Reflecting on the Kingdom of God

Pay close attention now: I'm creating new heavens and a new earth. All the earlier troubles, chaos, and pain are things of the past, to be forgotten. Look ahead with joy. Anticipate what I'm creating: I'll create Jerusalem as sheer joy, create my people as pure delight. I'll take joy in Jerusalem, take delight in my people: No more sounds of weeping in the city, no cries of anguish; No more babies dying in the cradle, or old people who don't enjoy a full lifetime; Onehundredth birthdays will be considered normal

anything less will seem like a cheat.

Reflecting on the Kingdom of God

They'll build houses and move in. They'll plant fields and eat what they grow. Defining Charitable Food

- History

Character/Nature of Charitable Food

- Transactional
- Reactionary
- Relief-oriented
- Need-based

Comparing Kingdom and Charitable Food

- Equitable systems vs. transactional systems
- Perpetuated by abundance vs. scarcity





Addressing the Disparities

- Evaluating ministries and programs against theology and values
- Food asset mapping
- Asset Based Community Development
- Relief to Development orientation





Relief

- Relief (doing for)
 - Provide temporary, short term assistance
 - Examples:
 - Soup kitchen, clothes closet, holiday food basket





Betterment

- Betterment (doing for)
 - Create positive caring beneficial environment and relationships that offer respite or a positive experience
 - Examples:
 - Food pantry, health clinic, tutoring



Empowerment

- Empowerment (Development)
 - Focuses on measured changes in knowledge, skills, abilities or conditions of the participants and where they take responsibility for change.
 - Examples:
 - Job placement, thrift store, food co-op, community growing projects



Systems Change

- Systemic Change
 - Focuses on the systemic issues that create injustice
 - Examples:
 - Lobbying for/against policies, implementing Policy,
 Systems, and Environmental change, community organizing



Systems Change

- Involves recognizing systems of oppression
 - Systemic & institutionalized racism
 - Marginalization & disenfranchisement





Catching the Vision

- Good Food System values
 - Growers satisfied in the work of their hands
 - Creation is cared for and stewarded well by all
 - Neighbors plant and eat and are nourished
