

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## History

#### 2006 - 2008

Detroit Black Community Food Security Network and Detroit residents create Food Security Policy; City Council accepts policy and establishes DFPC by unanimous resolution

### 2009

DFPC begins meeting as all-volunteer organization drawing from all aspects of food system, government and at-large members

#### 2011

DFPC hires first staff

### 2015

Community engagement and research process begins for Food Security Policy Update

### 2016

Policy completed and approved by DFPC

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




## Effects of an Inadequate Diet

- Tracking and monitoring the scale and urgency of interventions related to diet-related health problems
- Support opportunities for community members to produce food, prepare meals and preserve their harvest together.



## Food System Economics



- Economic Development throughout the food system
- Support recommendations of the Economic Analysis of Detroit's Food System
  - Go-to food system organization
  - Access to capital
  - Workforce development



## Urban Agriculture

- Development and implementation of more comprehensive, fair, transparent and easily understandable land use processes.
- Supporting the urban livestock ordinance and Urban Livestock Guild
- Affirm importance of marginalized communities engaged in this work.
- Economic development: Encourage local procurement and sustainable wages for growers.

## Schools and Other Public Institutions

- School gardens and local procurement must be part of district policy.
- Advocate for retaining the improved meal standards for school meals and community eligibility provisions.
- Local institutions can boost Detroit's growing food economy by setting targets for local procurement.




## Citizen Education

- Subject matter experts are working with DFPC staff to create toolkits addressing issues such as land acquisition for food uses and food business resources.
- DFPC builds relationships and collaborations on matters that concern the food sector to provide relevant, accurate and upto-date information.
- What About Food? Film Screening and Discussion Series engages experts in the field and community members with important aspects of the food system.



## **Emergency Response**

- Creation of a food emergency plan that includes strategies for prevention of food emergencies, in partnership with the City of Detroit Office of Homeland Security.
- Citizens can access Community Emergency Response Team training through the City of Detroit to serve as a first responder in their own neighborhoods.
- Adequate food and water reserves in case of an emergency must be identified and developed, as should multiple access routes to deliver them.





### Land Use

- Meeting with various stakeholders to establish content and priorities
