BYLAWS of MONROE COUNTY FAIR ASSOCIATION

A Michigan Non-profit Corporation (As Revised December 12, 2019)

ARTICLE I - MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. ELIGIBILITY

Any individual person (not legal entity) who is a resident of Monroe County, Michigan, has attained the age of eighteen (18) years, pays into the treasury of the Association, at a time and in an amount and manner as prescribed by these Bylaws and subscribes to the Articles of Association and Bylaws of the Monroe County Fair Association, shall be a member therein and entitled to all the privileges and immunities thereof.

SECTION 2. MEMBERSHIP AND FEES

- (a) <u>Annual Membership</u> Any eligible individual may obtain an annual membership of the Association by applying to the Association's secretary, manager or their designees for registration and payment of an annual membership fee. The fee for each annual membership shall be \$10.00 for each full or fractional part of a fiscal year of the Association. All annual memberships which are not previously renewed for the following year, shall automatically expire and be null and void at the close of the Association's last business day of October of each year. Annual memberships for any fiscal year may not be preregistered nor prepaid more than twelve (12) months in advance of such fiscal year's beginning and all fees shall be nonrefundable.
- (b) Life Memberships All members of the board of directors who are elected by the members of the Association shall become life members upon receipt by the Association of a life membership fee of \$25.00 ("director life member"). A spouse, widow or widower of such a director life member (present or former director) shall automatically and continue to be a life member without the payment of an additional membership fee. Life memberships are not assignable. All existing and new life memberships shall continue until terminated by death of the life member, except that a life membership established as a spouse of a director life member shall automatically terminate upon his or her divorce or legal separation from a director life member. All life members and their accompanied minor children (under age 18) shall be admitted to the fair of the Association without charge during the hours the public is admitted to the fairgrounds. Life membership passes or Monroe County 4-H passes for admission to the fair shall be only utilized by and valid for those to whom they are issued. Violation of this restriction may result in the revocation of any fraudulently used pass privileges in the discretion of the manager, which may be reinstated upon review and resolution of the Board. No persons shall become life members other than new board members, except upon special action and resolution of the board of directors.

ARTICLE II – MEETINGS OF THE ASSOCIATION'S MEMBERS

SECTION 1. MEMBERSHIP MEETINGS

- (a) <u>Annual Meetings.</u> An Annual meeting of the members of this Association for the election of directors and the conduct of such other business as may come before the meeting, shall be held each year as soon after the close of the fiscal year as conveniently possible at such time and place as shall be determined by the board of directors and stated in the notice of the meeting.
- (b) <u>Special Meetings.</u> Any special meetings of the members of this Association may be called and held at any time at such time and place as shall be designated by the board of directors or the president and secretary of the Association.

SECTION 2. NOTICE

Except as otherwise required by statute, written notice of the time, place, and purposes of meetings of the members of the Association, shall be given either personally or by mail, to each eligible member of record entitled to vote at such meeting, not less then ten (10) nor more than sixty (60) days before the date of the meeting.

SECTION 3. RECORD DATE

All members of the Association, annual or life, who have been members of record for at least thirty (30) consecutive days immediately preceding the date of an annual or special meeting shall be an eligible member of record entitled to receive notice of a meeting and vote at a meeting of the members of the Association.

SECTION 4. QUORUM

The presence of not less than 25 eligible members of the Association shall constitute a quorum for transaction of business at any meeting of the Association.

SECTION 5. VOTING

Each eligible member of record, annual or life, present at a meeting of the Association shall be entitled to one vote on each matter submitted for vote. Voting by mail, phone, proxy, or in advance is prohibited. When an action is to be taken by vote of the members, it shall be authorized by a majority of the votes cast by the members entitled to vote, unless a greater number is required by express requirement of statute, the Articles of Association or these Bylaws, except that directors shall be chosen by a plurality of votes cast.

ARTICLE III — BOARD OF DIRECTORS

SECTION 1. ELECTION

The property and affairs of this association shall be governed by a board of directors composed of thirty-six (36) elected individual persons who are residents of Monroe County, Michigan and have attained the age of eighteen (18) years. The directors shall be divided into three (3) classes of twelve (12) directors each, whose terms expire in the same year. The term expiration of each class of directors shall be staggered so as not to coincide with the term expiration of the other classes of directors. One-third (1/3) of the board is to be elected each year to hold office for a term of three (3) years and until their successors are duly elected and qualified. Vacancies on the board of directors caused by resignation or death shall be filled by the affirmative vote of a majority of a quorum of the remaining members of the board to complete the unexpired term of the vacant board seat.

SECTION 2. DUTIES AND POWERS

The board of directors shall control, regulate, and manage all property, business and affairs of the Association, make or authorize to be made all necessary contracts, purchases, and expenditures, engage, direct and discharge a manager who shall not be a member of the board of directors, to whom they may delegate authority and duties, administer and enforce the Association's Articles, Bylaws, rules, and policies, and shall have such other and further powers as are usually inherent in a board of directors and as may be provided for in these Bylaws and the Articles of Association. It shall be the duty of the board of directors to reasonably safeguard the interest of the Association's members, directors, managers, employees, agents, volunteers, and property through insurance or otherwise, against injuries, damages, losses or other liabilities arising from casualty or through the acts of omissions of the Association, its members, directors, managers, employees, agents, and volunteers. It shall be the duty of each member of the board of directors to assist in any way possible to promote the best interests of the Association.

SECTION 3. BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETINGS

(a) <u>Annual Meetings.</u> Within sixty (60) days after each annual meeting of the members of the Association, the then acting president shall call

the annual (first regular) meeting of the members of the board of directors. If a quorum is present, the meeting shall proceed to the election of officers and organization of an executive board of directors for the ensuing year.

(b) <u>Regular or Special Meetings</u>. Subsequent to the annual meeting, regular or special meetings of the board of directors may be called at such time and place as determined by the board of directors or as the president and secretary shall designate.

SECTION 4. NOTICE

Except as otherwise may be required by statute, five (5) days advance written notice of all regular or special meetings of the board of directors shall be personally delivered, or mailed through the U.S. Postal Service to the address of record of each board member, or e-mailed to those providing e-mail address and consenting to notice by e-mail, provided, however, that if all board members who did not receive proper or timely notice are present in person at the subject meeting, their attendance shall constitute a waiver of the notice of any such board meeting, and said board meeting may proceed in the same manner as if proper notice had been given.

SECTION 5. QUORUM

The presence of a majority of the members of the board of directors at any duly called and noticed meeting, shall constitute a quorum for transaction of business. If no quorum is present, the meeting shall adjourn to meet at some future date.

SECTION 6. VOTING

The act of a majority of the directors present at any duly called and noticed meeting at which there is a quorum shall be the act of the board of directors unless the vote of a larger number is specifically required by statute, the Articles of Association, or these Bylaws. Each director shall be entitled to one vote.

SECTION 7. RESIGNATION

A director may resign by written notice to the Association. Such resignation is effective upon its receipt by the Association or at a subsequent time or condition as set forth in the notice of resignation.

SECTION 8. ATTENDANCE

At every board of directors meeting the roll call shall be called by the Secretary to make a record and establish the presence of an adequate quorum at the meeting. Each director's attendance shall be recorded as either "Present", "Excused" or "Absent". A record of meeting attendance shall be kept, but no consequences for accumulated absences will be rendered. A director may be "Excused" if he or she notified another member of the board of his or her conflict or unavailability and such notified director is present and announces such at the time of roll call at the subject meeting.

SECTION 9. REMOVAL

Except as otherwise provided above, a director, or the entire board may only be removed from office prior to the expiration of his or her term, with just cause, by an affirmative vote of two-thirds (2/3) of the then eligible members of record of the Association, or with just cause, by an affirmative vote of a majority of the members of the board of directors.

The executive officers of the Association shall be chosen by the board of Directors at its annual (first regular) meeting after each annual meeting of shareholders and shall be a president, vice-president, secretary and treasurer. All of these officers shall be members of the board of directors.

SECTION 2. OTHER OFFICERS AND AGENTS

The board of directors may from time to time appoint such other officers and agents as it shall deem necessary, who shall hold their offices for such terms and shall exercise such powers and perform such duties as shall be determined from time to time by the board.

SECTION 3. TERM

The Association's executive officers shall hold office for one (1) year until the next succeeding annual meeting of the board of directors, and until their successors are elected and qualified, except that all officers and agents of the Association shall hold office at the pleasure of the board of directors. Any officer or agent elected or appointed by the board of directors may be removed at any time by the board of directors with or without cause, effective upon delivery of written notice. Any vacancy occurring in any office of the Association by death, resignation, removal or otherwise shall be filled by the board of directors. An officer or agent may resign by written notice to the Association. The resignation is effective upon its receipt or at a subsequent time or condition specified in the notice of resignation.

SECTION 4. PRESIDENT

The president shall be the chief executive officer of the Association, shall preside over meetings of the members of the Association, meetings of the board of directors and meetings of the executive board, shall see that all directives, policies and resolutions of the board of directors are carried into effect and shall execute on behalf of the Association all instruments requiring such execution, except to the extent he may expressly delegate the signing and execution thereof to someone else. The President shall be an ex-officio member of all committees.

SECTION 5. VICE-PRESIDENT

The vice-president shall act under the direction of the president and in the absence of the president shall perform the duties and exercise the powers of the president. He shall perform such other duties and have such other powers as the board of directors may from time to time prescribe.

SECTION 6. SECRETARY

The secretary shall record or cause to be recorded, the proceedings of all meetings of the Association, board of directors, and executive board, keep accurate records of such proceedings, and read them to the body when called for by the presiding officer. The secretary shall be the custodian of the books and records of the Association which are not under the charge of another officer, shall give, or cause to be given, notice of all meetings of the members and meetings of the board of directors and shall keep a complete list of the Association's members and board of directors and record their attendance at the meetings. The secretary shall assist the president and other officers in arrangements for meetings and call meetings to order when both president and vice-president are absent.

SECTION 7. TREASURER

The treasurer shall be the official custodian of the Association's funds, however the day to day business activities involving keeping of accurate accounts collecting receipts and making disbursements of the Association may be by others as the board of directors may from time to time prescribe. The Treasurer shall give a current financial report at the regular meetings of the board of directors and the annual meetings of the members. The Treasurer, and any other officer, director or employee as the executive board or board of directors may from time to time prescribe, shall provide to the Association, at the expense of the Association, a surety bond of sufficient amount as from time to time determined by the executive board or board of directors.

SECTION 8. EXECUTIVE BOARD

The Association's executive board shall consist of the president, vicepresident, secretary, treasurer, immediate past president and manager.

They shall meet on the call of the president without written notice required. They are authorized to take final action on only such matters as when circumstances and time will not permit approval by the full board of directors, and such matters shall be presented to the full board at the next meeting for the board's information and acknowledgement. They shall review, study and discuss the needs, operations, problems, proposals, requests, and other day to day business affairs of the Association and pass such on to the full board with their recommendation as to any action to be taken. They shall review and give any recommendations regarding the monthly and annual financial reports of the treasurer to be presented to the board of directors and members of the Association. They shall keep, through the secretary, a complete record of all minutes and actions of all meetings and report such in full to the board of directors at the first meeting of the full board following their meeting. They shall cause an annual audit to be completed by a certified public accountant and a report therefrom to be presented at the annual meeting of the Association. They shall pursue, conduct and take all other actions directed or authorized by the full board of directors. They shall conduct an annual review of the manager's job performance on an annual basis during the first four (4) months of the fiscal year. They shall make assignments and/or appointments of personal gear, tools, transportation, communication and other equipment to board members and/or employees during the Association's fair and other times of need.

SECTION 9. MANAGER

The manager is selected and hired by the Board of Directors. He or she shall carry out all directives by and work under the supervision of the executive board and full board of directors. He or she shall handle all problems needs, proposals, requests, and other day to day business affairs of the Association and/or present them to the executive board and full board as appropriate. He or she shall oversee, supervise and coordinate all operations of the Association's fair and other activities as directed by the board of directors. The board of directors may from time to time adopt and prescribe further job duties and responsibilities of the manager.

SECTION 10. GENERAL

The officers and manager of the Association shall, unless otherwise prescribed by the board of directors, have all such powers and shall discharge the duties customarily and usually held and performed by like officers of this Association and other corporations or associations similar in organization and business purposes to this Association, as well as such powers and duties as may be set forth in these Bylaws, or may from time to time be specifically conferred or imposed by the board of directors. The board of directors may from time to time adopt policies and directives further prescribing duties, responsibilities, and procedures for the operation of the Association.

ARTICLE V - COMMITTEES

The President in his discretion, unless otherwise resolved by the board of directors, shall establish all appropriate committees of the Association and appoint members of the Association, members of the board of directors and/or other non-member or non-director volunteers with an interest in contributing, to such committees. A committee shall have only such powers and authority designated to it by the President within the limits of the President's own authority, unless otherwise authorized by the full board. A committee's purpose is generally, but not necessarily always, to organize, meet, discuss, review, study and develop a recommendation concerning an issue, operation, project or proposal for the benefit of the Association, or to operate, oversee, manage, or conduct certain key functions on behalf of the Association. All committee members shall serve at the will of the President without compensation.

ARTICLE VI - FISCAL YEAR

The fiscal year of this Association shall begin each year on the first day of November and end on the last day of the next succeeding October.

ARTICLE VII – RULES OF ORDER

All meetings of this Association shall be conducted pursuant to Robert's Rules of Order as may be revised, as interpreted by the presiding officer at such meetings, unless otherwise determined or mandated by statute, the Articles of Association, the Bylaws, or resolution of the board of directors.

ARTICLE VIII - COMPENSATION

Unless otherwise authorized by the board of directors, no wages, salary or other compensation shall be paid to any person or entity as a result of their effort, time, contributions, duties, or service to the Association as a member of the Association, Board of Directors, Executive Board, or Officer. The manager shall be compensated commensurate with his or her qualifications and responsibilities as from time to time determined by the board of directors.

ARTICLE IX - JUNIOR BOARD MEMBERS

The board of directors may from time to time in their discretion, establish a special junior fair board class of the board of directors, to participate and assist the board of directors with the operations of the Association. If established, such junior board membership would comprise of only Monroe County resident individuals who are less than

eighteen (18) years of age at the time of their appointment. Their input, ideas, opinions, concerns, and participation in the activities of the regular board of directors would be welcome and encouraged, however, they shall not vote on or have any management authority over any affairs of the Association. The members of any junior fair board shall be appointed by the full board of directors. Formal policies, rules and/or conditions shall be established and may be revised by the board from time to time to set forth further formalities such as, the number of junior board members, qualifications for membership, length of term, attendance, committee participation, and other requirements, and conditions. If established, the junior board program may be altered or terminated at any time in the discretion of the board.

ARTICLE X – AMENDMENTS

These Bylaws may be amended upon affirmative vote of two-thirds (2/3) of the eligible voting members present at any annual meeting of the members of the Association held after giving at least thirty (30) days written notice of the meeting and a summary of the proposed alterations or amendments.

 representation of the Monroe County Fair and Monroe County Fair Kick-off Parade as deemed by the Monroe
 County Fair Parade Committee.
- 2. Only one (1) vehicle per person or organization.
- 3. Only one (1) farm implement piece allowed per dealer.
- 4. Antique cars must be at least 25 years old.
- 5. Only one (1) float/entry per political party. Only parties listed on the 2024 November ballot allowed.
- 6. Individual political candidates / elected officials (except for elected US Legislators) should walk/ride with their political party/float.
- 7. Political signs, banners, slogans are not allowed on any parade unit except for those under Rule 6.
- 8. No motorbikes, unicycles or bicycles of any type are permitted.
- 9. Derby Cars must be registered and approved for the parade through Shalene Williams at Marcum Racing (734) 206-4172 or email swilliams@marcumracing.com.
- 10. Participants may not STOP to perform while marching.
- 11. For safety concerns, absolutely no throwing of candy, however walkers can hand out candy or other material alongside their unit. Persons violating this rule will be asked to leave the parade.
- 12. Operate vehicles safely and cautiously and keep sirens and honking horns to a minimum.
- 13. Entries with signature must be received by July 11, 2025.
- 14. Confirmation and parade details will be mailed to all registered entries after July 11, 2025.

OVER FOR RULES AND SUBMISSION DETAILS

RULES GOVERNING ENTRIES, EXHIBITS AND AWARDS

Section 1. — General

- The Board of Management reserves the final and absolute right
 to interpret these rules and regulations and to arbitrarily settle
 and determine all matters, questions or differences in regard
 thereto. It further reserves the right to amend or add to these
 rules as in its judgment it may determine, to withdraw all or
 pay in part, premium offerings in all departments should an
 emergency exist and circumstances demand it.
- 2. Disregard of any rule by exhibitor or concessionaire forfeits all premiums, rights and privileges without recourse.
- 3. The management will use diligence to insure the safety of livestock and articles entered for exhibition of display after their arrival on the grounds, but under no circumstances will it be responsible for loss, injury or damage by fire, lightning, wind or any other agency, to such livestock, article on exhibition or display, and the Fair management thereof shall be indemnified by the exhibitors against all legal or other proceedings relating thereto.
- Exhibitors must place all exhibits under the direction of the secretary-manager or superintendent in charge.
- 5. All bedding for stalls and pens must be supplied by the exhibitor. Exhibitors will be permitted to bring into grounds only a limited amount of feed, hay or straw, and the management reserves the right to refuse admission of such if, in their judgment there is an excessive amount. The space in the barns is for exhibition purposes and not for storage of feed.
- 6. Promiscuous advertising is strictly prohibited. Exhibitors may advertise and distribute from their places of exhibit only. The distribution of advertising matter that conflicts in any manner with a concession sold by the management is prohibited.
- No premiums will be paid on breed or articles not listed in catalog.
- 8. No exhibitor or concessionaire will be permitted to sublet or share any portion of the space allotted to him. A violation of this rule will result in the original purchaser of space forfeiting all his rights and the ejection of himself, partners, employees and wares from the grounds.
- All leases will be subject to "exclusive contracts" as may be made by the board of management.
- 10. In the event of conflict between the general rules and the special rules governing the various departments, the special rules take precedence.

Section 2 — Entries

- Application for entries in all departments must be made on the printed forms provided by the Secretary-Manager for that purpose and must be in full compliance with the printed instructions on same. The right is reserved to reject any entry offered.
- 2. All entries must be made in the name of the bonafide owner. In order that a permanent record be on file, it is essential that the name and record number or record number and ear tag number be given to all animals entered. Entries will not be accepted unless this information is furnished at time of making entry. All animals, regardless of age, must be recorded and appear in the name of the exhibitor on the records of their respective association on or before June 19th of the year in which exhibition is held. Each exhibitor will be required to present certificate of

- registration for entries when called upon to do so by the superintendent in charge of each department.
- Incomplete entries will be returned for correction when there is time to do so. Exhibitors are urged to enter early and to use great care in filling out entry blanks.
- Exhibitors of livestock will be mailed entry tags and parking passes.
- 5. All Entries are due to the Fair Office by June 1.
- 6. All exhibits must be in place by 9:00 A.M. opening day of the Fair unless otherwise stated in special rules of each department.
- All exhibitors are requested not to invite or permit judges to examine their animals in stall or pens before they enter the show ring.
- 8. Misrepresentation as to breeding or ownership of animals and irregularity or violation of rules in showing will be exposed, and the premium won by such exhibitor will be forfeited and if payment to exhibitor has been made before the evidence is given that such violation has occurred, the exhibitor must refund premium money so forfeited to the society or be barred from exhibition at the Monroe County Fair in the future.
- Any artificial means of removing or remedying defects by cutting and filling under the skin will be considered as fraud and deception. All animals giving evidence of such treatment will be barred from exhibition at the Monroe County Fair.
- 10. GENERAL RULES FOR LIVESTOCK
 - a. Both Open and 4-H. Entries only on respective Entry Forms — No open on 4-H form.
 - b. Animals are not allowed to crossover from Open Class to 4-H or from 4-H to Open Class.

LIABILITY FOR LOSS OR THEFT

While every reasonable precaution will be taken to safeguard exhibits, it is distinctly understood that in no way shall the Monroe County Fair Association, its management, officers or agents be held responsible for any loss or injury of any character to any person, animal or article while participating in or exhibited at the Fair.

Section 3 — Fees

- Exhibitors except life members and those entering in the 4-H
 Departments at any show held by this Association must pay an
 entry fee of not less than \$5.00. In the event the entry fee to be
 charged is in excess of \$5.00 in any department, the fee will be
 set forth in the rules of that department. Payment of the entry
 fee will entitle the exhibitor to enter any number of articles or
 animals for competition subject to the rules and regulations of
 the various departments.

Section 4 — Judges

- 1. Judges will be appointed by the Board of Management.
- Judges will in no case award a premium where there is no merit, though there be no competition; and in case of partial merit, second premium may be awarded, though no first premium may be given.

Section 5 — Awards

- 1. Premiums will be paid only on animals fitted for show purposes and no animal shall receive more than one prize in one class.
- Checks for all premiums will be MAILED as soon as possible after the close of the Fair.
- 3. PREMIUM CHECKS MUST BE CASHED WITHIN THIRTY DAYS FROM THE DATE THEREOF.
- Premium ribbons or cards have no value as to payment of premiums, since premiums are paid only from the records of the Judges' Books.
- ANY UNCASHED PREMIUM CHECK OVER 90 DAYS OLD WILL BE CONSIDERED A DONATION TO THE AWARD AND SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM.

Section 6 — Release

- Exhibits in all departments may be sold and removed from 2 to 6:30 p.m. Monday after fair, with the exception of livestock which is 6:00 a.m. to 9:00 am on Sunday after close of Fair. Haflingers to be released from 4 p.m. to 6 p.m. Wednesday evening. Draft horses released after midnight Saturday but not before without superintendent permission.
- 2. Livestock that is identified as ill, diseased, injured or dangerous can be released at the discretion of the Monroe County Fair designated Veterinarian or at the discretion of the Monroe County Fair General Livestock Superintendent and two other species superintendents. Exhibitors who violate the release rules will forfeit all premiums and awards won and will be banned from showing any livestock species for a period of two (2) years at the Monroe County Fair. In reference to small animals sold through the SAA auction, animals sold will be released to the buyers between 10:00 p.m. and 11:00 p.m. Saturday with proof of purchase.
- If the livestock rules adopted by the Monroe County Fair Association are in conflict with the Livestock rules printed in the Youth Division of the Monroe County Fair Premium Catalog the rules of the Monroe County Fair Association shall prevail.
- No article or exhibit may be removed other than above specified except on written permission of the Supt. of the Department and the Director of Livestock.

Section 7 — Protests and Appeals

- All protests must be made in writing and state the specific causes
 of the complaint or appeal accompanied by a protest fee of
 \$50.00 which will be retained by the Board of Management if
 protest is not sustained. Exhibitors have 10 days from the close
 of the fair to file the complaint or appeal with the Fair Office.
- All protests will be considered by the Board of Directors at the August or September meeting following each annual fair. The Board of Directors will then issue a notice recommending action on the findings.
- The Monroe County Fair is a member of the International Association of Fairs & Expositions and has adopted the rules and regulations of that Association governing appeals.
- An appeal may be made in writing to the MDA within 45 days of filing the initial complaint if the exhibitor is not satisfied with the association's action.

Section 8 — Livestock Inspection

- All animals for exhibition may be subject to examination by a veterinarian of the Bureau of Animal Industry, State Department of Agriculture, before entering the fairgrounds and must be free of any contagious, infectious or communicable disease. Approved health certificates may be required at the request of the State or Monroe County Fair Association.
- No animal will be given release card for stall assignment until this examination is made.
- The Board of Management reserves the right to refuse admission to any animal or animals originating from a herd whenever the status of health of the entire herd is questionable or suspicious.

Or, originate directly from a TB-free accredited herd and can provide documentation, or have a negative official test for bovine TB within 60 days prior to the fair.
- B. Entries will close June 1, Livestock entries will be received from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m., Saturday, July 26. Animals will not be released until the fair closes on Saturday evening. Release will be at the discretion of the Dairy Superintendent. EXHIBITOR WILL FORFEIT THE PREMIUM AWARDED ON ANY ANIMAL REMOVED BEFORE THIS TIME.
- C. All premiums will be paid by mail as soon as possible after the fair. Awards will be paid only on classes listed.
- D. All animals must be the property of the exhibitor at the time of entry.
- E. ALL PERSONS HAVING ENTRIES IN THIS DEPARTMENT MUST OBTAIN PERMISSION IN ORDER TO STAY ON THE GROUNDS AFTER CLOSING HOURS. THIS PERMISSION MAY BE OBTAINED FROM THE MANAGER, DARRYL DIAMOND, THE SUPERINTENDENT OF THE DAIRY CATTLE DIVISION, CHERYL SCHAFER.

- B. Very recently the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture announced an important new program to accelerate the eradication of the fatal brain disease scrapie from the nation's goat herds. In order to eradicate scrapie among goats, methods for identifying infected and exposed animals must be created. As a result, goats will be subjected to new identification requirements before they change ownership, enter into interstate commerce or attend exhibitions. All goats attending the 2002 Monroe County Fair and thereafter must have USDA or APHIS approved identification ear tags in place before being penned by the goat superintendent. Exception will be made for goats with legible registry tattoos or registration ear tags. A copy of their registry certificate or a health certificate listing their registration numbers must accompany such animals. Grade and registered goats that have accompanying TB certificates referencing the animal presented for exhibit will also be accepted.
- C. Awards will be given only on listed breeds and classes. Entries close **June 1st**.
- D. All persons having entries in this division must obtain permission in order to stay on the grounds after closing hours. This permission may be obtained from the Manager, Darryl Diamond.
- E. Passes The entry of one or more goats entitles the exhibitor to one pass for feeding purposes.

- F. All hay and grain shall be furnished by the exhibitor. Pens and animals must be cleaned and maintained regularly by the exhibitor.
- G. All animals must be dehorned unless exempt by breed standards, including scurs exceeding 2" in length.
- H. Each exhibitor will assume all risks in exhibiting.
- Pens for the goats will be assigned by the superintendent and any pen occupied without her order may be changed as she may direct. Animals will be accepted from 12:00-4:30 p.m. Saturday, July 26. Animals will be released Sunday, August 3 at 6:00 am.
- J. Does 2 years and over must have freshened at least once to show in the breed classes, with the exception of fiber animals. Does must have freshened 2 weeks prior to the fair or are not due to freshen until 2 weeks after the fair. Kids must be at least 2 weeks of age to come to fair.
- K. Exhibitors must have registration papers (50% or more) for all animals shown in proper breed classes, including registered Boar animals. Non registered dairy animals must show in "other dairy" class. Full unaltered copies or the original registration paperwork must be checked by the superintendent and entries must be in the owners name or family members name.
- L. Ages of dairy goats shall be figured from January 1st. An exhibitor may show a maximum of three (3) animals.
- M. Exhibitors may not show an animal exhibited in the 4-H category in the open class, no cross over animals, includes Produce of Dam class.
- N. Fiber animals will be judged 50% on the quality of their fleece and 50% on conformation, hoofs should be trimmed, hoofs and horns polished, nothing (including brushing) should be done to disturb the natural character of the fleece.



4-H YOUTH EXHIBITS GENERAL REGULATIONS

- NO TENT, AWNING OR ADDING ON DRESSING ROOM IN OR AROUND ANY LIVESTOCK BUILDING (Beef Fitting tents on Show Day ONLY)
- 2. All Exhibits must be from the current project year.
- 3. Mistakes in the fair checks must be reported to the 4-H or fair office before September 15th.
- Rules found in this premium list take preference over similar regulations appearing in publications published or revised previous to May 1, 2025.
- All entries must be in place according to Fair Program schedule at beginning of this catalog.
- 6. A member may exhibit only such articles or animals as pertain to the projects in which the member is enrolled.
- All market animals (beef, sheep and swine) must have been tagged by the Superintendent at the times specified for each species.
- 4-H Club members must register all Fair exhibits in Fair Entry by June 9, 2025 in order to be eligible for premiums and to show at fair.
- The exhibitors will be judged on the A.B.C basis. This method spreads the awards to a greater number of exhibitors rather than to a few individuals.
- 10. If, in the opinion of the judge, an exhibit does not merit a blue ribbon or an "A" group rating, the judge has the privilege of starting with ribbon or rating he decides upon.
- 11. No entry fee is required for project member exhibits, in any of the project classes. Pen fees are required for project members' exhibits:

- 12. Project members may also enter separate exhibits in the open classes by complying with all rules and regulations of classes in which they make entry. Open class entries close June 1st. Open Class Entries are submitted to the Fair Office.
- 13. Clubs will be limited to one entry in each club or class. Leaders should make entry for these classes in sections when advanced entry is required.
- 14. Non-livestock exhibits are released between 2:00 6:30 p.m. Monday, August 4, 2025.
- 15. Livestock exhibits are released Sunday, August 3, 2025 from 5:00 a.m. till 8:00 a.m. or as designated by the species Superintendent. Self-Haul may be released after the closing of Fair at species superintendent discretion.
- 16. No premium money will be paid on exhibits removed before release hours as listed.
- All projects must be picked up no later than the Post-Fair meeting. Unclaimed projects will be donated to charity or properly disposed of.
- 18. Each local leader of a 4-H club who has members exhibiting projects in any section may request a seasonal gate pass.

- Each project member exhibiting in any section will be given a season gate pass.
- All project work must be exhibited in space specified for the respective projects.
- All project members are expected to conduct themselves respectively while on the Monroe County Fairgrounds by being respectful of the rights of others and assuming their assigned responsibility.
- 22. Project members will be expected to comply with the suggestions of those in authority concerning location of exhibit, conduct and co-operation needed and by cheerfully assisting with the work necessary to improve the project exhibit.
- 23. The age a 4-H member is as of <u>January 1st of the current year is</u> the age that member is for the entire 4-H year. If they are 12 as <u>of January 1st and becomes 13 on January 5th</u>, they remain 12 for the entire 4-H year.
- 24. Youth who have a 4-H age of 5, 6 or 7 years of age, by January 1st of the current program year will be called "CLOVERBUDS". These members will be allowed to exhibit projects at fair, will have several activities they can participate in and will have their own recognition program. Classes have been designated as "CLOVERBUD" classes and only these can be exhibited by the 5, 6 or 7 year old members. These members will not be allowed to sell Livestock. "CLOVERBUDS" will not be judged, but rather evaluated and given a participation ribbon, they will also not be earning premiums. A special recognition program with "CLOVERBUD" awards will be held on Thursday, July 31, 2025 at 4:00 p.m. at the Show Arena.
- 25. 4-H Members are eligible to exhibit in the 4-H youth division at the fair in the calendar year in which a member attains the age of 8 minimum as of Jan. 1 and 19 maximum as of Jan. 1.
- 26. Trophies, ribbons and rosettes will be awarded for all places as listed for each class unless otherwise specified.
- 27. Protests must be made in writing and signed by the party(ies) making the protest. The protest must be filed at the 4-H Fair Office to the attention of the 4-H Program Coordinator in charge of that 4-H Division on the day of the complaint or incident. Any protest must also be accompanied by a \$50 fee which will be retained by the Monroe County Fair Association if the protest is not sustained.
 - Protests relating to the static exhibits must be filed within 24 hours after the opening of the fair. Protests concerning livestock exhibits must be filed within two (2) hours of the end of the livestock show in question.
- 28. The protest will then be heard by the Rules Interpretation Committee at a time and place set by the 4-H Fair Advisory Committee, with all parties invited.
- 29. The Rules Interpretation Committee will consist of the General Superintendent from the department being addressed, the 4-H Program Coordinator and a designated representative of the Monroe County Fair Association.
- 30. An exhibitor may file a complaint regarding
 - a. Conflict of interest of the judge
 - b. Disqualification of an exhibit or exhibitor
 - c. Exhibitor, group leader or superintendent behavior
 - d. Eligibility of the exhibit
- The Rules Interpretation Committee must provide a written ruling to all parties concerned within 30 days of the close of the fair.
- 32. If the exhibitor is not satisfied with the association's actions, the exhibitor may file an appeal to the Michigan Department of Agriculture within 45 days of filing the initial complaint. The department will have 60 days after receipt of any appropriately

- filed appeal, to investigate the complaint and issue a finding of fact and notice of department action. This will also include any recommended actions for the association
- 33. All 4-H members, Club leaders and Adult Advisors are reminded that you represent 4-H; and, as such, you are constantly in the public eye. This is especially true during fair week. Therefore, it is your responsibility to be neat and clean in your dress and appearance; and courteous and respectful in your manners at all times.
- 34. The following clothing and grooming standards are acceptable:
 - Clothing/grooming/footwear that is safe and/or suitable for the 4-H activity being undertaken by the member.
 - Clothing/grooming that reflects good personal hygiene.
- 35. The following clothing and grooming standards are not acceptable:
 - a. Clothing/grooming that illustrates or promotes alcohol, tobacco or drug products or the use of these products.
 - b. Clothing/grooming that emulates gang/street activity.
 - c. Clothing/grooming that promotes violence or criminal acts.
 - d. Clothing/grooming that is vulgar or otherwise suggestive.
- 36. Any questions concerning the appropriateness of dress and grooming shall be addressed to, and determined by, the 4-H Ext. Staff.. All determinations shall be made by considering the best interests of establishing and maintaining a safe, healthy and effective environment for the benefit of the 4-H Program and all program participants.
- 37. ALL PREMIUM CHECKS MUST BE CASHED WITHIN THIRTY DAYS FROM ISSUE DATE.
- 38. All auction checks will be issued at the Banquets or the Monroe County MSU Extension Office. NO JLA OR SAA AUCTION CHECKS WILL BE RELEASED OR MAILED PRIOR TO ASSOCIATIONS BANQUET.
- 39. Rosettes in the Non-Livestock areas will be presented on a 1 per 25 entries basis at the discretion of the judge, with a minimum of 1 per section
- 40. It is the aim of the Fair Association to assist the youth of Monroe County in making a good, creditable exhibit.
- 41. All projects containing or displaying alcohol, tobacco or sexually explicit images will not be accepted.
- 42. ALL exhibitor auction checks MUST be picked up AND cashed within **60** days from the JLA or SAA banquet, whichever is appropriate. Failure to pick-up and cash checks will result in funds being returned to JLA or SAA general fund.
- 43. ALL OPEN CLASS ENTRIES MUST BE ON FAIR OPEN CLASS FORMS NOT INCLUDED WITH 4-H REGISTRATIONS

GENERAL RULES FOR LIVESTOCK Both Open and 4-H

- NO TENT, UMBRELLAS, AWNINGS OR ADDING ON DRESSING ROOM IN OR AROUND ANY LIVESTOCK BUILDING.
- 2. An exhibitor is required to show their own animal.
- Market animals, which are not shown by their owner, cannot be sold in the market livestock sales.
- 4. Non-market livestock, including breeding and companion animals, which are not shown by their owner, will not be allowed to remain at the fair (except goats). At the conclusion of the show, the animal will be sent home, or to market, at the member's expense, no awards will be given and premiums withheld.
- A member is required to exhibit their own animal. In the event of extreme circumstances, such as illness, a death in the family, or an accident, the superintendent must be contacted, and an exception may be made.

- Scheduling conflicts, when a member must be available for two 4-H classes at the same time, should be brought to the superintendent's attention immediately, and an attempt to find a workable solution will be made.
- 7. 4-H animals will not be allowed to cross-over and enter the open classes with the same animal.
- Any drug/medicine must be administered in the presence of the Barn Superintendent. Documentation of the type of drug administered must be maintained by the exhibitor and superintendent. Any withdrawal period must be noted on the documentation.
- 9. Livestock that is identified as ill, diseased, dangerous or injured, or any other animals, can be released by the Monroe County Fair appointed veterinarian or by the majority vote of the following individuals: the superintendent of the species in question, two other species superintendents or assistant superintendents, or the Youth Division General Livestock Superintendent, Monroe County Fair Association General Livestock Superintendent, and the County 4-H Program Coordinator. Exhibitors who violate the release rules will forfeit all premiums and awards won and will be banned from showing any livestock species for a period of two (2) years at the Monroe County Fair. In reference to small animals sold through the SAA auction, animals sold will be released to the buyers after 6:00 am on Sunday with proof of purchase.
- All animals must be groomed, fitted and fed in barn. No animals are to leave the barn unless approved by superintendent.
- 11. Grooming/fitting can only be done by family members and/ or Monroe County 4-H species exhibitors past and present.
- 12. The Following Grooming Practices are PROHIBITED for all 4-H animals:
 - Any attempt to disrupt or change the normal dental development of the animal.
 - b. Any products administered internally or externally to alter the conformation of the animal.
 - No forced/drenched administration of fluids will be allowed.
- Infractions will be investigated by a committee composed of the County 4-H Program Coordinator, Species Superintendent, Large Animal Superintendent and representative of the Monroe County Fair Board.
- 14. It is MANDATORY that exhibitors of any market livestock (small or large animals) annually obtain a Youth for the Quality Care of Animals-YQCA-certificate in order to exhibit at the current year's Monroe County Fair. Failing to obtain this certificate will result in the exhibitor's inability to have any large or small animal entries present at that year's Monroe County Fair. In the case of a first year exhibitor in any species, that exhibitor is required to attend an in-person, species-specific workshop through the JLA and/or SAA, by June 9, 2025.

IAFE - CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

All Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and

livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

- All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership, and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
- Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
- Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
- 4. Animals shall be presented to show events, where they will enter the food chain free of volatile drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of, consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event.
- 5. If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the laboratory, to which it is sent, is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the same taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise.
- 6. At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.
- Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the

- animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
- The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
- 9. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
- 10. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
- 11. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
- 12. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be published with the name of the violator or violators in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including "Fairs and Expos:" and any special notices to members.
- 13. The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statues, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

MONROE COUNTY JUNIOR LIVESTOCK SHOW ASSOCIATION EXHIBIT RULES

Membership

All junior project members feeding, weighing in and exhibiting one or more market animals: beef, swine, or sheep, are automatically members of this Association for the project year. County policies regarding enrollment in college, time away from home and married members shall be respected by this Association.

Ownership Dates Required

Monroe County Fair youth exhibitors must have had their animals by dates required in respective projects promoted by this Association. The dates are for market steers by January tagging date; for market hogs and for market lambs by May tagging. Dates will change at the discretion of the superintendent and board. Dates for tagging will be printed in "Network".

A member may show either sheep or hogs but not both. A member may show up to two of the species they elect to exhibit. Member may also show two steers in addition to their sheep or hogs.

Tagging Requirements

Beef, sheep and swine, market animals that are not tagged, will not be allowed to show at the Monroe County Fair. If the identifying tag is lost the species superintendent must be notified immediately. A member may tag up to six sheep or six pigs – the member must pay \$1.00 per tag after the first three tags. Three steers can be tagged, with the third tag costing \$1.00.

THE JUDGING PLAN

Market Beef

The judge will designate a 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th place animal in each class. The 1st and 2nd Animal in each class will compete for Division Champion. The Division Champions will compete for Grand Champion animal. Upon selection of the Grand Champion animal, the second place animal in that division shall compete against the remaining 1st place animals for Reserve Grand Champion, 3rd and 4th overall will be placed from eligible Animals. Awards will be paid according to the A-B-C rating. The superintendents will divide the Market Beef into four divisions. Market beef designated by the judge or by a committee appointed by the board of directors as being too low a grade for selling will not be accepted for the sale.

Market Hogs

The market hogs will be judged and lined up 1, 2, 3, etc. The judge will designate a 1st and 2nd place animal in each class. The 1st place animal in each class will compete in the final Grand Champion class for the Grand Champion animal. Upon selection of the Grand Champion animal, the second place animal in that class shall compete against the remaining 1st place animals for Reserve Grand Champion. Market hogs designated by the judge or by a committee appointed by the board of directors as being too low grade for selling will not be accepted for the sale. The superintendent may elect to judge each class of market hogs in one or more classes.

Market Lambs

The market lambs will be judged and lined up 1, 2, 3, etc. The judge will designate a 1st and 2nd place animal in each class. The 1st place animal in each class will compete in the final Grand Champion class for the Grand Champion animal. Upon selection of the Grand Champion animal, the second place animal in that class shall compete against the remaining 1st place animals for Reserve Grand Champion. Market lambs designated by the judge or by a committee appointed by the board of directors as being too low grade for selling will not be accepted for the sale. The superintendent may elect to judge each class of market lambs in one or more classes. This might be by number or weight.

CLASSES OFFERED

A member is required to show their own animal. Market animals which are not shown by their owner cannot be sold in the market livestock sales.

Non-market livestock, including breeding, which are not shown by their owner, will not be allowed to remain at the fair. At the conclusion of the show, the animal will be sent home, or to market, at the member's expense, no awards will be given and premiums withheld.

In the event of extreme circumstances, such as illness, a death in the family, or an accident, the superintendent must be contacted, and an exception may be made.

Scheduling conflicts, when a member must be available for two 4-H classes at the same time, should be brought to the superintendent's attention immediately, and an attempt to find a workable solution will be made.

Market Beef

Market beef will be shown by weights. Members are limited to two entries in the market beef (steers or heifers) classes.

Divisions: Lightweight Steer, Middleweight Steer, Heavyweight Steer, Market Heifer divisions. Overall market beef champion will be chosen from the 1st place winners of those divisions.

Market Hogs

There is a class offered for an individual market hog and they will be shown in a class of barrows or gilts. A member may show just an individual hog or he may show two individuals. Members are limited to two entries in the market hog classes.

Market Lambs

There is a class offered for an individual market lamb and they will be show in classes of wethers and ewes. A member may show just an individual lamb or he may show two individuals. Members are limited to two entries in the market lamb classes.

Championship Class

Members who enter their animals in the Champion Classes do so with the understanding that the grand champion and reserve grand champion of the show must be sold on sale day at the Monroe County Fair. Hog, lamb and steer members enter with the understanding that the grand champion and reserve grand champion individuals must be sold. In addition, Market Beef placing 3rd and 4th go to auction.

Beef Feeding Exhibit

Minimum weight on a beef project animal will be 1000 pounds. Maximum weight is unlimited. Animals will be placed on A-B-C rating.

Sheep Feeding Exhibit

A member may show two individuals – classes will be broken by gender and then by weight.

Minimum weights – individual, 95 pounds

Maximum weights – individual, 160 pounds

Lamb underweight or overweight will be sent home and will not be allowed to show or sell. A member may bring another lamb in the event the first lamb is sent home. Lamb must be brought in during check-in period. Must be an animal that has been tagged.

Swine Feeding Contest

No swine will be allowed to weigh in at the Monroe County Fair unless they have approved documentation on file with the Swine Superintendent. All swine vaccinated by the JLA will have met the documentation requirement. All others must submit their documentation at tagging.

A member may show two individuals. Classes will be broken by gender and then by weight. Animals will be placed on a A-B-C rating.

Minimum weight – individual 220 pounds

Maximum weight – individual 300 pounds

Swine underweight or overweight will be sent home and will not be allowed to show or sell. A member may bring another hog in the event the first hog is sent home. The hog must be weighed within the designated check-in time.

DRUG POLICY

All species of market animals may have blood, or urine samples taken immediately after show placing of a class. These samples will be checked for forbidden drugs and illegal drug residue. If forbidden drug residue is found at the time of the drug testing, all monies and awards earned will be forfeited, and the exhibitor will be suspended from the show. The animals in question will be released from the fair and will not be allowed to sell in the JLA Auction. An exhibitor who exhibits an animal suspended or disqualified will lose the right to exhibit in the following year. In the event that the exhibitor still has remaining show eligibility, the exhibitor must be subjected to drug testing at the owner's expense the rest of the showman's showing eligibility until the exhibitor can no longer show due to age disqualification.

The Junior Livestock Association is responsible for the cost of the initial test. If a positive reading is received, the individual is then responsible for any additional cost.

If an exhibitor's animal is disqualified twice within an exhibitor's career, permanent barring from showing at the Monroe County Fair will be enforced by the Junior Livestock Association Rules Interpretation Committee.

All animals, including champion and reserve champion beef, sheep and swine market classes may be randomly selected and tested, at a time specified by the superintendent in charge.

All swine exhibits are to be free from the use of ractopamine, meaning from time of birth to time of processing. Pigs fed ractopamine (in feed or top dressed) at any time during their growth will not be allowed to be exhibited at the Monroe County Fair.

HEALTH POLICY

Animals showing any evidence of warts, ringworm, foot-rot, show fungus, sore mouth, pink eye, rectal prolapse, drainage, abscesses, presence of testicles, or any contagious or infectious conditions will be sent home.

JUNIOR LIVESTOCK SHOW AND AUCTION SALE PROGRAM

4-H members may sell only two species units of market livestock at the Fair Market Livestock Auction. 4-H members may choose the following options:

A member may enter either sheep or swine. The member must declare the species (sheep or swine) in June Fair Entry registration. They can show two animals in whichever species they choose but they CANNOT show both sheep and hogs. A member who is 8 or older may show up to two steers in addition to their sheep or hogs. A unit, for the sale consists of 2 hogs, 2 sheep or 1 steer. A member

selling 2 steers cannot sell sheep or hogs. JLA reserves the right to limit the sale of animals if tagged animals greatly exceed local custom processing availability.

If the owner feels there is a mistake in the weigh-in, it must be brought to the attention of the Species Supt. and the Livestock General Supt. **IMMEDIATELY**. After the animal crosses the scale an exhibitor will be allowed a reweigh if they feel a mistake was made before they leave the scale area.

Market beef, market hogs and market lambs, designated by the judge or a committee appointed by the Board of Directors, as being too low a grade for selling will not be accepted for the sale.

Members not wanting their lambs or steers sold in the Livestock Auction must notify in writing the superintendent according to the following schedule:

Lambs – two hours after completion of the sheep show Steers – two hours after completion of the steer show

Superintendents must have their completed sale bill to the Sale Tech Committee by 6 p.m. the day of their respective shows. Regarding the sale list, all announcements made from the announcers stand prior to the start of the auction will take precedent over printed materials.

No animal is accepted that has been offered for sale at any previous sale.

Members with animals properly consigned who later refuse to sell their animals will be dropped from membership in the Association for the present and ensuing year. Project credits and premium awards will also be forfeited and the member is not entitled to attend the Annual Program under any circumstances.

Members selling by private treaty after the Species show of the Fair will be considered the same as members consigning and refusing to sell as far as the rules are concerned.

The exhibitors of the animals sold at the Monroe County Fair will turn over to the Association 4% of the sale price of the animals.

Members who own and sell the champion animals will provide 4% of the sale price to the JLA. This includes market beef placing 3^{rd} and 4^{th} .

The funds of the Association thus collected will be used to pay for Association events (Banquets, State Training Sessions and Workshops, sponsoring Livestock delegates to various livestock events).

Any animal not placing Grand Champion or Reserve Grand Champion of the entire show will be placed in the sale order according to placing.

The Association will do everything possible to insure an honest sale. The payment for all animals is to be made to the Monroe Junior Livestock Show Association. Purchasers must check with sale officials before leaving Fairgrounds or removing animals.

Any question regarding the ownership, identification, or qualification of an animal for the show must be filed in writing by 5:00 p.m. the day before Show Day and submitted to the Extension 4-H Program Coordinator in charge. In turn this question will be filed with the Board of Directors who will call in all parties involved and make a decision which will be considered final.

No tranquilizers of any kind may be used on project animals. All swine exhibitors auction checks will be withheld until all testing and results have been received. In the event of positive ractopamine test(s) and results cannot be determined as individual, a prorated percentage of each exhibitors hog will be assessed toward the total fine. If positive ractopamine test(s) are found to be traced to an individual exhibitor, that exhibitor will be responsible for all associated fines.

The Board of Directors shall have the authority to assess members up to \$5.00 per head on beef project animals sold at the

livestock sale and up to \$2.50 per head on sheep and swine sold at the livestock sale in order to establish a supplemental fund if necessary.

Exhibiting requirements found in the Market Livestock Divisions of the Fair Premium book may be changed by a majority vote of the Junior Livestock Show Association Board of Directors.

Livestock donated by the original buyer for resale shall be resold through a commercial stockyard.

If an animal is unsafe at any time during fair week, it may be sent home by decision of the general superintendent.

ALL exhibitor auction checks MUST be picked up AND cashed **within 60 days** from the JLA or SAA banquet, whichever is appropriate.

It is MANDATORY that exhibitors of any market livestock (small or large animals) annually obtain a Youth for the Quality Care of Animals-YQCA-certificate in order to exhibit at the current year's Monroe County Fair. Failing to obtain this certificate will result in the exhibitor's inability to have any large or small animal entries present at that year's Monroe County Fair. In the case of a first year JLA exhibitor in any species Market Animals, that exhibitor is required to attend an in-person, species-specific workshop through the JLA by June 9, 2025. SAA exhibitors are required to attend one (1) clinic annually by June 9, 2025.

Release of Animals and Tack

Animals which go through the sale will be shipped, according to the Buyers directions, by the Monroe County Junior Livestock Association. Any carcass or animal condemned or not accepted by the packer remains the responsibility of the owner/exhibitor. The auction sales and placing on that animal would be void. The final decision on release will be up to the discretion of the species's superintendent after fair closes. No tack will be released prior to Sam the next day.

Livestock that is identified as ill, diseased, injured or dangerous, or any other animal, can be released at the discretion of the Monroe County Fair designated veterinarian or at the discretion of the Monroe County Fair General Livestock Superintendent or Monroe County Fair designee 4-H Program Coordinator, the 4-H General Livestock Superintendent and two other species superintendents. Exhibitors who violate the release rules will forfeit all premiums and awards won and will be banned from showing any livestock species for a period of two (2) years at the Monroe County Fair. In reference to small animals sold through the SAA Auction, animals sold will be released to the buyers after 6:00 a.m. Sunday THE DAY AFTER THE SALE.

SECTIONS 512 – BEEF CATTLE - MARKET

RULES – READ CAREFULLY

- A. All Exhibitors must adhere to (1) General Livestock rules and regulations, (2) Monroe County Junior Livestock
 Association Rules and (3) rules outlined in Section 510 –
 Beef Showmanship contest. The only exception is that animals may be "fit" for this class.
- B. Beef feeding cattle will be judged according to weight classes as determined by the beef superintendent.
- C. Steers/heifers are to weigh a minimum of 1000 pounds. Those animals not weighing minimum weight will be sent home and not allowed to show or sell.
- D. An exhibitor with two animals in the same weight class may show one in the next higher weight class. An exhibitor electing this option must notify the superintendent in writing by 8:00 p.m. on the evening before the show.
- E. Market heifers are subject to a pregnancy test conducted by fair veterinarian at the cost of the exhibitor.
- F. Only polled and dehorned cattle are to be shown. Steers must be totally void of any testicular development.
- G. Grooming/fitting may be done by family members and/ or Monroe County 4-H species exhibitors past and present.
- H. Market Beef exhibitors may use paint and powder filler below the flank and on the tail head only. NOT to be used above the flank.
- I. 4-H beef exhibitor must be present with their animal at all times while being fit or groomed. (Unless in show ring with their second animal.)
- J. All beef cattle must be under the control of the exhibitor at all times. Removal of an animal deemed dangerous will be at the discretion of the Beef Superintendent.
- K. All Cattle must have a permanent ID tag.
- L. All market cattle must have been tagged in current year.
- M. Steers/heifers not shown on show day cannot be sold in the sale unless approved by the Board of Directors.
- N. Members must leave steers/heifers tied after the sale with proper halter acceptable to the superintendent. Otherwise a charge of \$5 will be deducted from the sale price of the animal for a halter which shall remain the property of the association. This means that the charge involved was for the work done by the superintendent of the division. Halters will be returned to steer's stall after Sunday morning loading.
- O. All steers/heifers must be stalled in the area designated for project steers/heifers.
- P. The member must designate where the animal is housed.
- Q. Barn hours: The beef barn is closed nightly at 11:00 p.m. and reopened at 6:00 a.m. During those times only livestock superintendents and their designees are permitted to be in the barn. Steers/heifers cannot be removed from the barn during the closed hours.

- R. A \$25.00 fee will be deducted from the exhibitors JLA Auction check for failure to clean their pen on Sunday morning at close of Fair.

RULES - READ CAREFULLY

Members

- No sheep are eligible to show at the county fair unless the project member has had the sheep in his possession since May of current year and have been tagged at the May Tagging. All sheep attending county fair must have USDA or APHIS approved identification ear tags in place before being penned by the sheep superintendent. An exception will be made for market lambs that arrive without USDA or APHIS ear tags. Those lambs will be tagged with USDA tags provided by the Monroe County Junior Livestock Association (JLA). Owners of such lambs must provide JLA with the name and address of the lamb owner at the time of the lamb's birth.
- All sheep not properly prepared (cleaned) for exhibition can be prohibited from entering the fairgrounds at the discretion of the sheep superintendent. Also, sheep exhibiting prolapse, will not be penned.
- See Monroe County Junior Livestock Show classes for rules about market lambs.
- All ear tags, except USDA Scrapie I.D. tags and Monroe County Fair Tags, must be removed from market animals.

- Exhibitors not cooperating with superintendents in adhering to barn rules in regard to the cleaning of pens, feeding and watering of animals during fair week will have premiums withheld. A \$50.00 fee will be deducted from the exhibitors JLA Auction check for failure to clean their pen on Sunday morning at close of Fair.
- F. Halters will not be used in the sheep show unless special permission is given by the superintendent.
- If member cannot be present at sale, it is still their responsibility to see that the lambs are taken through the sale by another 4-H member. Lambs will not be sold if prior arrangements have not been made by the member to have them taken through the sale.
- It is required that all sheep pens be bedded in wood chips provided by the Monroe County Fair Association.
- A member is required to show their own animal including Showmanship. Market animals, which are not shown by their owner, cannot be sold in the market livestock sales. In the event of extreme circumstances, such as illness, a death in the family, or an accident, the superintendent must be contacted, and an exception may be made. Scheduling conflicts, when a member must be available for two 4-H classes at the same time, should be brought to the superintendent's attention immediately, and an attempt to find a workable solution will be made.
- All lambs must be tagged with Junior Livestock official tags, in order to allow them to show at the fair. Tagging will be done at the fairgrounds. Members, who have registered their animals, will be notified, and notices will be placed in the Network, as to the date of tagging. A member may tag up to six animals, and show two. Animals may also be tagged as a family and not designated by the member until they arrive at the fair.
- The following rules must be adhered to:
 - a. No muzzles on lambs at any time.
 - b. Pens to be bedded with wood chips only no carpets.
 - c. While in the show ring the lamb is to be shown with all four feet on the ground or ring surface after the lamb is set up.
 - d. Humane handling practices of sheep at all times.
 - No administration of fluids will be allowed (drench gun, syringe, bottle, or any other method of delivery). ONLY WATER FROM A BUCKET and/or electrolytes.
 - Wet feeding will be allowed and defined as a mixture of dry feed with liquid. Meaning any additives, drenches, or shakes, must be mixed with
 - Animals must have water available at all times with the exception of a 12-hour period prior to show.
 - Lambs cannot be iced but cold towels will be permitted.
 - All Market Lambs must be slick sheared and show ready before arriving to the fairgrounds for check in. No electric clippers will be permitted to be used on the fairgrounds during the Fair week. Violating the no shear rule will result in the exhibitor being disqualified. Lambs cannot be taken to any location, other than the sheep barn to

- fit for show. Lambs being exercised should not leave the sheep barn area. Lambs should stay in the "D" parking lot area, not to exceed the south side of the Hog Barn.
- j. No sheep are allowed to leave the barn between 11:00 p.m. and 5:00 a.m. throughout the fair (except for Sunday night Showmanship).
- k. The M.C.J.L.A. has determined that all sheep exhibited at the Monroe County Fair must have USDA Scrapie identification tags.
- Any discrepancies with these rules should be taken up with Mark Chapman (Sheep Superintendent)

- J. Barn Duty: All clubs will be responsible for keeping the barn clean. Please check the schedule for your clubs date and time.
- K. **Canopies**: Tents, awnings, dressing rooms, or umbrellas are not allowed in or around the sheep barn.
- Livestock Auction: Friday, August 1, 2025 4 p.m. (Sheep, Beef, Swine)
- M. Barn Clean-up: Sunday, August 3, 2025, 8 a.m. No decorations or identification can be removed before 5 a.m. Sunday. Pens must be cleaned and receive approval from a Sheep Superintendent. A \$50.00 fee will be deducted from the exhibitors JLA Auction check for failure to clean their pen on Sunday morning at closing of fair.

Pack Goats & Cart Judging:

- A. Goat project members may exhibit a total of three (3) animals. Members that show sponsored animals (mentor) may show one (1) goat. Please note on sheet if animals are sponsored. A sponsor may sponsor (mentor) no more than eight (8) members and no more than 8 sponsored goats may come from a single farm address.
- B. Project members showing sponsored animals must provide a signed contract by June 15 (submitted to the fair office at same time as entry paperwork) registration date.
- C. Project member must be in possession of goat by May 1 (with the exception of kid goats born after May 1). At time of registration with the fair each member must include address where specie is housed. Random spot visits will be conducted by the superintendents prior to fair.
- D. All animals must be dehorned unless exempt by breed standards, including spurs that exceed 2" in length.
- E. All dairy goats entered to show in breed classes must have full complete registration papers. Goats may be registered under a family member or listed sponsors name. Non-registered dairy animals must show in "other dairy" class.
- F. All registered goats exhibiting at the county fair must be permanently tattooed. All non-registered goats attending the county fair must have a USDA scrapie I.D. approved identification ear tag in place before being penned.
- G. All goats, including dairy, wether, pygmy, boar, and other non-dairy must be hair clipped before being penned at the fair. The exception, fiber animals, will not be clipped. Body clipping must be done prior to the fair. Pre-show clipping and touch-ups will be allowed. All goats must be

- cleaned prior to being penned at the fair. All goats not properly cleaned for exhibition may be prohibited from entering the fairgrounds and will not be penned.
- H. Fiber will be judged 50% on the quality of their fleece and 50% on conformation. Nothing (including brushing) should be done to disturb the natural character of the fleece.
- All goats will be health checked by a veterinarian (and/or other designated official.) on arrival and will not be penned unless free of lumps, disease, parasites, or other general deficiency.
- Exhibitor must maintain and clean pens and animals throughout the fair.
- K. Effective 2011 no bucklings will be allowed at the county fair
- L. Age of goats shall be figured from January 1.
- M. Does must not have delivered or be due to deliver within two (2) weeks of the fair. Doe kids must be a minimum of two (2) weeks old. A dry doe (over 24 months) may be shown if she has freshened at least once, with exception of fiber animals.
- N. Group classes must be made up only of those does that have been shown in individual classes.
- O. It is suggested (but not required) that exhibitors wear white attire when showing goats.
- P. No cross-over animals will be allowed from 4-H show and the open show.
- Q. A member is required to show their own animal, in the event of extreme circumstances, such as illness, a death in the family, or an accident, the superintendent must be contacted and an exception may be made.
- R. Scheduling conflicts, when a member must be available for two 4-H classes at the same time; should be brought to the superintendent's attention immediately, and an attempt to find a workable solution will be made.
- Exhibitors not cooperating with superintendents in adhering to barn rules will have premiums withheld.

- A. All swine must be vaccinated for the Swine Flu virus prior to entering the Monroe County Fair Grounds. All swine that are tagged on Tag Day (that have not previously been vaccinated) will be inoculated by a veterinarian and accompanied by the documentation stating the name of the vaccine administered, date administered and the signature of the party that administered the vaccine. No swine will be allowed to weigh in at the Monroe County Fair unless they have approved documentation on file by the breeder, veterinarian or owner stating the name of the vaccine administered, date administered, and the signature of the party that administered the vaccine with the Swine Superintendent. All documentation must accompany the hog. All swine vaccinated by the vet at tagging will have met the documentation requirement. All others must submit their documentation at tagging.
- B. It is required that all swine pens be bedded in wood chips.
- C. All hogs not properly prepared (cleaned) for exhibition will be prohibited from unloading on the fairgrounds.
- D. Powdering, oiling or any dressing of hogs other than washing will not be allowed at the Monroe County Fair. Hogs cannot be iced. Only water and non-oil spray will be allowed in preparing hogs for showing. Exhibitors will be disqualified from showing if they do not follow this
- E. MEMBERS MAY NOT WHOLE BODY CLIP HOGS. ALL HOGS MUST HAVE HAIR AT LEAST 3/4 INCH LONG OR MORE. Slick Sheared hogs will be disqualified and sent home. All hogs will be checked at weigh-in for hair length and may be re-checked any time before the show.
- F. The market hog show will be a terminal show, although over and underweight animals may return home.
- G. Hogs will not go through sale ring. Submit photo one week prior to Fair.
- H. All swine exhibits are to be free from the use of ractopamine, meaning from time of birth to time of processing. Pigs fed ractopamine (in feed or top dressed)

- at any time during their growth will not be allowed to be exhibited at the Monroe County Fair.
- I. All swine exhibitors auction checks will be withheld until all testing and results have been received. In the event of positive ractopamine test(s) and results cannot be determined as individual, a prorated percentage of each exhibitors hog will be assessed toward the total fine. If positive ractopamine test(s) are found to be traced to an individual exhibitor, that exhibitor will be responsible for all associated fines.
- J. Hogs will not be allowed on the grounds to weigh in if their state tags are not in their ears. Superintendents will not place them in their ears. This must be done prior to being unloaded in the grounds.
- K. NO TENT, AWNING OR ADDING ON DRESSING ROOM IN OR AROUND ANY LIVESTOCK BUILDING.

- H. Barn Duty: All exhibitors are responsible for keeping the barn clean. Please check the posted schedule for your assigned day.
- I. Canopies: Tents, awnings, dressing rooms or umbrellas are not permitted in or around the hog barn.

- C. One species will be shown by all competitors at the same time using animals which the barn livestock superintendents will provide. Participant will not show own species. The representative of that species will describe to the audience what the other contestants are doing. The microphone will be used to explain.
- D. Each species will be judged ranking the competitors on their ability to handle and present the animal, appearance of the contestant, and the contestant's ability to follow the judges' instructions.

- E. Species superintendent will pick animals and exhibitors will have random draw.

- G. Final placing will be based on total points, highest number to prevail.

SECTION 672 - RABBIT SHOWMANSHIP

PRE-REGISTRATION IS NOT REQUIRED NO PREMIUMS PAID IN SHOWMANSHIP RIBBONS AND BANNERS

RULES – READ CAREFULLY

- A. To be shown in Showmanship, all animals must be shown in a regular class. Animals must be kept at the fairgrounds and cannot be removed after the show or Showmanship classes. Division champions must remain in the show area to be eligible for the Grand Champion Drive.
- B. Exhibitors must personally fit and show their own animals. Basis of award:
 - a. Fitting of animal
 - b. Owners knowledge of animal
 - c. Showmanship of owner
 - d. Attitude of showman.
- C. Judge will designate a champion showman in each class.
- D. Champion showman in each class will compete in the All-Around (species) Showmanship.
- E. A member may win a species showmanship more than one year consecutively.

- F. A member may compete in a species showmanship even if they have won Sweepstakes Showmanship representing that species.
- G. 4-H exhibitors are only eligible to win Sweepstakes once.
- H. If a member has won Overall Showmanship Sweepstakes he/she is no longer eligible to participate in any small animal showmanship sweepstakes contest.
- I. Champion showman of each species must compete in the Sweepstakes or forfeit their standing.
- J. Small Animal Executive Board, General Superintendent, and the Superintendents of the particular species will rule on all disputes that arise during the fair for that species. General Superintendent has final say. Formal protests must be submitted in writing within 2 hours of the incident to the 4-H Program Coordinator.
- K. In the event there is a tie for Grand and Reserve Champion, there will be a series of questions asked to break the tie and reward the champion to whoever answers the question correctly

ALL EXHIBITORS MUST ADHERE TO THE GENERAL SMALL ANIMAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

RULES – READ CAREFULLY

General Rules

4-H dog clubs- It will be necessary for you to follow the enrollment policy of the Monroe County 4-H office. The 4-H Coordinator should explain it in detail to the 4-H leaders. The club should select the club name and indicate that it is a dog

club. Enroll the club on 4-H Online. You should request, from the 4-H Coordinator, the project materials required.

- A. Pure-bred and mixed breeds are allowed to be shown by all 4-H exhibitors. All dogs must be at least 6 months of age and have a current DA2PP and Rabies Vaccination. Although no longer required, it is HIGHLY recommended that a heartworm check and fecal check be done for your dog's health. Two photocopies of the vaccinations certificate MUST be given to your leader to be turned in on paperwork turn in day, with a current photo (4x6) of the dog and child (in the same photo). If current vaccinations are not received before 8:00 a.m. on show day, or they expire before the end of fair week, you will be asked to leave the grounds. Dogs entered in the divisions for "Dog Showmanship" and "Dog Dress-Up" are also required to have all the vaccination certificates turned in along with a photo of the exhibitor and dog together.
- B. There will be 3 mandatory meeting opportunities before fair. Youth and/or Parents MUST attend at least one of these meetings. Time, place and dates will be posted in the Network and on the Program Facebook page and on the Band App. Along with this requirement, you will need to participate with your dog at least one of the following: 1 of the 2 fun matches, Ag Awareness Day, Fitting and showing clinic, Agility practice day or one of the other clinics offered. First year youth MUST attend one of the fun matches.
- C. 4-H dog projects must wear green 4-H bandana to gain entry to fairgrounds during fair week. Bandanas will be provided on the Saturday of the fair show. Dogs must remain at the show location and cannot roam the fairgrounds. Dog demonstrations will be held Monday thru Friday from 4pm to 8pm Dog Dress-Up is on Sunday at 7 p.m. Rally will be judged on Friday at 10:30 a.m. in Glenn Stock Arena. Please arrive early to check in.
- D. Cloverbuds MAY use their own dog with a mentor in the ring with them. The mentor must be 12 or older and have at least 2 years' experience showing at the fair.
- E. Exhibitors must use a 6-foot-long leather or nylon leash for Rally and Obedience. For Agility a 4-foot long leather or nylon leash may be used. Showmanship leads should be used for showmanship. The use of prong collars, muzzles, and halters will NOT be allowed.
- F. Aggressive dogs will be excused at the discretion of the Aggressive dog Committee. Females in season will NOT be allowed on the fairgrounds. Anyone severely disciplining or abusing their dog on the fairgrounds will be asked to leave the fairgrounds and will forfeit all ribbons, trophies and premium money. No exceptions.
- G. Any dog belonging wholly or in part to a Judge, or any member of the Judges household, shall not be entered in any classes that Judge is judging.
- H. Members may show in the Utility B. Rally Master B, Agility Advanced B and Championship class multiple years, even with qualifying scores. All other classes need 3 qualifying scores per dog before the exhibitor is required to advance. Exhibitors are allowed to advance to the next class if they feel they are ready but cannot go back to the lower level once they have competed in the higher class.

- An individual dog may be shown in 1 obedience class, 1
 junior Showmanship Class, 1 Agility Class, 1 Rally Class
 except for Brace, Team and Cloverbuds and Doggie Dress-up.
- Per State dog show dress code, No bare midriffs. Flat shoes, such as tennis shoes are recommended. No flip flops or open toed shoes. No Denim of any color or Spandex! Skirts/dresses should be Mid-thigh length; Dress slacks may also be worn. Dress shirts, ties, and dress slacks are acceptable. Suit coats can be worn but are not required. especially in hot weather. When wearing a tie, a tie tack should be worn, to hold the tie close to the shirt, so it doesn't get in the way. Clothing or jewelry that draws undue attention to one's self or clothing that may distract from other handlers is unacceptable. THESE RULES ALSO APPLY TO THE RALLY RING. If shorts are worn during demonstrations at the tent, they MUST be (mid-thigh) length, and tops MUST have sleeves. If these rules are not followed, the exhibitor will receive an automatic 10 point deduction, unless other attire can be found. No badges, club jackets, coats with club names or ribbon prizes shall be worn or displayed, nor other visible means of identification used, by an individual, when exhibiting a dog in the ring.
- K. For Agility athletic attire including shorts that are at least Mid thigh length, polo shirts or t-shirts free from club name, personal identification, or logos or other printed words or sayings are acceptable. Clothing should be neat and free from wrinkles.
- L. The High Competitor trophy will be awarded to a 4-Her who has shown the same dog in Showmanship, Agility, Obedience and Rally. The High Competitor trophy will be awarded at the Dog Banquet.
- M. The Judge must disqualify any dog that attempts to attack any person or other dog in the ring. They shall mark the dog "Disqualified" or "Excused" and state the reason on the score sheet. The score sheet shall be given to the Dog Superintendent. The superintendent may call a meeting of the Aggressive Dog Committee. (See by laws) A dog that has been excused on two (2) occasions by a Judge for attacking or attempting to attack in the ring will no longer be eligible to compete in 4-H Trials.
- N. A dog that is lame may not compete and shall not receive any score for the class. Lame is defined as walking with an "unnatural gait" due to pain or discomfort. If in the Judge's opinion a dog is lame, they shall not score such a dog, and shall mark the score sheet "Excused-Lame "No dog shall be eligible to compete in any event if it is taped or bandaged in any way or if it has anything attached to it for medical or connective purposes. Such a dog must immediately be excused and under no circumstances may it be returned later for judging after the tape, bandage or attachment has been removed.
- O. Any dog whose hair is over its eyes and interferes with its vision, may have the hair tied back with either a neutral-colored rubber band or a small plain barrette. No dog shall be eligible to compete if it appears to have been dyed or colored in any way or if the coat shows evidence of chalk or powder, if it has anything attached to it for protection or adornment. Such a dog may, at the Judge's sole discretion, be judged later if the offending condition has been corrected.

- P. The Judge must remove from competition any dog which its handler cannot control, any handler who interferes willfully with another competitor or their dog, any handler who abuses their dog on the grounds, or any dog which they consider unfit to compete. If a handler is expelled or excused by a Judge, the reason shall be stated on the score sheet, or on a separate report, and given to the 4-H Dog Superintendent.
- Q. The owner or 4-H handler of a dog entered at a 4-H event does so at their own risk and agrees to abide by the 4-H and Monroe County Fair rules and regulations.
- R. At all events, the decision of the Judge shall be final in all matters affecting the scoring and the working of the dogs and their handlers. The 4-H Superintendents shall decide all other matters arising at the event, including protest against dogs, subject, to the Rules and Regulations of the Monroe County Fair.

SECTION 682 – DOG RALLY OBEDIENCE (TROPHIES)

GENERAL RALLY OBEDIENCE RULES - READ CAREFULLY

Per State dog show dress code: No bare midriffs. Flat shoes, such as tennis shoes are recommended. No flip flops or open toed shoes. No Denim of any color or Spandex! Skirts/dresses should be **Mid-thigh length**. Dress slacks may also be worn. Dress shirts, ties, and dress slacks are acceptable. Suit coats can be worn but are not required, especially in hot weather. When wearing a tie, a tie tack should be worn, to hold the tie close to the shirt, so it doesn't get in the way.

- A. Placement of Signs. Signs will be placed to the right of the handler's path except for those indicating a change in direction, in which case the sign will be directly in front of the handler to aid in that change. Exercises using cones may require entry with the sign on the left. Exact placement of signs is made by the judge while walking the course along the path that will be taken by the handlers. The course for each class will be posted at the ring prior to the familiarization time (see Section 7). If possible, copies will be given to exhibitors at check-in.
- B. Location of Performance in Relation to signs. Exercises are performed near the designated signs, either directly in front or in front and to the left of the signs. For Stations where the handler and the dog are required to make a sidestep to the right, the sign shall be placed in the initial path of the handler and dog, thus requiring the team to make a sufficient size sidestep to the right in order to pass the sign on the right.
- C. **Familiarization Time**. A 10-minute walkthrough for each class will be allowed for handlers without their dogs. When

the same course is used for A and B classes, the judge may choose to combine the walkthrough times. The judge must be available in the ring during this period to answer any questions the handlers might have. The judge may also choose to brief the handlers on the course during this period.

- D. Judging. The judge's orders will be "Are you ready?" followed by "Forward." No other orders are necessary.
- E. Qualifying scores and general scoring. To qualify, dog and handler must receive a minimum score of 70 points out of a possible perfect score of 100. Scoring for all levels is based on a maximum score of 100-points. Times will be used only to break ties for placements. The maximum number of points that can be deducted for any station is 10, except for a non-qualifying performance.
- F. Space Requirements. The ring sizes for rally shall be 40 by 50 feet to 50 by 60 feet or any combination of the sizes in between. The floor covering or ground surface must be the same as would be suitable for a traditional Obedience ring.

RULES – READ CAREFULLY

Per State dog show dress code, No bare midriffs. Flat shoes, such as tennis shoes are recommended. No flip flops or open toed shoes. No Denim of any color or Spandex! Skirts/dresses should be **Mid-thigh length**; Dress slacks may also be worn. Dress shirts, ties, and dress slacks are acceptable. Suit coats can be worn but are not required, especially in hot weather. When wearing a tie, a tie tack should be worn, to hold the tie close to the shirt, so it doesn't get in the way.

- A. Dogs must have 6-foot nylon or leather leash and choker collar or buckle collar with no tags
- B. **Standardized Judging** Standardized judging is of paramount importance. Judges are not permitted to inject their own

- variations into the exercises but must see that each handler and dog executes the various exercises exactly as described in these regulations. A handler who is familiar with these regulations should be able to enter the ring under any Judge Without having to inquire how the Judge wishes to have any exercise performed, and without being confronted with some unexpected requirements.
- C. Standard of perfection- The Judge must carry a mental picture of the theoretically perfect performance in each exercise and score each dog and handler against this visualized standard, which shall combine the utmost in willingness, enjoyment and precision on the part of the dog, and naturalness, gentleness, and smoothness in the handling. Speed is not to be considered as the equivalent to willingness and enjoyment. Lack of willingness and enjoyment on the part of the dog must be penalized as well as roughness of handling. There shall be no less than ½ point or multiple of ½ point deductions.
- D. Qualifying Performances- A judge's certification on the score sheet of a Qualifying score for any dog constitutes their certification to the Monroe County Fair Dog Superintendent that on this occasion has performed all the required exercises at least in accordance with the minimum standards. A qualifying score must never be awarded to a dog whose performance has not met the minimum requirements, nor the dog that shows fear or resentment, or that relieves itself at any time while in the ring for judging. Nor a dog whose handler disciplines it or abuses it on the grounds or carries or offers food in the ring. The judge must not give a qualifying score for any exercise if they decide that it would be contrary to the best interest of the sport if all dogs in the class were to perform in the same way.
- E. Judge's directions. The judge's orders and signals should be given to the handlers in a clear and understandable manner, and in such a way that the work of the dog is not disturbed. Before starting each exercise, the judge shall ask: "Are you ready?" At the end of each exercise, the judge shall say "Exercise Finished." Each dog must be worked and judged separately except for the Group exercises. The judging of an exercise will begin when the judge gives the first order, not before.
- F. No Added Requirements- No judge shall require any dog or handler to do anything, nor penalize a dog or handler for failing to do anything, that is not required by these regulations.
- G. A and B classes and Different Breeds- The same methods and standards must be used for judging and scoring A and B Classes, and judging and scoring the work of dogs of different breeds. "A" Classes are for first and second year handlers. "B" classes are for Experienced dogs, for that level, OR Experienced handlers, for the level.
- H. Interference and Double Handling- A judge who is aware of any assistance, interference or attempts to control a dog from outside the ring, must act promptly to stop such double handling or interference, and shall penalize the dog substantially, or if, In the judge's opinion, circumstances warrant, shall give the dog a score of zero for the exercise during which the aid was received.
- Rejudging- if a dog has failed in a particular part of an exercise, it shall not ordinarily be rejudged or given a second

- chance. If, in the judge's opinion, the dog's performance was prejudiced by peculiar and unusual conditions, the judge may at their discretion rejudge the dog on the entire exercise. Should the judge find it necessary to rejudge a dog or dogs from the Group exercises, the dog or dogs shall be rejudged with the next scheduled group within that class. Should there be no further group within that class, the dog or dogs to be rejudged shall immediately do the exercise alone. The dog or dogs involved will be rejudged only on the exercise in question.
- J. Ties-In case of a tie for any prize in the Regular classes each dog shall be tested again individually, by having it perform the entire Sub Novice Heel exercise, if a Sub Novice dog is involved. Otherwise, the tied dogs shall perform the entire Novice Heel exercise individually. The original scores shall not change.
- K. Judge's book and Score sheets- Scores for the Group exercises and total scores must be entered in the official judge's book immediately after each group of dogs has been judged. No score may be changed except to correct a mathematical error or if a score has been entered in the wrong column. All final scores must be entered in the judge's book before prizes are awarded. Judges shall use separate score sheets and these are to be made available to the exhibitors at the end of the class or after the Superintendent has recorded the scores in the books.
- L. Announcement of scores- The judge shall not disclose any score or partial score to contestants or spectators until they have completed the judging of the entire class "nor shall they permit anyone else to do so. Immediately following the Group Exercises for any of the Sub Novice classes the judge shall then inform all handlers whether they qualified. After all the scores are recorded for the class, the judge shall call for the available dogs that were shown in the class to be brought into the ring. Before awarding the prizes, the judge shall inform the spectators of the maximum number of points for a perfect score, announce the score of each prize winner and then announce to the handlers the score of each dog shown in their ring.
- M. Explanations and Errors- The judge is not required to explain their scoring and need not enter into a discussion with any contestant who appears to be dissatisfied. However, after prizes have been awarded and the judge's book turned in, the judge is encouraged, but not required to discuss the scoring with the exhibitors. Any interested person who thinks that there may have been a mathematical error or an error in identifying a dog may report the facts to one of the Stewards, or the Superintendents immediately so the matter may be checked.
- N. Handicapped Handlers- Judges may modify the specific requirements of these Regulations for the handlers to the extent necessary to permit physically handicapped handlers to compete. Dogs handled by such handlers shall be required to perform all parts of the exercises described in these regulations and shall be penalized for failure to perform any part of an exercise.
- O. **Use of Leash** All dogs shall be kept on leash except when in the ring. Dogs should be brought into the ring and taken out of the ring on leash. Dogs should be on leash in the ring

- when brought in to receive awards and when waiting in the ring before and after group exercises. The leash shall be left on the judge's table or other designated place, between the individual exercises.
- P. **Heel Position** The heel position as used in these regulations, whether the dog is sitting, standing, lying down, or moving at heel, means that the dog shall be straight in line, at the handler's left side, and as close as practical to the handler's left leg without crowding. The area from the dog's head to shoulder shall be in line with the handler's left hip.
- Q. Hands-In all exercises in which the dog is required to "heel free" one of the options below shall be followed (1) the handler's arms and hands shall move naturally at the handler's sides while in motion and shall hang naturally at the handler's side while not in motion, or (2) the right hand and arm must move naturally, while the left hand shall be held against and centered in front of the body, in the area of the waist. The left forearm shall be carried, as much as possible against the body. In all exercises in which the dog is required to come to or return to the handler and sit in front, the handler's arms and hands shall hang naturally at their sides while the dog is coming in and until the dog has sat in front. A substantial deduction shall be made if a handler's arms and hands are not hanging naturally at their sides while the dog is coming in and until the dog has sat in front.
- R. Commands or signals- A single command or signal only, maybe given by the handler, and any extra command or signal must be penalized except whenever the regulations specify "command and/or signal" the handler may give one, the other or both command and signal simultaneously. Signals must be inaudible, and the handler must not touch the dog. Any unusual noise or motion may be considered a signal and may be penalized. Whistling or use of a whistle is prohibited. The dog's name may be used once immediately before any verbal command. The dog that responds to its name without waiting for the verbal command shall be scored as having anticipated the command and be penalized. Commands that are excessively loud shall be penalized. An extra command or signal in any non-principal part of an exercise does not constitute a failing score.
- S. Additional Commands- If a handler gives an additional command or signal not permitted by regulations, either when no command or signal is permitted, or simultaneously with or following a permitted command or signal, the dog shall be scored as it has failed completely to perform that particular part of the exercise.
- T. Praise- Praise and petting are allowed between and after exercises, but points must be deducted from the total score for a dog that is not under reasonable control while being praised. At no time should the praise resemble a possible correction or discipling. A handler shall not carry or offer food in the ring. There shall be a substantial penalty for any dog that is picked up or carried at any time in the ring.
- U. Handling between exercises- In the Novice class the dog may be guided gently by the collar between exercises to get it into the proper position for an exercise. No other physical guidance, such as placing the dog in position with hands or straightening the dog with the knees or feet is not permitted and shall be substantially penalized. In all the classes above Novice, there shall be a substantial penalty for any dog that

is physically guided at any time or that is not readily controllable. Posing for examination and holding for measurement are permitted. Imperfections in heeling between exercises will not be judged. Minor penalties shall be imposed for a dog that does not respond promptly to its handlers' commands or signals before or between exercises in the Open, Pre Utility and Utility classes.

- V. Training and discipling in the ring-The judge shall not permit any handler to train their dog in the ring by excessive verbal commands or by moving toward the dog to correct it. A handler who disciplines their dog in the ring shall not receive a qualifying score. Any abuse of a dog in the ring must be immediately reported by the judge to the 4-H Dog Superintendents.
- W. Training on the grounds- There shall be no intensive or abusive training of dogs on the grounds or premises and a 4-H sanctioned trial. No practice rings or areas shall be allowed at such events. All dogs shall be kept on leash except when in the ring. In the event of an attack on a person or another dog the 4-H Superintendents must be notified immediately. An Aggressive dog committe meeting could be called.
- X. Abuse of Dogs-The 4—H Dog Superintendents shall investigate any reports of abuse of dogs or severe disciplining of dogs on the grounds or premises of an Event. A person conducting themselves in such a manner or in another manner prejudicial to the best interest of 4-H or dog sports or fails to comply with the requirements of these regulations shall be dealt with promptly, during the trial if possible. The offender must be notified of the specific charges against them and must be given an opportunity to be heard in their own defense.

RULES – READ CAREFULLY

A. The purpose of Showmanship-The purpose of showmanship is to demonstrate teamwork between the handler and the dog, showcasing your skills as a handler. Regardless of the breed of dog, you learn the skills required to present your dog and bring out its finest qualities. Your presentation is being judged, not the dog's conformation. You learn breed characteristics for the breed your dog represents. You learn

- the anatomy and physiology of the dog, and how to move as one with your dog. In 4-H the purpose of showmanship is also to test your knowledge about dogs and responsible dog ownership.
- Preparing for Showmanship- the dog is judged on both its performance in the ring and its appearance and grooming and not its conformation. In addition to obeying commands to gait, stand, and turn, he must look alert, be well groomed, and allow strangers to touch it. Because the dog is being judged on condition, grooming and temperament, as well as the way it moves, showing in this class requires as much careful preparation as does showing in an obedience class. When competing in a showmanship class, bathing the dog before the show is not your only concern. Conditioning a dog's coat, body and mind takes careful preparation. A dog that is not physically fit or is afraid does not present a positive image. You are being judged as a team in showmanship. The dog is a tool to show off your skill as a handler. There should be smooth coordination between the two of you. Grandiose gestures or jerky movements distract the judge's eye from seeing you and your dog at your best.
- C. Per State dog show dress code, Flat shoes, such as tennis shoes are recommended. No flip flops or open toed shoes. No Denim of any color or Spandex! Skirts/dresses should be mid-thigh length; Dress slacks may also be worn. Dress shirts, ties, and dress slacks are acceptable. Suit coats can be worn but are not required, especially in hot weather. When wearing a tie, a tie tack should be worn, to hold the tie close to the shirt, so it doesn't get in the way. (See general dog rules)

As they reach higher levels of competition, the members will be required to have greater control of their dogs off leash. Although training for agility should always remain fun for both handler and dog, safety and safe use of equipment should be top priority. Members should help their dogs gradually develop the high level of concentration that agility requires, guiding them in a positive manner.

 - a. Knots in the hair or large amounts of wet fur
 - b. Ear mites, fleas or lice
 - c. Unhealthy or unkept general appearance
- H. Judging will include:
 - a. General appearance and condition
 - b. Hair, coat, paws, nails
 - c. Body build
- I. This will be an all breed show. Long hair, short hair, will be judged separately.
- J. To be able to participate in the fair Cat Show you MUST:

MONROE COUNTY HORSE & PONY PROGRAM RULES & REGULATIONS

Adopted 1/2025 Amended 1/2025

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SECTION 1: RULES & REGULATIONS

- I. 4-H EXHIBITOR REQUIREMENTS
 - A. AGE REQUIREMENTS: 4-H age is age as of January 1st of the current year (determined by 4-H Guidelines)
 - B. HORSE CLUB: Participants must be a member of a horse and pony club and enrolled/registered in 4-H Online by April 1st

- of the calendar year to participate in that calendar year's Monroe County Fair.
- C. Members and adult volunteers are encouraged to enroll at the Fall Enrollment so the next program year's Premium can reflect numbers for classes.
- D. To become a registered horse club, the following must occur:
 - 1. Notify the Extension Office that the club will offer Horses as a project area.
 - 2. The club leader or a designated delegate must attend at least five (5) Horse and Pony Board meetings per project year (September 1st through August 31st, excluding August and December).
 - 3. New clubs approved during Spring Enrollment must attend at least two (2) Horse and Pony Board meetings to qualify their members to exhibit in the Horse and Pony Project Area.
 - 4. Existing clubs failing to attend at least five (5) meetings or Spring Enrollment clubs failing to attend at least two (2) meetings will disqualify all their members from exhibiting in the Horse and Pony Project Area at the Monroe County Fair.

E. VOLUNTEER REQUIREMENTS:

- 1. Volunteer activities must directly relate to the Horse and Pony program and must be announced and preapproved by the Superintendents.
- 2. Each member wishing to attend the fair is required to complete six (6) hours of volunteer time.
 - a) Volunteer hours can be completed by the member or sponsored by a contributing volunteer (e.g., parent, grandparent, or leader).
 - b) All volunteer hours must be documented by the individual in charge of the event.

II. MONROE COUNTY 4-H DRESS CODE:

A. Youth Code of Conduct

- 1. The opportunity to participate in or attend 4-H activities is a privilege. All 4-H participants youth, families, volunteers, and Extension staff who participate in or attend any activity or event sponsored by the Michigan State University Extension 4-H Youth Development Program are expected to uphold the values of the Michigan 4-H program. All 4-H youth participants must conduct themselves according to the following standards that apply to all Michigan 4-H programs, including virtual programs, and interactions such as social media and internet engagement.

- 3. Bring Your Best Self. Conduct yourself in a manner that reflects honesty, integrity, self-control, and self direction. Accept the results and outcomes of 4-H activities and programs with grace and empathy for other participants. Accept the final opinions of judges and evaluators. Be open to new ideas, suggestions, and opinions of others.
- 4. Obey the Law. Obey the laws of the locality, state and nation and Michigan State University and Extension policies and guidelines. Commit no illegal acts. Do not possess, offer to others, or use alcohol, illegal drugs, marijuana, or tobacco products, which include e-pens, e-pipes, e-hookah, e-cigars, JUULs, vapes, vape pens or other electronic nicotine delivery systems. Do not attend 4-H activities under the influence of alcohol or illegal substances. Do not possess or use weapons or firearms except as expressly permitted as part of supervised 4-H shooting sports programming. This includes dangerous or unauthorized materials such as explosives or similar items.
- 5. Honor Diversity Yours and Others'. Respect and uphold the rights and dignity of all persons with whom you interact as part of Michigan 4-H.
- 6. Create a Safe Environment. Be kind and compassionate toward others. Be considerate and courteous of all persons and their property. Do not carelessly or intentionally harm or intimidate anyone in any way (verbally, mentally, physically, or emotionally). Do not insult, harass, or bully others or engage in other hostile behaviors, including sexual harassment, sexual assault or sexual abuse. Abstain from sexual behavior and intimate physical/sexual contact in either public or private situations at an MSU Extension youth 4-H activity or event.
- 7. Be a Team Player. Work cooperatively with all individuals involved in 4-H programs and activities. Be responsive to the reasonable requests of the person in charge such as volunteers and staff. Respect the integrity of the group and the group's decisions..
- 8. Humane Treatment of Animals. Treat animals humanely and provide appropriate animal care.
- 9. Participate Fully. Participate in and contribute to planned programs, be on time and follow through on assigned tasks/responsibilities in a manner that fosters the safety, well-being, and quality of the educational experience for self and others. Have fun!
- 10. Be A Positive Role Model. Act in a mature, responsible manner, recognizing you are role models for others and that you are representing both yourself and the Michigan State University Extension 4-H Youth Development Program. Be responsible for your behavior, use positive language, and uphold the highest standards of conduct at all 4-H activities.
- B. All members and adults shall adhere to the dress code:
 - 1. Clothing may not reference drugs, violence, sex, alcohol, or gang/street activity.
 - 2. Shorts must be fingertip length at the inseam.

- 3. Shirts must not have cutouts that expose undergarments, chest, stomach, or back.
- 4. Crop tops, midriff-baring tops, or tops with low necklines are prohibited.
- 5. Tank tops shoulder straps must be no less than 1" (Spaghetti string tank tops may only be used during show activities under dickies and show coats).
- 6. Proper footwear must be worn for riding and handling equines. Closed-toe and closed-heel boots or shoes are required. Flip-flops and sandals are not allowed.
- 7. Participants must wear western or English tack and attire as specified in the 4-H rulebook. Tack and attire must be approved by the judge during tack check-in.
- 8. All mounted participants are required to wear a helmet that meets ASTM specifications and bears the SEI certification label (SEI F1163 or higher).
 - a) Helmets must be manufactured and distributed by a participant in the certification program of the Safety Equipment Institute (SEI).
 - b) Compliance with the helmet rule is the responsibility of the exhibitor (or their parent/legal guardian if the exhibitor is a minor), not the local show officials or judge.
 - c) Show officials may spot-check helmets at any time to ensure compliance.
- 9. No slip-on spurs are allowed in any class.

III. SAFETY, ACCIDENTS, EMERGENCY PROCEDURES

A. PERSONAL SAFETY:

- 1. In the event of severe weather, seek shelter in any designated building at the Monroe County Fairgrounds (e.g., the activity center, bathrooms, or other solidly built structures). The fairgrounds are equipped with a public address system, and announcements will be made when safety precautions are necessary.
- 2. Child Safety- Trafficking is an actual threat, and all persons need to be aware of their surroundings; indicators could be any or all of the following:
 - a) An unknown individual taking photos of children
 - b) An unknown individual offering to buy things for the children
 - c) An unknown individual spending large amounts of time lingering and frequenting the area.
 - d) An unknown individual avoiding law enforcement or security that approaches the area.
 - e) IF YOU SUSPECT SUSPICIOUS ACTIVITY, TAKE A PHOTO OF THE INDIVIDUAL AND REPORT IT IMMEDIATELY TO A SUPERINTENDENT.
 - f) Social Media keep in mind photos and information posted on social media may be seen by unknown individuals.
 - (1) The program has two Facebook Groups:
 - (a) Monroe County Horse & Pony public group. Open to the public. You may post events and sale items.
 - (b) Monroe 4-H Horse & Pony Members Only group. Only those currently enrolled in 4-H, parent/guardians, silver and gold volunteers have access to the group. This group shares only 4-H matters. No sale items or non-4-H information/events are allowed on this page. The only exceptions are events that donate a portion of the event funds to the 4-H Horse & Pony program.

B. HORSE AND RIDER SAFETY:

- 1. All exhibitors are required to wear an SEI-approved helmet during the fair and at all 4-H-sponsored events involving mounted activities.
- 2. Tack- all tack should be kept in safe working order. Check tack for cracked or torn leather. Before mounting, ensure billet straps are secure, and girths are tightened.
- 3. During the fair, assigned club aisles/stalls must be monitored by an adult daily, 7 am-10 pm, to ensure horse health and to ensure rules are being followed.
 - a) Club stalls are to be kept clean and neat.
 - b) Supervision to ensure that Members of the Public are not harming, petting, or agitating horses.
 - c) Initial daily feeding, watering, cleaning are to be completed before 9AM as well as monitored throughout the day
 - d) Evening feeding and water needs to be completed before 9PM
- 4. A parent/guardian must be present while a 4-H member is riding. If/when a parent is not present, a Pledge of Presence form must be on file with the Club Leader and Booth. *See Club Leader for the form.

C. ACCIDENTS, MORTALITY, & SICKNESS

- 1. Should a youth and equine be involved in an accident (fall, loss of control, etc.), other youth should immediately stop, then dismount, and return to the barn as directed.
 - a) Persons not directly involved should maintain distance to allow Superintendents, medical personnel, the youth's parent, and club leader to assess the situation and take the appropriate next steps, including—but not limited to—calling 911 and veterinary services.
 - b) Superintendents or designated booth personnel can/will use the emergency radio to inform the Monroe County Fair Administration of any pertinent information.
 - c) The public will be asked to remain at a respectful distance and refrain from filming or taking photographs.
 - d) Screens or barriers may be used to protect both the youth and the equine from invasive scrutiny.

- 2. In the case of equine death, all of the above will be followed.
 - a) Screens and barriers will be used.
 - b) The Monroe County Fair Administration will remove the animal and transport it to the area outside the Sheriff's Posse Barn, where the 4-H project member's parent or guardian will be responsible for removing it from the Monroe County Fairgrounds within 16 hours.
- 3. In the case of equine sickness, unsoundness, or similar issues, individuals not directly involved should maintain a safe distance to allow the Superintendents, the 4-H member, the member's parent, and the club leader to assess the situation and take appropriate action. This may include, but is not limited to, contacting veterinary services and/or removing the animal from the grounds.
 - a) If the superintendents determine that the animal must leave the grounds, the 4-H project member's parent or guardian will be responsible for removing it from the Monroe County Fairgrounds within 4 hours

IV. VIOLATIONS:

A. Violations of any rule or regulation will be addressed on a case-by-case basis by club leaders, superintendents, and, when appropriate, the Executive Board. Violations of the Monroe Horse and Pony Code of Conduct may result in removal from the Monroe County Horse & Pony Program. The rules outlined in the current Michigan 4-H Horse and Pony Project Show Rules will be followed; however, in the event of any contradictions, the Monroe County Horse and Pony Program Rules will take precedence.

V. WALK/TROT DIVISION RULES

- A. Walk trot classes are open to any 4-H age youth with no time limit to move out of walk-trot. Walk trot riders must select a level appropriate to their skill level. (See leveling guidelines appendix) WT exhibitors are required to wear ASTM/SEI-approved helmets in all riding classes. Helmets must be properly secured **whenever riders are mounted**.
- B. Walk/trot participants may not show in 3-gaited rail or jumping classes.
- C. Once a member has participated in a three-gaited class, they cannot participate in a walk-trot class unless safety, health, or the age of the animal is a factor. Any such changes must be approved by the superintendents, club leader, and executive board. If approved, the member will not be eligible for high point, championship classes, or the state show.

VI. WALK /TROT/ CANTER DIVISION RULES:

A. WTC riders must select a level that is appropriate for their skill level (see leveling guidelines in the appendix). Safety is the top priority, and each situation will be addressed on a case-by-case basis by the superintendents, club leader, and the Executive Board. All WTC exhibitors are required to wear ASTM/SEI-approved helmets in all riding classes. Helmets must be properly secured **whenever riders are mounted**.

VII. CLOVERBUD DIVISION RULES:

- A. Cloverbud members must fill out a May form.
- B. Must designate the horse, pony, or mini that they will be handling (Note: they may bring their own animals).
- C. Must have a 4-H youth mentor (age 13 or older, parent, silver/gold volunteer, or leader) present in the arena when showing. This includes required spotters for walk only and walk/trot cloverbuds. Walk Only exhibitors are required to wear ASTM/SEI-approved helmets in all riding classes. Helmets must be properly secured **whenever riders are**
- D. Youth should show as independently as possible with limited coaching from the mentor in the ring.

SECTION 2: HORSE/PONY/MINI PROJECT REGISTRATION

- I. MAY FORM REGISTRATION PROCEDURE
 - A. Registration packet must be turned in on the date designated by the Monroe County 4-H Extension Office. Packet and/or online registration form must contain:
 - 1. Registration form completed on both sides.
 - 2. A picture of the project animal that clearly shows most of its markings is required. A photo from the Coggins is acceptable, whether in color or black and white.
 - 3. Copy of current negative Coggins.
 - 4. Copy of rabies vaccinations (veterinary receipt or proof of purchase).
 - 5. For out of state horses a health certificate no older than 20 days is required at all shows including fair. You will be asked to provide this during check in.
 - B. Members may show up to 2 total animals at the fair. 1 mini and 1 big horse. Minis in the Yearling Challenge do not apply. **Subject to change based on stall availability.**
 - The first horse/miniature horse will be designated as the Primary/Premium Horse. This Primary/Premium horse/miniature will be the project that competes in premium classes (e.g., Showmanship, Horsemanship, Equitation, etc.).
 - 2. All members must register each project animal on a separate form; forms are available through the 4-H Club Leader, Extension Office, Online, or from a Superintendent.
 - 3. A backup horse may be signed up during the May 1st enrollment. The purpose of identifying a backup horse is to have an alternative available to replace the primary horse in the event that the primary horse is deemed unsafe, injured, or deceased and needs to be replaced for fair participation.
 - a) The use of a backup horse at fair is subject to board approval
 - At fair, a backup horse is not eligible for championship classes and will be given an "R" at the end of their back number. It is the riders responsibility to comply with this rule.

- 4. Backup horses are eligible for state competition if the primary horse is deemed unsafe, injured, or deceased.
- 5. All primary/premium animals are required to participate in at least one 4-H horse show event in order to attend the fair.
- C. Each 4-H member must designate a riding seat on their fair class sign up form: English, Western, Gymkhana, Ranch, or Miniature horse (no change permitted once submitted).
 - 1. Exhibitors must participate in their premium showmanship and one (1) additional premium class (equitation, ranch pattern, horsemanship, or barrels) at the Monroe County Fair. Miniature horse exhibitors must show in showmanship and in-hand trail.
 - a) Failure to participate in both premium classes will result in disqualification from state show eligibility. Additionally, the exhibitor will be removed from their remaining classes at the fair, and their horse will be removed from the fairgrounds, unless the horse is being shared with another youth. Refer to the Fair Premium Livestock Rules for the corresponding Monroe County Fair Rule.
 - 2. State and award points will be accumulated based on the participant's level. Members must show their project animal at the Monroe County Fair to be eligible to compete at the Michigan State 4-H Horse/Mini Show. If the primary horse is injured prior to the state show, the backup horse may be used to show at state. However, the backup horse must be registered as a 4-H project and shown at the fair if the change is made before the fair.
- D. Horse/Pony/Mini Project members, except for Cloverbuds, are strongly encouraged to own their animal; however, it is permissible for a member to manage, but not own, an animal. In either case, ownership or management must be established prior to the May 1st deadline. Management means the youth member is responsible for at least fifty (50) percent of the daily care, feeding, and training. The club leader will determine whether a member has met the management requirements.
- E. Only individuals registered for 4-H, who have completed their fair entry by the deadlines set by the Extension Office, are eligible to exhibit at the Monroe County Fair. No exceptions will be made.
- II. DECEASED, SICKNESS, INJURY, THEFT, OR UNSAFE PROCEDURES
 - A. Exhibitors may request horse/pony changes in person to the 4-H Horse and Pony Board if the request is made before the July meeting. Any horse/pony changes arising after the July meeting will be addressed on a case-by-case basis by the superintendents and executive board. Approval for a horse change is based on the death, sickness, or unsoundness of the horse (veterinarian note required). An unsafe horse may also be grounds for a horse change.
 - 1. Changing a horse/pony after the annual form is submitted will result in the member being ineligible for champion classes.
 - 2. As stated in the Fair Premium Catalog: Livestock that is identified as ill, diseased, dangerous, or injured, or any other animals, can be released by the Monroe County Fair-appointed veterinarian or by the majority vote of the following individuals: the superintendent of the species in question, two other species superintendents or assistant superintendents, or the Youth Division General Livestock Superintendent, Monroe County Fair Association General Livestock Superintendent, and the County 4-H Program Coordinator. The owners of any equine assume the risk of their animal staying on the Monroe County Fairgrounds and will not find the Fair Board, show staff, superintendents, or any person associated with 4-H liable for said animal.
- III. SHARING OF PROIECT ANIMAL
 - A. Each member must show their own project horse/pony/mini, not another member's.
 - B. Members of an immediate family (siblings and step-siblings) may register and show the same animal if at different levels (If they are in the same level, youth cannot show in the same classes with the exception of showmanship).
 - C. Walk/Trot and Cloverbud members may share a project animal with any member in their 4-H club and must sign up as so on the Horse & Pony registration forms.
 - D. In the event both qualify for a championship class, only one may exhibit (this decision must be made by the member's family, and notification is given to the booth).
 - E. Backup horses will follow the same rules for sharing as stated above.
- IV. PONY
 - A. All of the above procedures apply to Pony Projects.
 - B. Ponies must be measured prior to competing at pre-fair shows.
 - C. Pony is 56" and under for Michigan 4-H functions and allows ½ inch for shoes.
 - D. Any challenges to pony size must be submitted before 8:00 am the first day of fair.
- V. MINIATURE HORSE/SMALL PONY
 - A. All of the above procedures apply to a miniature horse 4-H project.
 - B. A miniature horse is 38" and under at the last hair of the mane. The small pony division are animals over 38" to 46" at the last hair of the mane.
 - C. Show Committee may measure miniature horses prior to the first show/Fair
 - D. If the animal attends the State 4-H Miniature Horse Show, the state show committee may re-measure it, regardless of age.
 - E. See Michigan 4-H Miniature Horse Guidelines.
- VI. FAIR
 - A. All clubs are required to complete their designated duties (e.g., gates, night barn, manure wagon, wash rack, etc.) during fair week. Additionally, all barn areas must be restored to their original condition, with all hay, garbage, and other debris accumulated during the week removed. Failure to fulfill assigned duties may result in penalties, including the potential loss of eligibility for the state show or participation in future fairs, at the discretion of the superintendents.
 - 1. Horses can only be washed on the concrete wash rack.
 - 2. No horses can be tied to the front of stalls.
 - 3. Horses/mini can not be contained with a clipped lead rope across the stall opening

- 4. Only the exhibitor may ride/handle the horse/mini, if there is a safety concern arrangements can be arranged
- B. All members, except Cloverbud, must exhibit their animals in the horse barns for the entire week of the fair. Cloverbud members exhibit the 1st Sunday of the fair.
- C. Horses must be exercised daily and shown in their premium showmanship and one additional premium class.
- D. Clubs will be assigned hay stalls, tack stalls, and dressing rooms by the superintendents (assuming that all the stalls are not filled with horses).
- E. Tack box requirements: <u>no larger than 50" tall, 40" wide, and a depth of 30"</u>. Anyone bringing a tack box larger than those measurements will be asked to remove it.
- F. End of Fair Release:
 - 1. No tack boxes or project animals may be removed from the horse barns or fairgrounds without the Superintendent's approval once checked in.
 - 2. Violation of this rule will result in the member being denied the opportunity to exhibit at the following year's Monroe County Fair.
 - 3. Club leaders must be present during haul-out until all club horses have been removed from the fairgrounds. No horses or tack boxes may be removed from the barn prior to 11:00 PM on Saturday. All horses must be off the property by 8:00 AM on Sunday. The grounds and barn must be restored to their original state no later than 8:00 AM Sunday, unless prior approval is granted by the superintendents. Decorations may not be removed until 11:00 PM on Saturday and must be completed by 8:00 AM Sunday.
- G. Clubs must designate a responsible adult from 7 am 10 pm daily during fair for the safety and cleanliness of the club-assigned aisle/space.
- H. If a 4-H leader is not present in the horse barn area, a contact name and phone number must be provided to the booth.

VII. STATE SHOW

- A. If a member or parent of a member does not fulfill their assigned duties at the state show, they will be ineligible for the following year's state show unless there is an emergency. In the case of an emergency, the member will be responsible for finding a replacement and report it to the state show committee.
- B. All State Horse Show paperwork must be submitted to the State Committee by July 1st. See Yearly updated MSU state forms for additional qualifications and rules
- C. 4-H Members wishing to attend state must attend two board meetings or committee meetings along with one of the June Point Shows. A mandatory meeting does not count toward the two meetings. Attendance is taken at all board and committee meetings.
- D. All participants must clean and fully strip their stall before leaving the MSU 4-H State Horse Show. Failure to do so will result in disqualification from the state horse show award and forfeiture of any reimbursement provided by the Horse and Pony Board for show fees. A second offense will result in the loss of eligibility to participate in future state shows.

SECTION 3: HORSE SHOW RULES & REGULATIONS

- I. FAIR
 - A. Championship classes will consist of first (1st) and second (2nd) placings from each division and level.
 - English, Western, Gymkhana, Ranch, and Mini horse showmanship champions will compete for the overall showman award and horse and pony sweepstakes representative.
- II. STATE QUALIFYING CLASSES
 - A. The following classes accumulate points toward the State Horse Show in East Lansing. The points are accumulated at the 4-H shows. Only walk/trot/canter riders (Levels 1, 2, or 3) can compete to attend state.

ENGLISH: Showmanship, English Equitation, English Pleasure

WESTERN: Showmanship, Western Horsemanship, Western Pleasure

RANCH: Showmanship, Ranch Pattern, Ranch Rail

GYMKHANA: Cloverleaf, Pole Bending, Flags.

SECTION 6: MISCELLANEOUS INFORMATION/APPENDIX

A. Dressage High Point Qualification Rules

To qualify for the Dressage High Point Award:

- A member must acquire points from these classes:
 - Dressage Training Level 1
 - Dressage Training Level 2
 - o Dressage Equitation
 - Dressage Suitability
- A member must participate in two training-level dressage patterns (2023 USDF Training Level Test 1 and 2).
- A walk/trot/canter member of any level may participate in any of the offered dressage patterns; however, introductory-level
 dressage patterns (2023 USDF Introductory Level Test A, B, and C) and western dressage do not count toward the high point
 award.

B. Monroe 4-H Horse Leveling Guidelines

Levels for riders will be determined by suggestions from the leader and/or parent recommendation and recommendations made by the judge at the leveling ride/ feedback show. Leveling will also be offered on the Friday evening of the two 4-H shows before fair and the Saturday night before fair.

Other opportunities for leveling placement are at ride nights at fairgrounds, with superintendent input in place of judge's feedback.

Riding Horse

Walk Only: Can safely walk on the rail, demonstrates control to steer, stop, reverse, and back. Riders are permitted to ride two handed with a snaffle bit regardless of the horse's age. Riders using a shank bit will still be required to ride with one hand.

Walk Trot: Walk trot rider guidelines are the same as WTC riders but exclude cantering and leads.

Skills for level 1- Rider demonstrates that they can maintain control of their horse. Horse will stop, turn, and change gaits on command. Rider can complete introductory straight-line patterns while riding and in showmanship. Rider can obtain the correct diagonal and lead up to 50% of the time. Riders are permitted to ride two handed with a snaffle bit regardless of the horse's age. Riders using a shank bit will still be required to ride with one hand. This rule does not apply at the state show.

Skills for level 2- Rider demonstrates that they can maintain control of their horse. Horse will stop, turn, and change gaits on command. Rider can complete intermediate patterns while riding and in showmanship. Rider can obtain the correct diagonal and lead up to 70% of the time.

Skills for level 3- Rider demonstrates that they can maintain control of their horse. Horse will stop, turn, and change gaits on command. Rider can complete advanced patterns while riding and in showmanship. Rider can obtain the correct diagonal and lead 100 % of the time. Rider can perform simple and or flying lead changes.

Gymkhana Horse Levels

Skills for level 1- Rider demonstrates that they can maintain control of their horse. Horse will stop, turn, and change gaits on command. The horse may not demonstrate tight pockets on the barrels, have difficulty performing a rollback in keyhole, and may break gait during patterns. Rider can complete patterns without disqualification up to 50% of the time.

Skills for level 2- Rider demonstrates that they can maintain control of their horse. Horse will stop, turn, and change gaits on command. The horse can perform moderately tight pockets on the barrels and usually can perform a rollback during keyhole. Horse may break gait during

patterns. Rider can complete patterns without disqualification up to 70% of the time.

Skills for level 3- Rider demonstrates that they can maintain control of their horse. Horse will stop, turn, and change gaits on command. The horse can perform tight pockets on the barrels and can consistently perform a rollback during keyhole. Horse does not break gait during patterns. Rider can complete patterns without disqualification up to 100% of the time.

In-Hand Miniature Horse Levels

Skills for Level 1: Mini and Handler can stop, stand, back, trot, and perform 90-degree pivots and straight-line patterns. Mini can jump 4 to 6 jumps at 12 inches or smaller. Mini can go over poles at the walk and trot. Horse can be caught in Liberty class while wearing a halter with a small catch rope.

Skills for Level 2: Mini and Handler can stop, stand, back, trot, and perform 180-to-270-degree pivots and intermediate patterns. Mini can jump 4 to 6 jumps at 24 inches or smaller. Mini can go over a bridge or tarp, walk or trot poles, and has started to learn the side pass. Mini can be caught in Liberty Class while not wearing a halter during the performance.

Skills for Level 3: Mini and Handler can stop, stand, back, trot, and perform 360 and over-degree pivots and advanced patterns. Mini can jump 6 to 8 jumps at 28 inches or smaller. Mini can go over a bridge or tarp, walk or trot poles and can side pass. Mini can complete advanced in-hand trail maneuvers. Mini can be caught in Liberty class while not wearing a halter during the performance.

Driving Miniature Horse Levels

Skills for Level 1 Ground Driving Only: Ground driving mini is always safe and under control (not hooked to cart). Driver can identify at least 2 parts of the harness. Driver can perform simple straight-line patterns.

Skills for Level 2: Mini is always safe and under control while hooked. Driver can identify at least 4 parts of the harness and can hook or unhook the cart with assistance. Driver can perform rail work and simple patterns with or without an adult or level 3 youth in the cart to assist.

Skills for Level 3: Mini is always safe and under control while hooked. Driver can identify at least 6 parts of the harness and can hook or unhook the cart without assistance. Driver can perform rail work and intermediate patterns without an adult in the cart to assist.

Special Class Considerations:

Hunter Hack: Open to WTC Level riders 1-3

Equitation Over Fences: Rider must be WTC level 2 or 3 to compete in this full course jumping class.

Jumping High Point qualifications: **Must** complete Equitation Over Fences, Hunter Hack and English Equitation to qualify for the award Trail Champion: This is selected using the highest trail pattern score from all levels (WTC,WT and Mini).

Riders can choose between western pleasure OR ranch riding but can not compete in both disciplines.

C. Monroe Equine Development (MED) Program Guide

The Monroe Equine Development (MED) Program is designed to introduce young horse enthusiasts to showing even if they do not own or lease a horse. Suitable horses will be provided for the MED riders to use during the Monroe Co. Fair.

Youth Eligibility:

- 1. The MED program is open to registered Monroe Co. 4-H youth ages 9 to 19. 2. Youth must not own or lease a horse which can be shown under the regular 4-H program to qualify.
- 3. Youth must be a member of a horse-focused 4-H club, but it can be their primary or secondary club.
- 4. Youth must take a minimum of 10 riding lessons within the last 12 months.
 - a. Youth can take lessons from a professional instructor or a 4-H club leader if the club leader offers lessons. Club leaders are not required to give lessons.
 - b. The miniature horse MED program requires that youth take a minimum of 5 handling lessons within the last 12 months.
 - c. Youth can participate in both the mini-MED and regular MED programs if they meet the requirements for both.
- 5. Youth must submit the required MED application forms with their clubs May 1st forms annually.
- 6. MED participants may handle equines only as permitted by the equine owner and their accompanying youth on the designated show day. This must occur under the direct supervision of the equine owner and their youth. The use of the equine is not considered a lease, and MED participants may interact with the equine solely within the boundaries set by the owner and accompanying youth. Additional privileges are neither guaranteed nor implied.

Exhibitors must select either WALK ONLY, WALK TROT and/or Mini-MED on their forms.

MED Equipment and Attire

Exhibitors are strongly encouraged to have their own saddle, but one can be provided if necessary. Horse bridles and equipment for miniature horses will be provided by the horse owners.

Riding youth are required to have a helmet in all riding classes.

Attire does not need to be fancy; just fit correctly. Long pants (jeans or dress pants), boots, and a long-sleeved shirt (button-up or polo shirt) are required. A western hat is optional.

Additional Information

Safety is paramount. Leaders or superintendents can adjust the MED exhibitors' classes if there are safety concerns (Example: move rider from walk trot to walk only).
