St. Joseph County 4-H Youth Program



What is 4-H? 4-H is a fun, learn-by-doing educational program for youth people. Its mission is to help youth become self-directed, contributing members of their communities. 4-H is open to all without regard to race, color, national origin, gender, gender identity, religion, age, height, weight, disability, political beliefs, sexual orientation, marital status, family status or veteran status.

How old do you have to be to join 4-H? The St. Joseph County 4-H Youth Program is open to all youth 8-19 years of age by January 1 of the year they will exhibit their completed projects at the St. Joseph County Grange Fair. St. Joseph County offers a Cloverbud program for youth 5-7 years of age by January 1 of the year they will exhibit.

Enrollment Procedure: Young people interested in enrolling in 4-H may do so by contacting the organizational leader of the 4-H club(s) they are interested in joining (see reverse side for club listing).

Open Enrollment Deadline (for the current 4-H Project Year): Enrollment forms for tenured (returning) 4-H members are due by December 1 of the current year. Enrollment of youth new to 4-H will be accepted through April 1 of the program year (unless the 4-H project animal registration deadline have passed for a given animal project).

Who is in charge of 4-H? 4-H is the youth development program of Michigan State University Extension (MSUE). Nationally, 4-H is part of the Extension Service of the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA). There is a Michigan State University Extension office located in each of Michigan's 83 counties.
