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

4-H On the Move: Detroit Cultural Connection Camp is a three-day day camp for youth ages 13-19 designed to build cultural awareness, empathy, and a deeper understanding of Metro Detroit's diverse communities. The centerpiece is a full-day, guided bus tour through Metro Detroit with hands-on cultural activities and community engagement—supported by a pre-tour preparation day and a post-tour reflection day to help youth process what they learn and consider how to foster positive, inclusive change in their own communities.





Volunteer Tip of the Month

Invite Youth to the Decision-Making Table

Including young people in leadership and advisory roles strengthens both youth development and the organizations they serve. When youth are invited to participate in decision-making—especially on issues that directly affect them—they bring fresh perspectives, creativity, and authentic insight that adults alone may not fully capture. Youth are often willing to think outside the box, challenge assumptions, and propose innovative solutions.

Youth involvement also supports more diverse and inclusive leadership while helping young people build skills such as communication, teamwork, confidence, and civic engagement. At the same time, organizations benefit from stronger connections to youth communities, increased trust, and more meaningful outreach.

Adults play a critical role in making youth voice meaningful and effective. Strong youth-adult partnerships are built intentionally and with mutual respect.

Try This: Ways Adults Can Support Youth Voice

- Invite youth to serve on committees, planning teams, or advisory groups.
- Ask for youth input before decisions are made—and follow up on how their ideas were used.
- Create safe, welcoming spaces where youth feel comfortable sharing their opinions.
- Mentor youth by explaining processes, expectations, and decision-making steps.
- Encourage youth to speak up, even when their perspectives differ from adults.

Creating space for youth voice leads to better decisions today and helps build a pipeline of informed, engaged leaders for the future. Success Story

Celebrating Christmas the Norwegian Way

On Saturday, December 20, 2025, youth gathered at the Jefferson Barns Community Center for a Holidays Around the World workshop focused on Christmas traditions in Norway. The goal of the program was to spark curiosity, build cultural awareness, and help young people appreciate traditions from around the world.

Participants explored Norwegian holiday customs such as the Julenisse, a mischievous Christmas gnome, and julegrøt, a creamy rice porridge traditionally enjoyed during the season. Youth compared Norwegian and American holiday traditions, discovering both familiar themes and unique cultural differences.

Hands-on learning was at the heart of the workshop. Youth crafted their own Julenisse, cooked and tasted julegrøt, and decorated cookies inspired by Norway's tradition of baking seven varieties during Christmas. While the activity was simplified, it still honored the spirit of the tradition. The 2.5-hour workshop welcomed five youth—two of whom traveled from other counties—along with several parents who joined in the fun.

One memorable moment came when a participant who was initially hesitant to try the rice porridge bravely stepped outside her comfort zone and ended up loving it. This small moment perfectly captured the power of cultural experiences to build confidence and openness.

The workshop created a welcoming environment for learning and exploration. Youth gained cultural knowledge, practiced empathy, and built confidence by trying new foods and activities. Parents described the event as “fun and educational,” and youth shared how much they enjoyed learning about another country’s traditions. The fact that families traveled from outside the county highlights the value placed on these experiences.

Cultural education programs like Holidays Around the World do more than teach traditions—they inspire curiosity, encourage openness, and strengthen community connections. Participants left with new knowledge, a sense of accomplishment, and lasting memories from a joyful and meaningful day.

February is the month that recognizes cardiovascular health, and 4-H likes to promote healthy living habits during this month.

- Cotton swab or your finger


What to Do:

Why It Works:


Dish soap breaks the surface tension of water

Participate in the World Food Prize Michigan Youth Institute

As millions across the globe deal with food insecurity, the World Food Prize Michigan Youth Institute (WFP MIYI) offers young people an opportunity to be part of the solution. Held May 7 in East Lansing, or by participating from anywhere else using Zoom video/web conference technology, the event seeks to inspire and prepare the next generation of global leaders to end world hunger.

To participate, youth should be in grades 7-12 and register by the March 15 deadline. As part of the registration process, youth are required to prepare a three- to five-page research paper about a developing country and one of 22 key factors that affect food security. At the event, youth present and discuss their papers with other attendees and research and industry experts.

The top performing students at the WFP MIYI will be selected to attend the World Food Prize Global Youth Institute in Des Moines, Iowa, in October. For more information, visit <https://www.canr.msu.edu/wfpmiyi/>. Registration opens February 1 and closes March 15.

Additional ticketing information is available on the registration website. Registration will close on February 17.

Tip-off for the game is scheduled for 12 p.m. Gates to the Breslin will open at 10:30 a.m., with a variety of pre-game activities hosted by MSU Extension professionals around the concourse. Participants are encouraged to show their pride and wear green and white 4-H or MSU Extension apparel. Families for whom cost is a barrier should contact their local 4-H program coordinator.
