### **ACTION NEEDED: All participants must complete enrollment in 4-H Online by May 1 deadline**

All youth who will be participating in the WFPMIYI must complete an enrollment in Michigan 4-H using our 4-H Online website by May 1, 2026 in order to participate in the WFPMIYI. A parent/guardian must complete the enrollment for all youth who are under the age of 18. **PLEASE NOTE: enrollment in 4-H Online is an additional step beyond the registration that has already been completed by each youth participant.** 4-H Online is the system that we use to collect medical, media, and evaluation authorization forms for this event. Completing enrollment in 4-H Online is easiest when done using a screen larger than a phone.

If a parent/guardian **has previously** created an account in 4-H Online for their family, they will be able to sign in to update their child's enrollment information for the 2025 / 2026 4-H program year by going to:

## Event Location and Parking Information

The 2026 World Food Prize Michigan Youth Institute will be held in Brody Hall on the campus of Michigan State University in East Lansing, MI. ## Sharing Your Research: The Round Table Discussions

During the morning Round Table Discussions portion of the event, you will share an overview of your research paper with a group of peers and experts. Each group will have 8-9 youth participants, an adult leader, and 4-6 “experts” (MSU faculty, staff, students, World Food Prize Foundation staff, WFPMIYI alumni, and professionals from organizations who do work related to food, hunger, and sustainability). In your Round Table Discussion Group, you and the other youth participants will take turns sharing an overview of the research papers that you wrote. This overview should include what you learned writing your paper and the recommendations you made regarding the global food security factor in the country you selected to focus on. Please prepare a 3 to 5-minute verbal overview that outlines the key points of your research paper. You are welcome to use notes or notecards, but please do not read your paper when you provide your overview. Five minutes goes by faster than you might think, so it will be important for you to practice (and time yourself!) before the Institute.

Here is a suggested outline to help you plan your time for sharing the overview of your research paper with your Round Table Discussion Group:

- 15 seconds** Introduction (your name, the country you focused on, and the topic you focused on)
- 1 minute** Describe your chosen country and a typical family
- 1.5 minutes** Describe the global challenge topic you selected and the impact of that topic on the country you chose to study
- 2 minutes** Share the potential solutions and recommendations you made to address the challenge
- 15 seconds** Conclusion

After each participant shares their research, there will be 5 minutes for experts and peer participants to ask questions to the presenter. You will receive supportive questions and feedback from others which can help you continue developing your understanding of the challenges and solutions you've identified in your paper. If the thought of a Q&A session with a group of experts and peers gives you any feelings of anxiety (which is a normal feeling to have prior to an experience like this!) please know that this portion of the event is meant to be conversational and educational, and it won't feel like a test on how much you know about your country or topic. The Q&A portion will be conducted in a positive and supportive manner, and will be led by a 4-H staff member or volunteer who is trained as a group facilitator. After all the presentations have been completed, your facilitator will guide your group through a discussion to identify the major points, common themes, and differences across all the presentations from your group.

### **Diving Deeper with our Immersion Experiences**

During the afternoon portion of the Institute, you will participate in an Immersion Experience activity on the campus of MSU. The Immersion Experience will provide you with an opportunity to see first-hand some of the exciting ways that Michigan State University is leading cutting-edge efforts that help to feed Michigan and the world through valuable innovations related to food, hunger, science, art, and sustainability.

### **Recommended Attire**

Business casual or business professional attire is appropriate for this event; FFA members are welcome to wear official attire if they choose.
