

4-H YOUTH PROGRAM OF OAKLAND COUNTY HORSE PROGRAM ACHIEVEMENT LEVEL STUDY GUIDELINES – LEVEL V

Oakland County 4-H Horse Ambassador (Complete Levels I & II – Note: Level II has been waived for 2024)

APPROPRIATE ATTIRE REQUIRED

An Oakland County 4-H youth member must first complete Horse Achievement Levels I and II to apply for the horse ambassador role (Level V). Ambassadors will receive a sash or other identifying apparel (shirt, button/patch, crown/hat) and be introduced and expected to attend several public 4-H events (i.e. awards, clinics, horse shows, fair). Duties of an ambassador will also include 4-H horse project promotion and recruitment efforts, club presentations/visits as requested or invited by clubs or 4-H program staff.

SECTION I

Demonstrate knowledge acquired

- 1. Pass (75% correct answers) a written test of previous topics from Levels I-II.
- 2. Complete an interview with a horse industry leader/professional.
- 3. Present a speech, demonstration or poster session. Choose a topic to present to club(s) or at county program/event. Some ideas are listed below (or any other topic approved by the Horse Council Education Committee):
 - a. Form to Function: Using a photo of your project horse, diagram and describe the potential uses and limitations based on the horse's conformation and way of going.
 - b. Riding Equipment choose from types of saddles and/or harnesses. Research the history, changes throughout the years, present-day form, and future trends. Describe or demonstrate how to properly fit this type of saddle to both the horse and the rider.
 - c. Current horse related issue Choose one current topic from the horse industry (i.e. breeding, disease management, genetic disorders, animal welfare, or training methods etc.) Information presented must include a minimum of three references of the topic.
 - d. Safety: Design and describe a detailed safety plan for a boarding facility for each of these: stabling area, riding arena, turn-out areas, and include any safety rules for boarders or visitors.
 - e. First Aid: Describe basic first aid and steps to take for each situation: severe lameness (no body weight on leg), colic, bleeding from injury to leg, and swollen eye.

SECTION II

Personal Essay

Write a personal story that describes the relationship you have with your horse(s), including training, personal accomplishments with your horse(s) and any other information that you feel is appropriate. (*Limit to two double-spaced pages*. Enhancements should be limited to one page of photos and/or drawings.)



SECTION III

Mounted/In-Hand abilities demonstration

Choose a discipline from the list below (or something else approved by the Education Committee)

- 1. Demonstrate one of the following patterns (or provide a score sheet from a class performed/judged within last 12 months):
 - a. Western riding (with gait transitions)
 - b. Reining
 - c. Hunter Over Fences (4-H minimum requirements)
 - d. Dressage test
 - e. Trail (4-H minimum requirements)
 - f. Saddle seat pattern
 - g. In-Hand, Driving or Ground-Driving specific to Miniature Horses
- 2. Interview with industry leader or professional in the chosen discipline and attach summary sheet. Must know any 4-H specific rules or requirements for your chosen area and be familiar with other general equine industry information specific to your chosen discipline.
- 3. Design and perform a two-minute free style program in the discipline of your choice. The creative program must be limited to two minutes and use maneuvers, gaits, etc. acceptable to the discipline being demonstrated. Attire appropriate to the discipline being demonstrated must be worn. Any music and/or audiovisual required to be supplied by the rider.
