, placed Eighth in the Photography Contest, Seventh in Pole Bending, Eighth in Cloverleaf Barrel, Second and Reserve Grand Champion in Down and Back, and First and Reserve Grand Champion in Indiana Flag Race.

Earlier in the month, 4-H members from the Hot Shots 4-H Club earned recognition for their skills at the Michigan 4-H State Shooting Sports Tournament held on August 2 at the Saginaw Field and Stream Club in Saginaw. Among the local victors were Lapeer County 4-H Members, Albert Pearsall, Iris Fagerlie, Georgianna Annabel, Leevii Turrell, Isaiah Seidell, Aurora Marcotte, and Ben Selaty. In the individual .22 Field Rifle competition, Pearsall placed First, taking Second was Fagerlie, and in the team division, Pearsall, Fagerlie, and Selaty placed Third. In the individual Archery unsighted competition, Marcotte placed Second. From the Muzzleloading Open competition, Annabel took First, and Turrell placed second. In the team division, Annabel and Turrell placed First. Seidell brought home First in the Muzzleloading traditional competition.

Additionally, earlier this year, 4-H members participated in a Meats Judging contest in Lansing on May 7 at the MSU Meats Lab. The senior team placed fifth. Individually, Rowan Conley placed 6th in the senior division and Zoey Suszko placed third in the junior division. Ivanna Castro also completed the contest as an 8 year old!

These victories are not merely a reflection of the members' abilities but also of the tireless efforts of their club leaders and volunteers.

Community Accelerators is a dynamic track at Ignite where teens learn to drive change at the local level through social entrepreneurship, service learning, and community-based problem solving. Teens come together to collaborate, share ideas, and develop innovative solutions for real-world challenges—creating transformative progress that benefits all communities. By harnessing their creativity and passion, participants become catalysts for meaningful, lasting change.

#### Scholarships are available to Michigan 4-H members!

Thanks to support from the Michigan 4-H Foundation and National 4-H Council, Michigan 4-H will be providing financial need-based scholarships to a limited number of Michigan teens who would like to participate in the Community Accelerators track at the 2026 Ignite by 4-H event.

Those selected for scholarships will receive a complimentary ticket to Ignite (valued at \$1,350) which includes meals and hotel lodging. Flights and travel from Michigan to Washington D.C. will be arranged and paid for by Michigan 4-H (valued at \$650 per person). Adult Michigan 4-H staff members will travel with the Michigan delegation to the conference and serve as chaperones for the group.

Those selected for a financial need-based scholarship will be responsible for paying a \$200 registration fee in order to participate in Michigan's delegation to the event. (Some county 4-H programs may have funds available to cover the \$200 registration fee. Please check with your local 4-H Program Coordinator for more information.)

- Complete enrollment in Michigan 4-H for the 2025/2026
   4-H program year
- Have a desire to develop leadership skills and to champion a leadership project within their community, county, and/or state
- Plan a community-service activity and submit a "Lead to Change" project application after the conference.

#### Michigan 4-H license plate now available!

Michigan drivers have a new way to show their 4-H pride while supporting 4-H youth development programming: through the purchase of the newly released <u>Michigan 4-H</u> license plate. Available at the Michigan Secretary of State, the plate prominently displays the signature 4-H clover and part of the proceeds from every sale and renewal will go to support Michigan 4-H youth.

"We are elated that the Michigan 4-H license plate is officially here," said Quentin Tyler, director of Michigan State University Extension, which is home to the Michigan 4-H program. "We hope the many members of our Michigan 4-H community –youth, parents, alumni and supporters – will consider supporting 4-H by purchasing a plate as they renew their licenses this year."



Similar to other special cause fundraising license plates in the state, the Michigan 4-H license plate will cost \$35, with \$25 of the purchase fee benefiting Michigan 4-H Youth Development. A \$10 fee will also be charged to benefit Michigan 4-H when the plate is renewed. License plates may be ordered by visiting Michigan.gov/sos, by mailing in a form or scheduling a visit to any Secretary of State office. The plate will be delivered by mail in two to three weeks.

The Michigan 4-H State Awards Program is open to 4-H members who are 12-19 years old with two or more years of 4-H experience. To qualify, 4-H'ers must submit a written application that showcases the learning experiences, knowledge and skills they've acquired through 4-H, as well as their contributions to 4-H communities. Submissions are reviewed by a selection committee. In addition to a plaque, each 4-H State Award winner in the senior division received a \$300 cash award, junior winners received \$100 cash awards, and achievement award winner received \$500. These awards are made possible by generous donations to the Michigan 4-H Foundation.

#### Safe food for 4-H events

Food safety is important when hosting food events or fundraisers. A new fact sheet, *Safe Food for 4-H Events*, was created to provide education and resources for 4-H staff, volunteers and youth who are coordinating and participating in 4-H food fundraisers or events. ### Going home: Biosecurity tips for animals that travel off the farm

Animals that are exhibited at the county fair, jackpot shows, and other exhibitions are likely near and dear to their exhibitor's hearts.

<u>Michigan State University Extension</u> offers these biosecurity steps exhibitors can take to protect their show animals and those that were left at home once the event has ended.

- Keep animals that left home separate from animals that did not for a minimum of 14 days. If at all possible, do not allow nose-to-nose contact and provide as much distance between animals.
- Disinfect all buckets, feeders, tools and footwear that left home.
- Throw away any feed or hay that left home.
- Always wear clean clothes and footwear. Boot coverings may be helpful when caring for isolated animals.
- Take care of animals that stayed home from the show first, and animals that were at the show second. Do not go back and forth between animals as this increases the risk of cross-contamination.
- Do not eat or drink in the barn.
- Observe animals daily for signs and symptoms of illness, such as:
  - · Obvious pain or discomfort
  - · Decrease in appetite and water intake
  - Fever
  - Letharqy
  - Diarrhea or changes in consistency in manure
  - · Discharge from nasal cavity or eyes
  - · Overall weakness

Care of animals after traveling is just as critical as their pre-show care. Exhibited animals were exposed to new animal populations and fair-goers, and will typically experience a lot of stress during their time away from home. By practicing these biosecurity steps, you can help keep all of your animals safe and healthy.
